10	Sec. 3923.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
11	(1) "Board" means the district's board of directors.
12	(2) "City" means the City of Houston.
13	(3) "County" means Harris County.
14	(4) "Director" means a board member.
15	(5) "District" means the East Houston Management
16	District.
17	Sec. 3923.002. CREATION AND NATURE OF DISTRICT. The
18	district is a special district created under Section 59, Article
19	XVI, Texas Constitution.
20	Sec. 3923.003. CONFIRMATION ELECTION REQUIRED. (a) On
21	receipt of a petition signed by a majority of the owners of real
22	property in the district according to the most recent certified tax
23	appraisal roll for the county, the initial board shall hold an
24	election to confirm the creation of the district in the manner

1	provided by Subchapter D, Chapter 49, Water Code.
2	(b) The board may not issue bonds or other obligations
3	unless the creation of the district is confirmed as provided by this
4	section.
5	Sec. 3923.004. PURPOSE; LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS. (a) The
6	creation of the district is essential to accomplish the purposes of
7	Sections 52 and 52-a, Article III, and Section 59, Article XVI,
8	Texas Constitution, and other public purposes stated in this
9	chapter. By creating the district and in authorizing the city and
10	other political subdivisions to contract with the district, the
11	legislature has established a program to accomplish the public
12	purposes set out in Section 52-a, Article III, Texas Constitution.
13	(b) The creation of the district is necessary to promote,
14	develop, encourage, and maintain employment, commerce,
15	transportation, housing, tourism, recreation, the arts,
16	entertainment, economic development, safety, and the public
17	welfare in the district.
18	(c) The district is created to supplement and not to
19	supplant city services provided in the district.
20	Sec. 3923.005. FINDINGS OF BENEFIT AND PUBLIC PURPOSE. (a)
21	The district is created to serve a public use and benefit.
22	(b) All land and other property included in the district
23	will benefit from the improvements and services to be provided by
24	the district under powers conferred by Sections 52 and 52-a,
25	Article III, and Section 59, Article XVI, Texas Constitution, and
26	other powers granted under this chapter.
27	(c) The creation of the district is in the public interest

1 and is essential to further the public purposes of: 2 (1) developing and diversifying the economy of the 3 state; 4 (2) eliminating unemployment and underemployment; 5 (3) developing or expanding transportation and 6 commerce; and 7 (4) providing quality residential housing. 8 (d) The district will: 9 (1) promote the health, safety, and general welfare of residents, employers, potential employees, employees, visitors, 10 and consumers in the district, and of the public; 11 12 (2) provide needed funding for the district to preserve, maintain, and enhance the economic health and vitality of 13 the district territory as a residential community and business 14 15 center; and 16 (3) promote the health, safety, welfare, and enjoyment 17 of the public by providing pedestrian ways and by landscaping, removing graffiti from, and developing certain areas in the 18 19 district, which are necessary for the restoration, preservation, and enhancement of scenic beauty. 20 21 (e) Pedestrian ways along or across a street, whether at 22 grade or above or below the surface, and street lighting, street landscaping, vehicle parking, and street art objects are parts of 23 24 and necessary components of a street and are considered to be an improvement project that includes a street or road improvement. 25 26 (f) The district will not act as the agent or instrumentality of any private interest even though the district 27

1 will benefit many private interests as well as the public. 2 Sec. 3923.006. DISTRICT TERRITORY. (a) The district is 3 initially composed of the territory described by Section 2 of the Act enacting this chapter. 4 5 (b) The boundaries and field notes contained in Section 2 of the Act enacting this chapter form a closure. A mistake in the 6 7 field notes or in copying the field notes in the legislative process does not affect the district's: 8 9 (1) organization, existence, or validity; 10 (2) right to issue any type of bond for the purposes for which the district is created or to pay the principal of and 11 12 interest on a bond; 13 (3) right to impose or collect an assessment or tax; or 14 (4) legality or operation. 15 Sec. 3923.007. ELIGIBILITY FOR INCLUSION IN SPECIAL ZONES. (a) All or any part of the area of the district is eligible to be 16 17 included in: 18 (1) a tax increment reinvestment zone created under 19 Chapter 311, Tax Code; 20 (2) a tax abatement reinvestment zone created under Chapter 312, Tax Code; 21 22 (3) an enterprise zone created under Chapter 2303, 23 Government Code; or 24 (4) an industrial district created under Chapter 42, Local Government Code. 25 26 (b) If the city creates a tax increment reinvestment zone described by Subsection (a), the city and the board of directors of 27

