S.B. No. 1208

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT 2 relating to the licensing of certain facilities, homes, and 3 agencies that provide child-care services. Δ BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: SECTION 1. Section 109.331(d), Alcoholic Beverage Code, is 5 6 amended to read as follows: 7 (d) This section does not apply to a [foster group home, foster family home, specialized child-care [agency 8 group] home, or agency foster home as those terms are defined by 9 10 Section 42.002, Human Resources Code. SECTION 2. Section 29.081(d), Education Code, is amended to 11 12 read as follows: (d) For purposes of this section, "student at risk of 13 dropping out of school" includes each student who is under 26 years 14 15 of age and who: was not advanced from one grade level to the next 16 (1)for one or more school years; 17 if the student is in grade 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, or 12, 18 (2) 19 did not maintain an average equivalent to 70 on a scale of 100 in two or more subjects in the foundation curriculum during a semester in 20 21 the preceding or current school year or is not maintaining such an 22 average in two or more subjects in the foundation curriculum in the current semester; 23 24 (3) did not perform satisfactorily on an assessment

1 instrument administered to the student under Subchapter B, Chapter
2 39, and who has not in the previous or current school year
3 subsequently performed on that instrument or another appropriate
4 instrument at a level equal to at least 110 percent of the level of
5 satisfactory performance on that instrument;

6 (4) if the student is in prekindergarten, 7 kindergarten, or grade 1, 2, or 3, did not perform satisfactorily on 8 a readiness test or assessment instrument administered during the 9 current school year;

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(5) is pregnant or is a parent;

(6) has been placed in an alternative education program in accordance with Section 37.006 during the preceding or current school year;

14 (7) has been expelled in accordance with Section 15 37.007 during the preceding or current school year;

16 (8) is currently on parole, probation, deferred 17 prosecution, or other conditional release;

(9) was previously reported through the Public
Education Information Management System (PEIMS) to have dropped out
of school;

(10) is a student of limited English proficiency, as
defined by Section 29.052;

(11) is in the custody or care of the Department of <u>Family and</u> Protective [and Regulatory] Services or has, during the current school year, been referred to the department by a school official, officer of the juvenile court, or law enforcement official;

(12) is homeless, as defined by 42 U.S.C. Section
 2 11302, and its subsequent amendments; or

3 (13) resided in the preceding school year or resides 4 in the current school year in a residential placement facility in 5 the district, including a detention facility, substance abuse 6 treatment facility, emergency shelter, psychiatric hospital, 7 halfway house, <u>cottage home operation</u>, <u>specialized child-care</u> 8 <u>home</u>, or general residential operation [foster group home].

9 SECTION 3. Section 101.0133, Family Code, is amended to 10 read as follows:

Sec. 101.0133. FOSTER CARE. 11 "Foster care" means the placement of a child who is in the conservatorship of the Department 12 13 of Family and Protective Services and in care outside the child's home in a residential child-care facility, including an [agency 14 foster group home,] agency foster home, specialized child-care 15 16 [foster group] home, cottage [foster] home operation, general residential operation, or another facility licensed or certified 17 under Chapter 42, Human Resources Code, in which care is provided 18 for 24 hours a day. 19

20 SECTION 4. Section 101.017, Family Code, is amended to read 21 as follows:

22 Sec. 101.017. LICENSED CHILD PLACING AGENCY. "Licensed 23 child placing agency" means a person, including an organization or 24 corporation, licensed or certified under Chapter 42, Human 25 Resources Code, by the Department of Family and Protective Services 26 to place a child in <u>an adoptive home or a residential child-care</u> 27 <u>facility, including</u> a child-care facility, agency foster home,

1 cottage home operation, or general residential operation [agency
2 foster group home, or adoptive home].

3 SECTION 5. Section 262.011, Family Code, as added by 4 Chapter 338 (H.B. 418), Acts of the 84th Legislature, Regular 5 Session, 2015, is amended to read as follows:

6 Sec. 262.011. PLACEMENT IN SECURE AGENCY FOSTER HOME [OR 7 SECURE AGENCY FOSTER GROUP HOME]. A court in an emergency, initial, 8 or full adversary hearing conducted under this chapter may order 9 that the child who is the subject of the hearing be placed in a 10 secure agency foster home [or secure agency foster group home] 11 verified in accordance with Section 42.0531, Human Resources Code, 12 if the court finds that:

13 (1) the placement is in the best interest of the child;14 and

15 (2) the child's physical health or safety is in danger 16 because the child has been recruited, harbored, transported, 17 provided, or obtained for forced labor or commercial sexual 18 activity, including any child subjected to an act specified in 19 Section 20A.02 or 20A.03, Penal Code.

