## RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, Cannabidiol and cannabidiol-rich plants (CRP) are

2 recognized as important components in treatment for countless

3 patients; however, these substances have been banned at the federal

4 level by the Controlled Substances Act because they are included

5 under the definition of "marijuana"; and

6 WHEREAS, Cannabidiol is a substance derived from Cannabis

7 sativa L., a CRP with a tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) concentration of

8 not more than 0.3 percent on a dry weight basis; and

9 WHEREAS, During the 84th Texas Legislature, Senate Bill 339,

10 which allowed physicians to prescribe low-THC cannabis to patients

11 diagnosed with intractable epilepsy, was signed into law by

12 Governor Greg Abbott, who at the time emphasized that low-THC

13 cannabis does not produce the high associated with smoking

14 marijuana and that permitting the substance should not be viewed as

15 a precursor to a broader legalization of marijuana; the bill,

16 commonly known as the "Texas Compassionate Use Act," noted that the

17 administration of cannabidiol by means other than smoking has been

18 the only successful treatment of seizures for many patients with

19 epilepsy; and

20 WHEREAS, While marijuana is prohibited under the Controlled

21 Substances Act, evidence suggests that using an extract of

22 cannabidiol from CRPs is a remarkably safe option in providing

23 relief for individuals afflicted by seizures caused by epilepsy;

24 now, therefore, be it