1 the zone, by contract with the district, may grant money deposited 2 in the tax increment fund to the district to be used by the district 3 for the purposes permitted for money granted to a corporation under Section 380.002(b), Local Government Code, including the right to 4 5 pledge the money as security for any bonds issued by the district for an improvement project. A project may not receive public funds 6 7 under Section 380.002(b), Local Government Code, unless the project 8 has been approved by the governing body of the city. 9 Sec. 3923.008. APPLICABILITY OF MUNICIPAL MANAGEMENT DISTRICTS LAW. Except as otherwise provided by this chapter, 10 Chapter 375, Local Government Code, applies to the district. 11 12 Sec. 3923.009. CONSTRUCTION OF CHAPTER. This chapter shall be liberally construed in conformity with the findings and purposes 13 stated in this chapter. 14 15 SUBCHAPTER B. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Sec. 3923.051. GOVERNING BODY; TERMS. The district is governed by a board of 11 directors who serve staggered terms of four years, with five or six directors' terms expiring June 1 of each odd-numbered year.

## 20Sec. 3923.052. QUALIFICATIONS OF DIRECTORS APPOINTED BY21CITY. To be qualified to serve as a director, a person must be:

22 (1) a resident of the district who is also a registered 23 <u>voter of the district;</u> 24 (2) an owner of stock or a partnership or membership 25 <u>interest</u>, whether beneficial or otherwise, of a corporate

3	Sec. 3923.053. APPOINTMENT OF DIRECTORS; COMPOSITION OF
4	BOARD. (a) The governing body of the city shall appoint directors
5	from qualified persons recommended by the board.
6	(b) In making appointments under this section, the
7	governing body of the city shall ensure that:
8	(1) eight positions on the board are occupied by
9	persons described by Section 3923.052(2) or (3); and
10	(2) three positions on the board are occupied by
11	persons described by Section 3923.052(1).
12	Sec. 3923.054. VACANCY. If a vacancy occurs on the board,
13	the remaining directors shall appoint a qualified director for the
14	remainder of the unexpired term.
15	Sec. 3923.055. DIRECTOR'S OATH OR AFFIRMATION. (a) A
16	director shall file the director's oath or affirmation of office
17	with the district, and the district shall retain the oath or
18	affirmation in the district records.
19	(b) A director shall file a copy of the director's oath or
20	affirmation with the secretary of the city.
21	Sec. 3923.056. QUORUM. A vacant director position is not
22	counted for purposes of establishing a quorum.
23	Sec. 3923.057. OFFICERS. The board shall elect from among
24	the directors a chair, a vice chair, and a secretary. The offices
25	of chair and secretary may not be held by the same person.
26	Sec. 3923.058. COMPENSATION; EXPENSES. (a) The district
27	may compensate each director in an amount not to exceed \$50 for each

board meeting. The total amount of compensation a director may 1 receive each year may not exceed \$2,000. 2 (b) A director is entitled to reimbursement for necessary 3 and reasonable expenses incurred in carrying out the duties and 4 5 responsibilities of the board. 6 Sec. 3923.059. LIABILITY INSURANCE. The district may obtain 7 and pay for comprehensive general liability insurance coverage from a commercial insurance company or other source that protects and 8 insures a director against personal liability and from all claims 9 10 relating to: (1) actions taken by the director in the director's 11 12 capacity as a member of the board; (2) actions and activities taken by the district; or 13 14 (3) the actions of others acting on behalf of the 15 district. Sec. 3923.060. NO EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. The board may not 16 17 create an executive committee to exercise the powers of the board. Sec. 3923.061. BOARD MEETINGS. The board shall hold 18 meetings at a place accessible to the public. 19 Sec. 3923.062. INITIAL DIRECTORS. (a) The initial board 20 includes: 21 22 Pos. 20	Sec. 3923.101. GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES. The district has
21	the powers and duties necessary to accomplish the purposes for
22	which the district is created.
23	Sec. 3923.102. IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS AND SERVICES. The
24	district may provide, design, construct, acquire, improve,
25	relocate, operate, maintain, or finance an improvement project or
26	service using money available to the district, or contract with a
27	governmental or private entity to provide, design, construct,