20 SECTION 6. Section 263.008(a)(1), Family Code, is amended 21 to read as follows:

(1) "Agency foster [group] home[-]" and ["agency
foster home,"] "facility[-]" ["foster group home," and "foster
home"] have the meanings assigned by Section 42.002, Human
Resources Code.

26 SECTION 7. Section 263.008(e), Family Code, is amended to 27 read as follows:

1 (e) An [agency foster group home,] agency foster home[, 2 foster group home, foster home,] or other residential child-care 3 facility in which a child is placed in foster care shall provide a 4 copy of the foster children's bill of rights to a child on the 5 child's request. The foster children's bill of rights must be 6 printed in English and in a second language.

7 SECTION 8. Section 264.0111(a), Family Code, is amended to 8 read as follows:

9 (a) A child for whom the department has been appointed 10 managing conservator and who has been placed by the department in a 11 <u>residential</u> [foster home or] child-care facility [institution] as 12 defined by Chapter 42, Human Resources Code, is entitled to keep any 13 money earned by the child during the time of the child's placement.

14 SECTION 9. Sections 264.751(1) and (3), Family Code, are 15 amended to read as follows:

(1) "Designated caregiver" means an individual who has
a longstanding and significant relationship with a child for whom
the department has been appointed managing conservator and who:

(A) is appointed to provide substitute care for the child, but is not [licensed by the department or] verified by a licensed child-placing agency [or the department] to operate <u>an</u> [a foster home, foster group home,] agency foster home[, or agency foster group home] under Chapter 42, Human Resources Code; or

(B) is subsequently appointed permanent managing
 conservator of the child after providing the care described by
 Paragraph (A).

27 (3) "Relative caregiver" means a relative who:

(A) provides substitute care for a child for whom the department has been appointed managing conservator, but who is not [licensed by the department or] verified by a licensed child-placing agency [or the department] to operate an [a foster home, foster group home,] agency foster home[, or agency foster group home] under Chapter 42, Human Resources Code; or

(B) is subsequently appointed permanent managing
conservator of the child after providing the care described by
Paragraph (A).

10 SECTION 10. Section 264.760, Family Code, is amended to 11 read as follows:

Sec. 264.760. ELIGIBILITY FOR FOSTER CARE PAYMENTS AND 12 PERMANENCY CARE ASSISTANCE. Notwithstanding any other provision of 13 this subchapter, a relative or other designated caregiver who 14 15 becomes [licensed by the department or] verified by a licensed 16 child-placing agency [or the department] to operate an [a foster home, foster group home, agency foster home[, or agency foster 17 group home] under Chapter 42, Human Resources Code, may receive 18 foster care payments in lieu of the benefits provided by this 19 subchapter, beginning with the first month in which the relative or 20 other designated caregiver becomes licensed or is verified. 21

22 SECTION 11. Section 264.8521, Family Code, is amended to 23 read as follows:

Sec. 264.8521. NOTICE TO APPLICANTS. At the time a person applies to become [licensed by the department or] verified by a licensed child-placing agency [or the department] to provide foster care in order to qualify for the permanency care assistance

1 program, the department or the child-placing agency shall:

2 (1) notify the applicant that a background check,
3 including a criminal history record check, will be conducted on the
4 individual; and

5 (2) inform the applicant about criminal convictions 6 that:

7 (A) preclude an individual from becoming a
8 [licensed foster home or] verified agency foster home; and

9 (B) may also be considered in evaluating the 10 individual's application.

