## RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, A passionate advocate for social justice and civil 2 rights for the poor and disenfranchised, Cesar Chavez was a true 3 American hero, and the anniversary of his birth provides a fitting 4 opportunity to remember and honor his many contributions; and

5 WHEREAS, Born on March 31, 1927, near Yuma, Arizona, Cesar 6 Chavez was 10 years old when his family lost their farm in the Great 7 Depression and became migrant farmworkers; throughout his youth and 8 into his adulthood, Mr. Chavez traveled across the Southwest, 9 laboring in the fields and vineyards and attending more than 30 10 different schools by the time he was in the eighth grade; and

11 WHEREAS, After serving in the U.S. Navy for two years, he 12 returned home to marry Helen Fabela, whom he had met while working 13 in the vineyards of central California; settling with his wife in 14 the East San Jose barrio of Sal Si Puedes, he returned to farming to 15 support his young family; and

16 WHEREAS, Witnessing firsthand the hardships and injustices 17 of farmworker life, Mr. Chavez joined the Community Service 18 Organization, a prominent Latino civil rights group, in 1952; while 19 with the CSO, he coordinated voter registration drives and 20 conducted campaigns against racial and economic discrimination; in 21 the late 1950s and early 1960s, he served as the CSO's national 22 director; and

23 WHEREAS, Determined to create an organization that would 24 protect and serve farmworkers, he resigned from the CSO in 1962,

leaving the security of a regular paycheck, and moved with his wife and eight children to Delano, where he founded the first successful farmworkers union in American history; originally called the National Farm Workers Association, the organization later became known as the United Farm Workers of America; and

WHEREAS, For more than three decades, Mr. Chavez led this 6 7 groundbreaking organization by effecting change through peaceful 8 tactics such as fasts, boycotts, strikes, and pilgrimages; his union's efforts influenced and inspired millions of Americans, 9 forging a diverse national coalition of students, middle-class 10 consumers, religious groups, and minorities in a hard-fought 11 12 struggle to achieve fair wages, medical coverage, pension benefits, humane living conditions, and perhaps most important, dignity and 13 14 respect for the hundreds of thousands of farmworkers across the 15 country; and

16 WHEREAS, In 1994, a year after his death on April 23, 1993, 17 his widow accepted the Presidential Medal of Freedom, America's 18 highest civilian honor, on behalf of her late husband; since his 19 death, communities across the nation have chosen to pay homage to 20 Mr. Chavez by naming schools, parks, streets, and libraries, as 21 well as scholarships and awards, in his honor; and

22 WHEREAS, His motto in life, "si se puede," or "it can be 23 done," embodies the legacy that Cesar Chavez has left for the 24 world's benefit, and his principles of equality, justice, and 25 dignity for all Americans remain as essential and as relevant today 26 as they were when he began his important life's work; now, 27 therefore, be it