LOCATION OF IMPROVEMENT PROJECT. An 5 improvement project described by Section 3923.102 may be located: 6 (1) in the district; or 7 (2) in an area outside but adjacent to the district if 8 the project is for the purpose of extending a public infrastructure improvement beyond the district's boundaries to a logical terminus. 9 10 Sec. 3923.104. DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION POWERS. The district, using money available to the district, may exercise the 11 12 powers given to a development corporation under Chapter 505, Local Government Code, including the power to own, operate, acquire, 13 construct, lease, improve, or maintain a project under that 14 15 chapter. Sec. 3923.105. NONPROFIT CORPORATION. (a) The board by 16 17 resolution may authorize the creation of a nonprofit corporation to assist and act for the district in implementing a project or 18 19 providing a service authorized by this chapter. (b) The nonprofit corporation: 20 21 (1) has each power of and is considered to be a local government corporation created under Subchapter D, Chapter 431, 22 23 Transportation Code; and 24 (2) may implement any project and provide any service authorized by this chapter. 25 26 (c) The board shall appoint the board of directors of the nonprofit corporation. The board of directors of the nonprofit 27

No. 4271 1 corporation shall serve in the same manner as the board of directors 2 of a local government corporation created under Subchapter D, Chapter 431, Transportation Code, except that a board member is not 3 required to reside in the district. 4 Sec. 3923.106. AGREEMENTS; GRANTS. (a) As provided by 5 Chapter 375, Local Government Code, the district may make an 6 7 agreement with or accept a gift, grant, or loan from any person. (b) The implementation of a project is a governmental 8 function or service for the purposes of Chapter 791, Government 9 10 Code. Sec. 3923.107. LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES. To protect the 11 12 public interest, the district may contract with a qualified party, including the county or the city, to provide law enforcement 13 14 services in the district for a fee. Sec. 3923.108. MEMBERSHIP IN CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS. The 15 district may join and pay dues to a charitable or nonprofit 16 17 organization that performs a service or provides an activity consistent with the furtherance of a district purpose. 18 Sec. 3923.109. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT. (a) The district may 19 engage in activities that accomplish the economic development 20 purposes of the district. 21 22 (b) The district may establish and provide for the administration of one or more programs to promote state or local 23 24 economic development and to stimulate business and commercial activity in the district, including programs to: 25 26 (1) make loans and grants of public money; and 27 (2) provide district personnel and services.

1	(c) The district may create economic development programs
2	and exercise the economic development powers that:
3	(1) Chapter 380, Local Government Code, provides to a
4	<pre>municipality; and</pre>
5	(2) Subchapter A, Chapter 1509, Government Code,

7	Sec. 3923.110. CONCURRENCE ON ADDITIONAL POWERS. If the
8	legislature grants the district a power that is in addition to the
9	powers approved by the initial resolution of the governing body of
10	the city consenting to the creation of the district, the district
11	may not exercise that power unless the governing body of the city
12	consents to that change by resolution.
13	Sec. 3923.111. NO EMINENT DOMAIN POWER. The district may
14	not exercise the power of eminent domain.
15	SUBCHAPTER D. GENERAL FINANCIAL PROVISIONS; ASSESSMENTS
16	Sec. 3923.151. DISBURSEMENTS AND TRANSFERS OF MONEY. The
17	board by resolution shall establish the number of signatures and
18	the procedure required for a disbursement or transfer of the
19	district's money.
20	Sec. 3923.152. MONEY USED FOR IMPROVEMENTS OR SERVICES.
21	The district may acquire, construct, finance, operate, or maintain
22	an improvement project or service authorized under this chapter or
23	Chapter 375, Local Government Code, using any money available to
24	the district.
25	Sec. 3923.153. GENERAL POWERS REGARDING PAYMENT OF DISTRICT
26	BONDS, OBLIGATIONS, OR OTHER COSTS. The district may provide or
27	secure the payment or repayment of any bond, note, or other