11 SECTION 12. Section 531.151(3), Government Code, is amended 12 to read as follows:

13 (3) "Institution" means:

14 (A) an ICF-IID, as defined by Section 531.002,
15 Health and Safety Code;

(B) a group home operated under the authority of the <u>commission</u> [Department of Aging and Disability Services], including a residential service provider under a Medicaid waiver program authorized under Section 1915(c) of the federal Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. Section 1396n), as amended, that provides services at a residence other than the child's home or <u>agency</u> foster home;

23 (C) [a foster group home or an agency foster 24 group home as defined by Section 42.002, Human Resources Code;

25 [(D)] a nursing facility;
26 <u>(D)</u> [(E)] a general residential operation for
27 children with an intellectual disability that is licensed by the

1 <u>commission</u> [Department of Family and Protective Services]; or
2 <u>(E)</u> [(F)] another residential arrangement other
3 than a foster home as defined by Section 42.002, Human Resources
4 Code, that provides care to four or more children who are unrelated
5 to each other.

6 SECTION 13. Section 31.002(b), Human Resources Code, is 7 amended to read as follows:

8 (b) In this chapter, the term "dependent child" also applies9 to a child:

10 (1) who meets the specifications set forth in 11 Subsections (a)(1)-(4);

12 (2) who has been removed from the home of a relative 13 specified in Subsection (a)(5) as a result of a judicial 14 determination that the child's residence there is contrary to his 15 or her welfare;

16 (3) whose placement and care are the responsibility of 17 the Department of Family and Protective Services or an agency with 18 which the Department of Family and Protective Services has entered 19 into an agreement for the care and supervision of the child;

20 (4) who has been placed in a <u>residential</u> [foster home
21 or] child-care facility [institution] by the Department of Family
22 and Protective Services; and

(5) for whom the state may receive federal funds for the purpose of providing foster care in accordance with rules promulgated by the executive commissioner.

26 SECTION 14. Section 31.008(d), Human Resources Code, is 27 amended to read as follows:

(d) The commission may make payments on behalf of a
 dependent child residing in a <u>residential</u> [foster family home or a]
 child-care <u>facility</u> [institution] in accordance with the
 provisions of this chapter and commission rules.

5 SECTION 15. Section 42.002, Human Resources Code, is 6 amended by amending Subdivisions (4), (5), (6), (10), (11), (12), 7 (13), and (19) and adding Subdivision (24) to read as follows:

8 (4) "General residential operation" means a 9 child-care facility that provides care for <u>seven or</u> more [than 12] 10 children for 24 hours a day, including facilities known as 11 [children's homes, halfway houses,] residential treatment 12 centers[7] <u>and emergency shelters</u>[7, and therapeutic camps].

(5) <u>"Continuum-of-care residential operation" means a</u> group of residential child-care facilities that operate under the same license or certification to provide a continuum of services to <u>children</u> ["Foster group home" means a child-care facility that provides care for 7 to 12 children for 24 hours a day].

18 (6) "<u>Cottage</u> [Foster] home <u>operation</u>" means <u>cottage</u> 19 <u>family homes that:</u>

20(A) are identified on the operation's license;21(B) share a child-care administrator who is22responsible for oversight for all homes within the operation; and23(C) are all in or near the same location as24defined by department rule [a child-care facility that provides25care for not more than six children for 24 hours a day].26(10)"Cottage family home" means a family residential

27 setting with one or more homes operating under the license of a

1 cottage home operation and in which:

2 (A) each home has at least one houseparent who
3 lives at the home while children are in care; and

(B) based on the size of the home and the
children's needs, each home cares for not more than six children
["Agency foster group home" means a facility that provides care for
seven to 12 children for 24 hours a day, is used only by a licensed
child-placing agency, and meets department standards].

9 (11) "Agency foster home" means a facility that 10 provides care for not more than six children for 24 hours a day, is 11 used only by a licensed child-placing agency <u>or continuum-of-care</u> 12 <u>residential operation</u>, and meets department standards.

(12) "Child-placing agency" means a person, including an organization, other than the natural parents or guardian of a child who plans for the placement of or places a child in a child-care facility, agency foster home, [agency foster group home,] or adoptive home.

(13) "Facilities" includes child-care facilities,
[and] child-placing agencies, and continuum-of-care residential
operations.

(19) "Residential child-care facility" 21 means а facility licensed or certified by the department that operates for 22 all of the 24-hour day. The term includes general residential 23 24 operations, child-placing agencies, specialized child-care [foster 25 group] homes, cottage home operations [foster homes], continuum-of-care residential operations [agency foster group 26 27 homes], and agency foster homes.

