BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 1-21 1-22 1-23 SECTION 1. Subtitle B, Title 3, Occupations Code, amended by adding Chapter 170 to read as follows: 1-24 CHAPTER 170. PRESCRIPTION OF OPIOID ANTAGONISTS 1-25 Sec. 170.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter, "opioid antagonist" and "opioid-related drug overdose" have the meanings 1-26 1-27 assigned by Section 483.101, Health and Safety Code. 1-28 Sec. 170.002. GUIDELINES. (a) The board 1-29 shall 1-30 guidelines for the prescription of opioid antagonists. (b) The guidelines must address:

Sec. 170.003. LIABILITY FOR ACT OR OMISSION WITH RESPECT TO 1-46 1-47 PRESCRIBING AN OPIOID ANTAGONIST. A physician who acts in good 1-48 faith and with reasonable care, regardless of whether the physician 1-49 1-50 follows the guidelines adopted under this chapter, is not subject or civil liability or any professional disciplinary 1-51 criminal 1-52 action for: 1-53 (1)prescribing or failing to prescribe an opioid 1-54 antagonist; or any outcome resulting from 1-55 (2) the eventual administration of an opioid antagonist prescribed by the physician. SECTION 2. 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in effect on the date the conduct occurred, and the former law is continued in effect for that purpose.

SECTION 3. The change in law made by this Act relating to conduct that is the basis for civil liability applies only to conduct that occurs on or after September 1, 2017. Conduct that occurs before September 1, 2017, is governed by the law in effect on the date the conduct occurred, and the former law is continued in effect for that purpose.

SECTION 4. The change in law made by this Act relating to conduct that constitutes a criminal offense applies only to an offense committed on or after September 1, 2017. For purposes of this section, an offense is committed before September 1, 2017, if any element of the offense occurs before that date. An offense committed before September 1, 2017, is governed by the law in effect on the date the offense was committed, and the former law is continued in effect for that purpose.

SECTION 5. This Act takes effect September 1, 2017.

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
