## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

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- 2 relating to the authority of the Cancer Prevention and Research
- 3 Institute of Texas to administer the Texas Cancer Clinical Trials
- 4 Program.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 6 SECTION 1. (a) This Act shall be known as the Improve
- 7 Patient Access to Cancer Clinical Trials Act.
- 8 (b) The legislature finds that:
- 9 (1) the ability to translate medical findings from
- 10 research to practice relies largely on having robust patient
- 11 participation and a diverse participation pool during cancer
- 12 clinical trials;
- 13 (2) diverse patient participation in cancer clinical
- 14 trial depends, in part, on whether a participant can afford
- 15 ancillary costs like transportation and lodging during the course
- 16 of the patient's participation;
- 17 (3) there are significant health disparities that
- 18 exist among socioeconomic, racial, ethnic, and regional groups in
- 19 Texas; and
- 20 (4) this disparity threatens one of the most basic
- 21 ethical underpinnings of clinical research, the requirements that
- 22 the benefits of research be made available equitably among all
- 23 eligible individuals.
- 24 (c) It is the intent of the legislature to:

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- 1 (1) establish a program in the state that encourages
- 2 greater patient access to cancer clinical trials;
- 3 (2) assist patients facing financial barriers that
- 4 inhibit their participation in cancer clinical trials, or assist
- 5 patients who have been identified as priorities for health services
- 6 to participate in cancer clinical trials by reimbursing direct
- 7 patient incurred expenses; and
- 8 (3) ensure these trials are widely accessible, improve
- 9 the development of therapies, and enhance innovation.
- 10 SECTION 2. Chapter 102.051, Health and Safety Code, is
- 11 amended to read as follows:
- 12 Sec. 102.051. POWERS AND DUTIES. (a) The institute:
- 13 (1) may make grants to provide funds to public or
- 14 private persons to implement the Texas Cancer Plan, and may make
- 15 grants to institutions of learning and to advanced medical research
- 16 facilities and collaborations in this state for:
- 17 (A) research into the causes of and cures for all
- 18 types of cancer in humans;
- 19 (B) facilities for use in research into the
- 20 causes of and cures for cancer;
- 21 (C) research, including translational research,
- 22 to develop therapies, protocols, medical pharmaceuticals, or
- 23 procedures for the cure or substantial mitigation of all types of
- 24 cancer in humans; and
- (D) cancer prevention and control programs in
- 26 this state to mitigate the incidence of all types of cancer in
- 27 humans; and

- 1 (E) programs to encourage access to and
- 2 participation in clinical trials and associated research and
- 3 <u>community outreach.</u>
- 4 (2) may support institutions of learning and advanced
- 5 medical research facilities and collaborations in this state in all
- 6 stages in the process of finding the causes of all types of cancer
- 7 in humans and developing cures, from laboratory research to
- 8 clinical trials and including programs to address the problem of
- 9 access to advanced cancer treatment;
- 10 (3) may establish the appropriate standards and
- 11 oversight bodies to ensure the proper use of funds authorized under
- 12 this chapter for cancer research and facilities development;
- 13 (4) may employ necessary staff to provide
- 14 administrative support;
- 15 (5) shall continuously monitor contracts and
- 16 agreements authorized by this chapter and ensure that each grant
- 17 recipient complies with the terms and conditions of the grant
- 18 contract;
- 19 (6) shall ensure that all grant proposals comply with
- 20 this chapter and rules adopted under this chapter before the
- 21 proposals are submitted to the oversight committee for approval;
- 22 and
- 23 (7) shall establish procedures to document that the
- 24 institute, its employees, and its committee members appointed under
- 25 this chapter comply with all laws and rules governing the peer
- 26 review process and conflicts of interest.
- 27 (b) The institute shall work to implement the Texas Cancer

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- 1 Plan and continually monitor and revise the Texas Cancer Plan as
- 2 necessary.
- 3 (c) The institute shall employ a chief compliance officer to
- 4 monitor and report to the oversight committee regarding compliance
- 5 with this chapter and rules adopted under this chapter.
- 6 (d) The chief compliance officer shall:
- 7 (1) ensure that all grant proposals comply with this
- 8 chapter and rules adopted under this chapter before the proposals
- 9 are submitted to the oversight committee for approval; and
- 10 (2) attend and observe the meetings of the program
- 11 integration committee to ensure compliance with this chapter and
- 12 rules adopted under this chapter.
- SECTION 3. Chapter 102.155, Health and Safety Code, is
- 14 amended to read as follows:
- Sec. 102.155. AD HOC ADVISORY COMMITTEE. (a) The oversight
- 16 committee shall create an ad hoc committees of experts to address
- 17 issues including childhood cancers and access to clinical trials.
- 18 The oversight committee, as necessary, may create additional ad hoc
- 19 committees of experts to advise the oversight committee on issues
- 20 relating to cancer.
- 21 (b) Ad hoc committee members shall serve for a period
- 22 determined by the oversight committee.
- SECTION 4. Chapter 102.203, Health and Safety Code, is
- 24 amended to read as follows:
- Sec. 102.203. AUTHORIZED USE OF FUNDS. (a) A person
- 26 awarded money from the cancer prevention and research fund or from
- 27 bond proceeds under this subchapter may use the money for research

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- 1 consistent with the purpose of this chapter and in accordance with a
- 2 contract between the person and the institute.
- 3 (b) Except as otherwise provided by this section, money
- 4 awarded under this subchapter may be used for authorized expenses,
- 5 including honoraria, salaries and benefits, travel, conference
- 6 fees and expenses, consumable supplies, other operating expenses,
- 7 contracted research and development, capital equipment, and
- 8 construction or renovation of state or private facilities, and
- 9 financial assistance for costs related to participation in
- 10 clinical trials such as transportation and lodging.
- 11 (c) A person receiving money under this subchapter for
- 12 cancer research may not spend more than five percent of the money
- 13 for indirect costs. For purposes of this subsection, "indirect
- 14 costs" means the expenses of doing business that are not readily
- 15 identified with a particular grant, contract, project, function, or
- 16 activity, but are necessary for the general operation of the
- 17 organization or the performance of the organization's activities.
- 18 (d) Not more than five percent of the money awarded under
- 19 this subchapter may be used for facility purchase, construction,
- 20 remodel, or renovation purposes during any year. Expenditures of
- 21 money awarded under this subchapter for facility purchase,
- 22 construction, remodel, or renovation projects must benefit cancer
- 23 prevention and research.
- (e) Not more than 10 percent of the money awarded under this
- 25 subchapter may be used for cancer prevention and control programs
- 26 during any year.
- 27 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect September 1, 2017.