S.B. No. 1208 1 (24) "Specialized child-care home" means a child-care 2 facility that: (A) based on the size of the home and the 3 children's needs, provides care for not more than six children for 4 <u>24 hours a d</u>ay; and 5 6 (B) has a director and has at least one 7 houseparent who lives at the home while children are in care. SECTION 16. Subchapter A, Chapter 42, Human Resources Code, 8 9 is amended by adding Section 42.0031 to read as follows: 10 Sec. 42.0031. REFERENCE TO PART OF CONTINUUM-OF-CARE OPERATION. With respect to a continuum-of-care operation, a 11 reference in this code or in any other law to a type of residential 12 13 child-care facility that is a part of a continuum-of-care operation shall be construed as a reference to that portion of the 14 continuum-of-care operation, and the department may take all 15 16 regulatory action with respect to the continuum-of-care operation that the department could take with respect to the type of 17 residential child-care facility, as further specified 18 in department rule. 19 SECTION 17. Section 42.041(b), Human Resources Code, 20 is amended to read as follows: 21 22 This section does not apply to: (b) a state-operated facility; 23 24 (2) an agency foster home [or agency foster aroup 25 home]; a facility that is operated in connection with a 26 (3) 27 shopping center, business, religious organization, or

1 establishment where children are cared for during short periods 2 while parents or persons responsible for the children are attending 3 religious services, shopping, or engaging in other activities, 4 including retreats or classes for religious instruction, on or near 5 the premises, that does not advertise as a child-care facility or 6 day-care center, and that informs parents that it is not licensed by 7 the state;

8 (4) a school or class for religious instruction that 9 does not last longer than two weeks and is conducted by a religious 10 organization during the summer months;

11 (5) a youth camp licensed by the Department of State 12 Health Services;

13 (6) a facility licensed, operated, certified, or14 registered by another state agency;

an educational facility that is accredited by the 15 (7)16 Texas Education Agency, the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, or an accreditation body that is a member of the Texas 17 Private School Accreditation Commission and that operates 18 primarily for educational purposes for prekindergarten and above, a 19 20 before-school or after-school program operated directly by an educational before-school 21 accredited facility, or а or after-school program operated by another entity under contract with 22 the educational facility, if the Texas Education Agency, the 23 24 Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, or the other accreditation body, as applicable, has approved the curriculum 25 content of the before-school or after-school program operated under 26 27 the contract;

1 an educational facility that operates solely for (8) 2 educational purposes for prekindergarten through at least grade two, that does not provide custodial care for more than one hour 3 4 during the hours before or after the customary school day, and that is a member of an organization that promulgates, publishes, and 5 requires compliance with health, safety, fire, and sanitation 6 7 standards equal to standards required by state, municipal, and county codes; 8

9 (9) a kindergarten or preschool educational program 10 that is operated as part of a public school or a private school 11 accredited by the Texas Education Agency, that offers educational 12 programs through grade six, and that does not provide custodial 13 care during the hours before or after the customary school day;

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(10) a family home, whether registered or listed;

15 (11)an educational facility that is integral to and 16 inseparable from its sponsoring religious organization or an educational facility both of which do not provide custodial care 17 for more than two hours maximum per day, and that offers an 18 of following: 19 educational program in one or more the 20 prekindergarten through at least grade three, elementary grades, or 21 secondary grades;

(12) an emergency shelter facility, other than a facility that would otherwise require a license as a child-care facility under this section, that provides shelter or care to a minor and the minor's child or children, if any, under Section 32.201, Family Code, if the facility:

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(A) is currently under a contract with a state or

1 federal agency; or

2 (B) meets the requirements listed under Section
3 51.005(b)(3);

4 (13)a juvenile detention facility certified under Section 51.12, Family Code, a juvenile correctional facility 5 certified under Section 51.125, Family Code, a juvenile facility 6 7 providing services solely for the Texas Juvenile Justice Department, or any other correctional facility for children 8 9 operated or regulated by another state agency or by a political 10 subdivision of the state;

11 (14) an elementary-age (ages 5-13) recreation program 12 operated by a municipality provided the governing body of the 13 municipality annually adopts standards of care by ordinance after a public hearing for such programs, that such standards are provided 14 15 to the parents of each program participant, and that the ordinances 16 shall include, at a minimum, staffing ratios, minimum staff qualifications, minimum facility, health, and safety standards, 17 and mechanisms for monitoring and enforcing the adopted local 18 standards; and further provided that parents be informed that the 19 20 program is not licensed by the state and the program may not be advertised as a child-care facility; 21