No. 4271 1 temporary or permanent obligation or reimbursement or other 2 contract with any person and the costs and expenses of the 3 establishment, administration, and operation of the district and 4 the district's costs or share of the costs or revenue of an 5 improvement project or district contractual obligation or 6 indebtedness by: 7 (1) the imposition of an ad valorem tax or sales and 8 use tax or an assessment, user fee, concession fee, or rental 9 charge; or 10 (2) any other revenue or resources of the district, or other revenue authorized by the city, including revenues from a tax 11 12 increment reinvestment zone created by the city under applicable 13 law. 14 Sec. 3923.154. PETITION REQUIRED FOR FINANCING SERVICES AND IMPROVEMENTS WITH ASSESSMENTS. (a) The board may not finance a 15 16 service or improvement project with assessments under this chapter 17 unless a written petition requesting that service or improvement has been filed with the board. 18 19 (b) The petition must be signed by the owners of a majority 20 of the assessed value of real property in the district subject to 21 assessment according to the most recent certified tax appraisal 22 roll for the county. 23 Sec. 3923.155. ASSESSMENTS; LIENS FOR ASSESSMENTS. (a) The board by resolution may impose and collect an assessment for any 24 25 purpose authorized by this chapter in all or any part of the 26 district. 27 (b) An assessment, a reassessment, or an assessment

1 the city. 2 Sec. 3923.158. COSTS FOR IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS. The district may undertake separately or jointly with other persons, 3 including the city or county, all or part of the cost of an 4 5 improvement project, including an improvement project: 6 (1) for improving, enhancing, and supporting public 7 safety and security, fire protection and emergency medical 8 services, and law enforcement in or adjacent to the district; or 9 (2) that confers a general benefit on the entire 10 district or a special benefit on a definable part of the district. Sec. 3923.159. TAX AND ASSESSMENT ABATEMENTS. The district 11 12 may designate reinvestment zones and may grant abatements of a tax 13 or assessment on property in the zones. SUBCHAPTER E. TAXES AND BONDS 14 15 Sec. 3923.201. TAX ABATEMENT. The district may enter into a tax abatement agreement in accordance with the general laws of this 16 17 state authorizing and applicable to a tax abatement agreement by a municipality. 18 19 Sec. 3923.202. PROPERTY TAX AUTHORIZED. (a) The district 20 may impose an ad valorem tax on all taxable property in the district 21 to: 22 (1) pay for an improvement project of the types authorized by Section 52(b), Article III, and Section 59, Article 23 24 XVI, Texas Constitution; or 25 (2) secure the payment of bonds issued for a purpose 26 described by Subdivision (1). 27 (b) The district may not impose an ad valorem tax to pay for

Sec. 3923.203. SALES AND USE TAX. (a) The district may impose a sales and use tax if authorized by a majority of the voters of the district voting at an election called for that purpose. Revenue from the tax may be used for any purpose for which ad valorem tax revenue of the district may be used.

17 (b) The district may not adopt a sales and use tax if as a 18 result of the adoption of the tax the combined rate of all sales and 19 use taxes imposed by the district and other political subdivisions 20 of this state having territory in the district would exceed two 21 percent at any location in the district.

(c) If the voters of the district approve the adoption of the tax at an election held on the same election date on which another political subdivision adopts a sales and use tax or approves an increase in the rate of its sales and use tax and as a result the combined rate of all sales and use taxes imposed by the district and other political subdivisions of this state having

BONDS AND OTHER OBLIGATIONS. (a) The 5 district may issue, by public or private sale, bonds, notes, or other obligations payable wholly or partly from ad valorem taxes, 6 7 sales and use taxes, or assessments in the manner provided by Subchapter A, Chapter 372, or Subchapter J, Chapter 375, Local 8 Government Code. 9 10 (b) In exercising the district's borrowing power, the district may issue a bond or other obligation in the form of a bond, 11 12 note, certificate of participation or other instrument evidencing a proportionate interest in payments to be made by the district, or 13 14 other type of obligation. (c) In addition to the sources of money described by 15 Subchapter A, Chapter 372, and Subchapter J, Chapter 375, Local 16 17 Government Code, district bonds may be secured and made payable wholly or partly by a pledge of any part of the money the district 18 19 receives from improvement revenue or from any other source. Sec. 3923.205. BOND MATURITY. Bonds may mature not more 20 than 40 years from their date of issue. 21 Sec. 3923.206. TAXES FOR BONDS AND OTHER OBLIGATIONS. 22 At the time bonds or other obligations payable wholly or partly from ad 23 24 valorem taxes are issued: (1) the board shall impose a continuing direct annual 25

