## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, The G. J. Sutton State Office Complex in San Antonio served state agencies and the wider community for many years; and WHEREAS, The facility's namesake, Garlington Jerome Sutton, became the first African American elected official in Bexar County in 1948, when he was chosen as a member of the San Antonio Union

- 6 Junior College District Board of Trustees; he was later elected to
- 7 the Texas House of Representatives in 1972, earning the distinction
- 8 of becoming the inaugural representative of District 57-E and the
- 9 first African American in the legislature from the Alamo City;
- 10 during his tenure, he served as chair of the Texas Legislative Black
- 11 Caucus and proposed the acquisition of a new state office building,
- 12 which was later named in his honor in 1982; he passed away on June
- 13 22, 1976, at the age of 67; and
- 14 WHEREAS, In the fall of 2013, the complex was closed after
- 15 significant structural problems were discovered during maintenance
- 16 improvements; the property, however, remains highly desirable for
- 17 its location in a designated historic zone; and
- WHEREAS, G. J. Sutton was not only a pillar of his community
- 19 but also a trailblazer for African Americans in public service, and
- 20 it is essential that this property continue bearing his name so that
- 21 current and future generations are able to more fully appreciate
- 22 his achievements; now, therefore, be it
- 23 RESOLVED, That the 85th Legislature of the State of Texas
- 24 hereby urge all future owners of the property on which the