(15) an annual youth camp held in a municipality with a population of more than 1.5 million that operates for not more than three months and that has been operated for at least 10 years by a nonprofit organization that provides care for the homeless;

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(16)

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(A) serves an evening meal to children two years

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a food distribution program that:

1 of age or older; and

(B) is operated by a nonprofit food bank in a
nonprofit, religious, or educational facility for not more than two
hours a day on regular business days;

5 (17) a child-care facility that operates for less than 6 three consecutive weeks and less than 40 days in a period of 12 7 months;

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(18) a program:

9 (A) in which a child receives direct instruction 10 in a single skill, talent, ability, expertise, or proficiency;

(B) that does not provide services or offerings that are not directly related to the single talent, ability, expertise, or proficiency;

14 (C) that does not advertise or otherwise 15 represent that the program is a child-care facility, day-care 16 center, or licensed before-school or after-school program or that 17 the program offers child-care services;

(D) that informs the parent or guardian:
(i) that the program is not licensed by the
state; and

(ii) about the physical risks a child mayface while participating in the program; and

(E) that conducts background checks for all
 program employees and volunteers who work with children in the
 program using information that is obtained from the Department of
 Public Safety;

27 (19) an elementary-age (ages 5-13) recreation program

1 that: standards 2 (A) adopts of care, including standards relating to staff ratios, staff training, health, and 3 4 safety; 5 provides a mechanism for monitoring and (B) enforcing the standards and receiving complaints from parents of 6 7 enrolled children; (C) does not advertise as or otherwise represent 8 9 the program as a child-care facility, day-care center, or licensed 10 before-school or after-school program or that the program offers 11 child-care services; 12 (D) informs parents that the program is not 13 licensed by the state; is organized as a nonprofit organization or 14 (E) 15 is located on the premises of a participant's residence; 16 (F) does not accept any remuneration other than a 17 nominal annual membership fee; 18 (G) does not solicit donations as compensation or payment for any good or service provided as part of the program; and 19 20 (H) conducts background checks for all program employees and volunteers who work with children in the program 21 using information that is obtained from the Department of Public 22 23 Safety; 24 living arrangement (20)а in a caretaker's home involving one or more children or a sibling group, excluding 25 children who are related to the caretaker, in which the caretaker: 26 27 (A) had a prior relationship with the child or

sibling group or other family members of the child or sibling group; 1 2 (B) does not care for more than one unrelated child or sibling group; 3 4 (C) does not receive compensation or solicit donations for the care of the child or sibling group; and 5 6 (D) has a written agreement with the parent to 7 care for the child or sibling group; living arrangement in a caretaker's home 8 (21)а 9 involving one or more children or a sibling group, excluding children who are related to the caretaker, in which: 10 11 (A) the department is the managing conservator of the child or sibling group; 12 13 (B) the department placed the child or sibling group in the caretaker's home; and 14 15 (C) the caretaker had a long-standing and 16 significant relationship with the child or sibling group before the child or sibling group was placed with the caretaker; 17 18 (22) a living arrangement in a caretaker's home involving one or more children or a sibling group, excluding 19 20 children who are related to the caretaker, in which the child is in the United States on a time-limited visa under the sponsorship of 21 the caretaker or of a sponsoring organization; [or] 22 (23) a facility operated by a nonprofit organization 23 24 that: 25 (A) does not otherwise operate as a child-care facility that is required to be licensed under this section; 26 27 (B) provides emergency shelter and care for not

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1 more than 15 days to children 13 years of age or older but younger 2 than 18 years of age who are victims of human trafficking alleged 3 under Section 20A.02, Penal Code;

4 (C) is located in a municipality with a 5 population of at least 600,000 that is in a county on an 6 international border; and

7 (D) meets one of the following criteria:

8 (i) is licensed by, or operates under an 9 agreement with, a state or federal agency to provide shelter and 10 care to children; or

11 (ii) meets the eligibility requirements for 12 a contract under Section 51.005(b)(3); or

13 (24) a facility that provides respite care exclusively 14 for a local mental health authority under a contract with the local 15 mental health authority.