26 ad valorem tax for each year that all or part of the bonds are 27 outstanding; and

10	Sec. 3923.251. DISSOLUTION BY CITY ORDINANCE. (a) The city
11	by ordinance may dissolve the district.
12	(b) The city may not dissolve the district until the
13	district's outstanding debt or contractual obligations that are
14	payable from ad valorem taxes have been repaid or discharged, or the
15	city has affirmatively assumed the obligation to pay the
16	outstanding debt from city revenue.
17	Sec. 3923.252. DISSOLUTION BY BOARD OR PETITION. (a)
18	Except as provided by Subsection (b), the board:
19	(1) may dissolve the district; and
20	(2) shall dissolve the district on receipt of a
21	written petition requesting dissolution signed by a majority of the
22	owners of real property in the district.
23	(b) The board may not dissolve the district until the
24	district's outstanding indebtedness or contractual obligations
25	that are payable from ad valorem taxes have been repaid or
26	discharged, or the city has affirmatively assumed the obligation to
27	pay the outstanding debt from city revenue.

Sec. 3923.253. COLLECTION OF ASSESSMENTS AND OTHER REVENUE.
(a) If the dissolved district has bonds or other obligations
outstanding secured by and payable from assessments or other
revenue, other than ad valorem taxes, the city shall succeed to the
rights and obligations of the district regarding enforcement and
collection of the assessments or other revenue.
(b) The city shall have and exercise all district powers to

8 enforce and collect the assessments or other revenue to pay:

9 <u>(1) the bonds or other obligations when due and</u> 10 payable according to their terms; or

11 (2) special revenue or assessment bonds or other 12 obligations issued by the city to refund the outstanding bonds or 13 obligations.

(a)</u> 15 <u>After the district is dissolved, the city assumes, subject to the</u> 16 <u>appropriation and availability of funds, the obligations of the</u> 17 <u>district, including any bonds or other debt payable from</u> 18 <u>assessments or other district revenue.</u>

19 (b) After the district is dissolved, the board shall 20 transfer ownership of all district property to the city.

SECTION 2. The East Houston Management District initially includes all the territory contained in the following area: The described area is +/- 2,438 acres (3.81 sq. miles) in size and is centered on Market Street and N. Wayside Drive in East Houston. The area is generally bounded by N. McCarty St., Amtrak Rail Spur

26 and MNCW Railway on the east, Clinton Dr. & Greater East End 27 District on the south, Southern Pacific Railway on the west and

1 Wallisville Rd. on the north.

2 Beginning at a point where the right-of-way (ROW) centerline of 3 Wallisville Road intersects with the ROW centerline of N. McCarty 4 St. then southwest and south along ROW centerline of N. McCarty 5 St. to a point west of northwest corner of 12.85 acre tract (ABST 8 6 J BROWN TR 15);

7 Then east along north boundary of said 12.85 acre tract, 0.8562 acre 8 tract (GLENDALE TR 25A-1), and 6.8903 acre tract (GLENDALE TRS 9 25C-2 & 29D & 29H) to west easement of HB&T rail spur;

17 SECTION 3. (a) The legal notice of the intention to introduce this Act, setting forth the general substance of this 18 19 Act, has been published as provided by law, and the notice and a copy of this Act have been furnished to all persons, agencies, 20 officials, or entities to which they are required to be furnished 21 under Section 59, Article XVI, Texas Constitution, and Chapter 313, 22 Government Code. 23

(b) The governor, one of the required recipients, has
submitted the notice and Act to the Texas Commission on
Environmental Quality.

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(c) The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has filed

1 its recommendations relating to this Act with the governor, 2 lieutenant governor, and speaker of the house of representatives 3 within the required time.

4 (d) The general law relating to consent by political
5 subdivisions to the creation of districts with conservation,
6 reclamation, and road powers and the inclusion of land in those
7 districts has been complied with.

8 (e) All requirements of the constitution and laws of this 9 state and the rules and procedures of the legislature with respect 10 to the notice, introduction, and passage of this Act have been 11 fulfilled and accomplished.

SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2017.
