RESOLUTION

- 1 WHEREAS, Pest control businesses incur many costs to comply
- 2 with Texas Department of Agriculture regulations; and
- 3 WHEREAS, In a single year, a two-person pest control
- 4 operation will easily spend more than \$3,000 on compliance costs;
- 5 for instance, a business with a Certified Applicator and an
- 6 apprentice working toward technician status would need to pay not
- 7 only for the appropriate licenses but also for classes, liability
- 8 insurance, inspections, recordkeeping, criminal background checks,
- 9 and other requirements; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Businesses that do not comply with TDA regulations
- 11 can expect to incur much lower expenses than those that do;
- 12 scofflaws may receive a mere warning, and if they do receive a
- 13 penalty for operating without a license or without insurance, the
- 14 amount will likely prove less than the cost of meeting
- 15 requirements; moreover, the final penalty may be lowered further or
- 16 not collected at all; and
- WHEREAS, Failure to enforce regulations provides incentives
- 18 for businesses to ignore the law, raising public health and safety
- 19 concerns and creating a competitive advantage for such businesses;
- 20 in order to ensure compliance and level the playing field,
- 21 regulations and enforcement policies must be more effective and
- 22 better aligned; now, therefore, be it
- 23 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 85th Texas
- 24 Legislature hereby request the speaker to direct the House

- 1 Agriculture and Livestock Committee to conduct an interim study
- 2 reviewing the rules, regulations, and enforcement authority of the
- 3 Texas Department of Agriculture's Structural Pest Control Service;
- 4 and, be it further
- 5 RESOLVED, That the committee submit a full report, including
- 6 its findings and recommendations, to the House of Representatives
- 7 of the 86th Texas Legislature before it convenes in January 2019.