16 SECTION 18. Section 42.042, Human Resources Code, is 17 amended by amending Subsections (e-1), (g), and (h-1) and adding 18 Subsection (s) to read as follows:

(e-1) The department may not prohibit possession of lawfully permitted firearms and ammunition in [a foster home of any type, including a foster group home, a foster home, an agency foster group home, and] an agency foster home. Minimum standards may be adopted under this section relating to safety and proper storage of firearms and ammunition, including standards requiring firearms and ammunition to be stored separately in locked locations.

26 (g) In promulgating minimum standards the executive 27 commissioner may recognize and treat differently the types of

services provided by the following: 1 2 (1)registered family homes; (2) child-care facilities, including 3 general 4 residential operations, cottage home operations [foster group homes], specialized child-care [foster] homes, group day-care 5 homes, and day-care centers; 6 7 (3) child-placing agencies; agency foster homes; 8 (4) continuum-of-care residential operations [agency 9 (5) foster group homes]; 10 11 (6) before-school or after-school programs; and 12 (7) school-age programs. (h-1) The 13 executive commissioner shall adopt rules 14 governing: 15 (1)the placement and care of children by а 16 child-placing agency, as necessary to ensure the health and safety of those children; 17 18 (2) the verification and monitoring of agency foster homes $[\tau - agency foster group homes_{\tau}]$ and adoptive homes by a 19 20 child-placing agency; and if appropriate, child-placing agency staffing 21 (3) 22 levels, office locations, and administration. (s) A continuum-of-care residential operation shall ensure 23 that each residential child-care facility operating under the 24 25 operation's license complies with this chapter and any standards and rules adopted under this chapter that apply to the facility. 26 27 The executive commissioner by rule may prescribe the actions a

1 continuum-of-care residential operation must take to comply with
2 the minimum standards for each facility type.

3 SECTION 19. Section 42.0421(e), Human Resources Code, is 4 amended to read as follows:

5 In addition to other training required by this section, (e) the executive commissioner by rule shall require an owner, 6 7 operator, or employee of a day-care center, group day-care home, registered family home, general residential operation, cottage 8 9 home operation [foster group home], or specialized child-care [agency foster group] home who transports a child under the care of 10 11 the facility whose chronological or developmental age is younger than nine years of age to complete at least two hours of annual 12 13 training on transportation safety.

SECTION 20. Section 42.044(e), Human Resources Code, is amended to read as follows:

16 (e) In addition to the department's responsibility to 17 investigate an agency foster home [or agency foster group home] 18 under Subsection (c), the department shall:

19 (1) periodically conduct inspections of a random
20 sample of agency foster homes [and agency foster group homes];

(2) investigate any report of a serious incident in an
agency foster home [or agency foster group home] that pertains to a
child under the age of six;

(3) investigate any alleged violation of a minimum
standard by an agency foster home [or agency foster group home] that
poses a high degree of risk to a child in the care of the home who is
under the age of six; and

1 (4) conduct at least one annual enforcement team 2 conference for each child-placing agency to thoroughly review the 3 investigations or inspections of the child-placing agency and all 4 of its agency <u>foster</u> homes to monitor and enforce compliance by a 5 child-placing agency with rules and standards established under 6 Section 42.042.

7 SECTION 21. Section 42.0448, Human Resources Code, is
8 amended to read as follows:

Sec. 42.0448. NOTIFICATION OF FAMILY VIOLENCE CALLS. 9 The child-placing shall notify a 10 department agency or а 11 continuum-of-care residential operation that includes а child-placing agency of each family violence report the department 12 13 receives under Article 5.05, Code of Criminal Procedure, that:

14 (1) occurred at an agency foster home [verified by the 15 child-placing agency]; or

16 (2) involves a person who resides at an agency foster
17 home [verified by the child-placing agency].

18 SECTION 22. Section 42.0449, Human Resources Code, is 19 amended to read as follows:

Sec. 42.0449. REQUIRED ACTIONS AFTER NOTICE OF FAMILY 20 VIOLENCE CALL. 1 [licensed foster home or] verified agency foster home.

