A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to the repeal of the Texas Success Initiative. 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 SECTION 1. Section 28.014(a), Education Code, is amended to 5 read as follows: 6 (a) Each school district shall partner with at least one institution of higher education to develop and provide courses in 7 college preparatory mathematics and English language arts. The 8 9 courses must be designed: (1) for students at the 12th grade level whose 10 11 performance on: 12 (A) an end-of-course assessment instrument 13 required under Section 39.023(c) does not meet college readiness 14 standards; or 15 (B) or [<del>,</del>] a college coursework entrance 16 examination[, or an assessment instrument designated under Section 51.3062(c)] indicates that the student is not ready to perform 17 entry-level college coursework; and 18 (2) to prepare students for success in entry-level 19 20 college courses. 21 SECTION 2. Section 28.0258(h), Education Code, is amended 22 to read as follows: In determining whether a student for whom an individual 23 (h) graduation committee is established is qualified to graduate, the 24

12 <u>(13)</u> [<del>(14)</del>] the student's overall preparedness for 13 postsecondary success; and

14 (14) [(15)] any other academic information designated
 15 for consideration by the board of trustees of the school district.

SECTION 3. Section 29.904(d), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

18 (d) A plan developed under this section:

(1) must establish clear, achievable goals for increasing the percentage of the school district's graduating seniors, particularly the graduating seniors attending a high school described by Subsection (a), who enroll in an institution of higher education for the academic year following graduation;

(2) must establish an accurate method of measuring
progress toward the goals established under Subdivision (1) that
may include the percentage of district high school students and the
percentage of students attending a district high school described

1 by Subsection (a) who: (A) are enrolled in a course for which a student 2 3 may earn college credit, such as an advanced placement or international baccalaureate course or a course offered through 4 5 concurrent enrollment in high school and at an institution of higher education; 6 7 (B) are enrolled in courses that meet the curriculum requirements for the distinguished level of achievement 8 under the foundation high school program as determined under 9 Section 28.025; 10 have submitted a free application for federal 11 (C) student aid (FAFSA); 12 [are exempt under Section 51.3062(p) or (q) 13 (D) 14 from administration of an assessment instrument under Section 15 51.3062 or have performed successfully on an assessment instrument under Section 51.3062; 16 17 [(E)] graduate from high school; (E) [(F)] graduate from an institution of higher 18 19 education; and <u>(F)</u> [<del>(G)</del>] have 20 taken college entrance examinations and the average score of those students on the 21 examinations; 22 23 must cover a period of at least five years; and (3) 24 (4) may be directed at district students at any level of primary or secondary education. 25 SECTION 4. Section 39.0233(b), Education Code, is amended 26 27 to read as follows:

The [In addition to the questions adopted under 1 (b) Subsection (a), the] agency shall adopt a series of questions to be 2 included in an end-of-course assessment instrument administered 3 under Section 39.023(c) to be used for purposes of identifying 4 5 students who are likely to succeed in an advanced high school course. A school district shall notify a student who performs at a 6 high level on the questions adopted under this subsection and the 7 8 student's parent or guardian of the student's performance and potential to succeed in an advanced high school course. A school 9 10 district may not require a student to perform at a particular level on the questions adopted under this subsection in order to be 11 eligible to enroll in an advanced high school course. 12

13 SECTION 5. Sections 39.053(c) and (c-2), Education Code, 14 are amended to read as follows:

15 (c) School districts and campuses must be evaluated based on 16 five domains of indicators of achievement adopted under this 17 section that include:

standard as determined under Section 39.0241, the percentage of 1 who performed satisfactorily 2 students on the assessment 3 instruments, aggregated across grade levels by subject area; and 4 (B) assessment instruments required under 5 Section 39.023(b), aggregated across grade levels by subject area, including the percentage of students who performed satisfactorily 6 on the assessment instruments, as determined by the performance 7 8 standard adopted by the agency, aggregated across grade levels by subject area; 9

1 regarding the creation of a high school personal graduation plan under Section 28.02121, the distinguished level of achievement 2 described by Section 28.025(b-15), each endorsement described by 3 Section 28.025(c-1), college readiness standards, and potential 4 5 career choices and the education needed to enter those careers; and (C) any additional indicators of 6 student 7 achievement not associated with performance on standardized 8 assessment instruments determined appropriate for consideration by the commissioner in consultation with educators, parents, business 9 10 and industry representatives, and employers; and

(5) in the fifth domain, three programs or specific categories of performance related to community and student engagement locally selected and evaluated as provided by Section 39.0546.

A rule or policy of a state agency, including the Texas 2 (c) Higher Education Coordinating Board, in effect on June 1, 2011, 3 that requires reporting by a university system or an institution of 4 5 higher education has no effect on or after September 1, 2013, unless the rule or policy is affirmatively and formally readopted before 6 that date by formal administrative rule published in the Texas 7 8 Register and adopted in compliance with Chapter 2001, Government Code. This subsection does not apply to: 9

27 Sec. 315.004. ADULT EDUCATION ASSESSMENT. The commission

1 shall, in consultation with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and the Texas Education Agency, review the standardized 2 3 assessment mechanism required under Section 315.002(a)(7) and recommend any changes necessary to [align the assessment with the 4 assessments designated under Section 51.3062, Education Code, to] 5 allow for the proper placement of a student in an adult basic 6 education course or to provide the student with the proper 7 8 [developmental or] English as a second language coursework, as appropriate. 9

SECTION 10. The following provisions of the Education Code are repealed:

15 (4) Section 61.07611.

SECTION 11. This Act applies beginning with the 2017 fall semester.

18 SECTION 12. This Act takes effect immediately if it 19 receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each 20 house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. 21 If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate 22 effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2017.
