4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subtitle C, Title 5, Business & Commerce Code, is
6	amended by adding Chapter 113 to read as follows:
7	CHAPTER 113. BUSINESS ENTITIES PROVIDING ASSISTANCE ANIMALS
8	Sec. 113.001. DEFINITION. In this chapter, "assistance
9	animal" has the meaning assigned by Section 121.002, Human
10	Resources Code.
11	Sec. 113.002. REQUIREMENTS FOR BUSINESS ENTITIES PROVIDING
12	ASSISTANCE ANIMALS. A business entity that provides, by sale or
13	donation, assistance animals shall:
14	(1) provide an average of 30 or more hours of
15	one-on-one training over a 90-day or longer period to each
16	assistance animal provided by the entity;
17	(2) obtain a wellness verification from a licensed
18	veterinarian during the period described by Subdivision (1) for
19	each assistance animal provided by the entity;
20	(3) maintain an in-house residential facility in which
21	each individual using an assistance animal provided by the entity
22	stays for 10 or more days while receiving at least 30 hours of
23	training with the assistance animal;
24	(4) ensure that each assistance animal provided by the

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1 entity has passed the American Kennel Club Canine Good Citizen 2 test, or a test having standards substantially similar to the standards of the American Kennel Club Canine Good Citizen test in 3 effect on September 1, 2017; and 4 5 (5) make available follow-up services to each 6 individual using an assistance animal provided by the entity for 7 the life of the assistance animal. 8 Sec. 113.003. CIVIL PENALTY; INJUNCTION. (a) A business entity that violates a provision of this chapter is liable to the 9 10 state for a civil penalty in an amount not to exceed \$500 for each separate violation and, in the case of a continuing violation, an 11 12 amount not to exceed \$500 for each subsequent day on which the 13 violation occurs. 14 (b) The attorney general or an appropriate prosecuting 15 attorney may sue to collect a civil penalty under this section. (c) The attorney general may bring an action in the name of 16 17 the state to restrain or enjoin a violation or threatened violation 18 of this chapter. Sec. 113.004. CIVIL LIABILITY. (a) A business entity that 19 sells an assistance animal to a person in violation of this chapter 20 is liable to the person for the amount the person paid for the 21 22 assistance animal. (b) A person who prevails in an action brought under this 23 24 section is also entitled to recover court costs and reasonable 25 attorney's fees. 26 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2017.

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