2 SECTION 23. Section 42.045(d), Human Resources Code, is 3 amended to read as follows:

4 (d) <u>A</u> [An independent foster home and a] child-placing agency shall notify the department of any change of address for an 5 [a licensed foster home or a verified] agency foster home. 6 The 7 [independent foster home and] child-placing agency shall notify the department of the address change within the earlier of two business 8 days or 72 hours of the date the agency foster home changes its 9 address. 10

Before the department may issue a license or certificate 3 (a) 4 for the operation or the expansion of the capacity [of a foster group home or foster family home that is located in a county with a 5 population of less than 300,000 and that provides child care for 24 6 7 hours a day at a location other than the actual residence of a child's primary caretaker or] of a general residential operation, a 8 cottage home operation, or a continuum-of-care residential 9 operation that is located in a county with a population of less than 10 11 300,000, the applicant for the license, certificate, or expansion 12 shall, at the applicant's expense:

(1) conduct a public hearing on the application in accordance with department rules after notifying the department of the date, time, and location of the hearing; and

16 (2) publish notice of the application in a newspaper 17 of general circulation in the community in which the child-care 18 services are proposed to be provided.

provided by an interested party directly to the department's

(3) granting the application would have a significant adverse impact on the community and would limit opportunities for social interaction for the children proposed to be served by the applicant.

5 (b) The operator of a licensed agency shall display a copy 6 of the license in a prominent place in the agency foster home [or 7 agency foster group home] used by the agency.

14 (c) A secure agency foster home [or secure agency foster

16 (1) mental health and other services specifically 17 designed to assist children who are victims of trafficking under 18 Section 20A.02 or 20A.03, Penal Code, including:

19 (A) victim and family counseling; behavioral health care; 20 (B) (C) treatment and intervention for 21 sexual 22 assault; (D) education tailored to the child's needs; 23 24 (E) life skills training; 25 (F) mentoring; and 26 (G) substance abuse screening and treatment as 27 needed;

(2) individualized services based on the trauma
 endured by a child, as determined through comprehensive assessments
 of the service needs of the child;

(3) 24-hour services; and

5 (4) appropriate security through facility design,
6 hardware, technology, and staffing.

7 SECTION 34. Sections 42.0535(a), (b), (d), and (e), Human 8 Resources Code, are amended to read as follows:

9 (a) A child-placing agency that seeks to verify an agency 10 <u>foster</u> home [or an agency group home] shall request background 11 information about the agency <u>foster</u> home [or group home] from a 12 child-placing agency that has previously verified <u>the home as an</u> 13 [that] agency <u>foster</u> home or agency <u>foster</u> group home.

(b) Notwithstanding Section 261.201, Family Code, a child-placing agency that has verified an agency <u>foster</u> home or an agency <u>foster</u> group home is required to release to another child-placing agency background information requested under Subsection (a).

(d) For purposes of this section, background information means the home study under which the agency <u>foster</u> home or agency <u>foster</u> group home was verified by the previous child-placing agency and any record of noncompliance with state minimum standards received and the resolution of any such noncompliance by the previous child-placing agency.

(e) The executive commissioner by rule shall develop a process by which a child-placing agency shall report to the department:

(1) the name of any <u>agency</u> [verified] foster home [or
 foster group home] that has been closed for any reason, including a

SECTION 35. Sections 42.054(a), (b), (d), and (g), Human Resources Code, are amended to read as follows:

13 (a) The department shall charge an applicant а nonrefundable application fee for an initial license to operate a 14 child-placing agency, or a child-care facility, [or] а 15 continuum-of-care residential operation. 16

(b) The department shall charge each child-care facility a fee for an initial license. The department shall charge each child-placing agency <u>and continuum-of-care residential operation</u> a fee for an initial license.

(d) The department shall charge each licensed child-placing agency <u>and continuum-of-care residential operation</u> an annual license fee. 12 (3) [(4)] a family home listed under Section 42.0523 13 in which the relative child-care provider cares for the child in the 14 child's own home.

15 SECTION 36. Section 42.0561, Human Resources Code, is 16 amended to read as follows:

17 Sec. 42.0561. INFORMATION RELATING ТО FAMILY VIOLENCE 18 REPORTS. Before [the department may issue <u>license or</u> registration for a foster home or] a child-placing agency may issue 19 20 a verification certificate for an agency foster home, the [department or] child-placing agency must obtain information 21 relating to each family violence report at the applicant's 22 residence to which a law enforcement agency responded during the 12 23 24 months preceding the date of the application. The applicant shall 25 provide the information on a form prescribed by the department.

