## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1-16 WHEREAS, The Texas population is growing rapidly, and the 1-17 number of health care providers is not keeping pace; and 1-18 WHEREAS, Almost 70 percent of Texas counties were wholly or

1-18 WHEREAS, Almost 70 percent of Texas counties were wholly of 1-19 partially designated as primary care Health Professional Shortage 1-20 Areas in 2015; and

1-21 WHEREAS, The Texas Legislature and governor approved \$53 1-22 million for graduate medical education funding in the 84th 1-23 Legislative Session to help address this shortage; and

1-24 WHEREAS, Before that investment, the Texas Higher Education 1-25 Coordinating Board projected that, by 2016, more than 100 Texas 1-26 medical school graduates would not have an opportunity to remain in 1-27 state for their residency training due to a lack of first-year 1-28 residency positions; and

1-29 WHEREAS, In 2015, Texas medical schools awarded 1,692 doctor 1-30 of medicine and doctor of osteopathic medicine degrees, and the 1-31 state opened two new medical schools in 2016, and an additional four 1-32 medical schools may be created in the near future; and

1-33 WHEREAS, This new growth in the number of medical school 1-34 graduates will all but nullify or outstrip the legislature's recent 1-35 efforts to expand graduate medical education and further hinder 1-36 Texas' efforts to achieve the goal of 1.1 residency positions for 1-37 each medical school graduate; now, therefore, be it

1-38 RESOLVED, That the 85th Legislature of the State of Texas 1-39 hereby express its support for prioritizing a substantial increase 1-40 in funding for graduate medical education before it considers 1-41 authorizing the creation and support of additional medical schools 1-42 in our state; and, be it further

1-43 RESOLVED, That the Texas Legislature charge the Texas Higher 1-44 Education Coordinating Board to work with institutions of higher 1-45 education and the medical community to achieve the 1.1 to 1 goal for 1-46 graduate medical education; and, be it further