26 SECTION 37. Section 42.063(d), Human Resources Code, is 27 amended to read as follows:

1 (d) An employee or volunteer of a general residential 2 operation, child-placing agency, <u>continuum-of-care residential</u> 3 <u>operation, cottage home operation</u> [foster home], or <u>specialized</u> 4 <u>child-care</u> [foster group] home shall report any serious incident 5 directly to the department if the incident involves a child under 6 the care of the operation, agency, or home.

7 SECTION 38. Sections 42.0461(f) and (g), Human Resources
8 Code, are repealed.

9 SECTION 39. Subject to an appropriation of funds for this 10 purpose, the executive commissioner of the Health and Human 11 Services Commission shall adopt minimum standards related to 12 continuum-of-care operations, cottage home operations, and 13 specialized child-care homes as provided by Section 42.042, Human 14 Resources Code, as amended by this Act, as soon as practicable after 15 the effective date of this Act.

16 SECTION 40. (a) The executive commissioner of the Health 17 and Human Services Commission shall develop and implement a 18 procedure by which a residential child-care facility that holds a 19 license or certification issued under Chapter 42, Human Resources 20 Code, may convert the license or certification to a new type of 21 residential child-care facility license or certification created 22 by this Act.

(b) With respect to a residential child-care facility converting a license or certification under Subsection (a) of this section, the Health and Human Services Commission may waive requirements for an initial inspection, an initial background and criminal history check, or a family violence report, or for notice

and hearing if the commission determines that previous inspections, 1 2 background and criminal history checks, family violence reports, or notice and hearing, as applicable, were conducted and 3 are 4 sufficient to ensure the safety of children receiving care at the residential child-care facility converting 5 а license or certification. 6

7 SECTION 41. (a) The executive commissioner of the Health and Human Services Commission shall develop and implement a 8 9 procedure that requires a foster home or a foster group home that holds a license issued by the Department of Family and Protective 10 11 Services under Chapter 42, Human Resources Code, before September 1, 2017, to convert the license to another residential child-care 12 13 facility license issued under Chapter 42, Human Resources Code, or 14 relinquish the license.

15 (b) With respect to a foster home or foster group home 16 converting a license under Subsection (a) of this section, the Health and Human Services Commission may waive requirements for an 17 initial inspection, an initial background and criminal history 18 check, or a family violence report, or for notice and hearing if the 19 20 commission determines that previous inspections, background and criminal history checks, family violence reports, or notice and 21 hearing, as applicable, were conducted and are sufficient to ensure 22 the safety of children receiving care at the foster home or foster 23 24 group home converting a license or certification.

(c) The Department of Family and Protective Services may not issue a license or certification to a foster home or foster group home after August 31, 2017.

1 (d) A foster home or a foster group home that was licensed by 2 the department before September 1, 2017, may continue to operate 3 under the law as it existed immediately before the effective date of 4 this Act, and that law is continued in effect for that purpose, 5 until each foster home and foster group home has been converted to 6 another residential child-care facility license or the license has 7 been relinquished.

The executive commissioner of the Health SECTION 42. (a) 8 9 and Human Services Commission shall develop and implement a procedure that requires a child-placing agency that verified, 10 11 before September 1, 2017, an agency foster group home according to the Minimum Standards for Child-Placing Agencies to convert the 12 13 agency foster group home to an agency foster home or to close the 14 agency foster group home.

15 (b) With respect to a child-placing agency converting an 16 agency foster group home under Subsection (a) of this section, the Health and Human Services Commission may waive requirements for an 17 initial inspection, an initial background and criminal history 18 check, or a family violence report, if the commission determines 19 20 that previous inspections, background and criminal history checks, or family violence reports, as applicable, were conducted and are 21 22 sufficient to ensure the safety of children receiving care at the agency foster home. 23

24 (c) A child-placing agency may not verify an agency foster25 group home after August 31, 2017.

26 (d) An agency foster group home that was verified by a 27 child-placing agency before September 1, 2017, may continue to

operate under the child-placing agency that verified the home and under the law as it existed immediately before the effective date of this Act, and that law is continued in effect for that purpose, until each agency foster group home has been converted to a verified foster home or has been closed.
