A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT relating to nonsubstantive additions to, revisions of, 2 and corrections in enacted codes, to the nonsubstantive codification or 3 4 disposition of various laws omitted from enacted codes, and to conforming codifications enacted by the 84th Legislature to other 5 6 Acts of that legislature. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 7 ARTICLE 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS 8 SECTION 1.001. This Act is enacted as part of the state's 9 10 continuing statutory revision program under Chapter 323, Government Code. This Act is a revision for purposes of Section 43, 11 12 Article III, Texas Constitution, and has the purposes of: 13 (1) codifying without substantive change or providing 14 for other appropriate disposition of various statutes that were 15 omitted from enacted codes; (2) conforming codifications enacted by the 84th 16 Legislature to other Acts of that legislature that amended the laws 17 codified or added new law to subject matter codified; 18 19 revising without substantive change provisions in (3) enacted codes; 20 21 (4) making necessary corrections to enacted codes; and 22 (5) renumbering or otherwise redesignating titles, chapters, and sections of codes that duplicate title, chapter, or 23 24 section designations.

1 SECTION 1.002. (a) The repeal of a statute by this Act does 2 not affect an amendment, revision, or reenactment of the statute by 3 the 85th Legislature, Regular Session, 2017. The amendment, 4 revision, or reenactment is preserved and given effect as part of 5 the code provision that revised the statute so amended, revised, or 6 reenacted.

7 (b) If any provision of this Act conflicts with a statute 8 enacted by the 85th Legislature, Regular Session, 2017, the statute 9 controls.

10 SECTION 1.003. (a) A transition or saving provision of a 11 law codified by this Act applies to the codified law to the same 12 extent as it applied to the original law.

(b) The repeal of a transition or saving provision by this Act does not affect the application of the provision to the codified law.

16 (c) In this section, "transition provision" includes any 17 temporary provision providing for a special situation in the 18 transition period between the existing law and the establishment or 19 implementation of the new law.

SECTION 1.004. (a) The repeal of a law, including a validating law, by this Act does not remove, void, or otherwise affect in any manner a validation under the repealed law. The validation is preserved and continues to have the same effect that it would have if the law were not repealed.

(b) Subsection (a) of this section does not diminish the
saving provisions prescribed by Section 311.031, Government Code.

ARTICLE 2. CHANGES RELATING TO AGRICULTURE CODE 1 2 SECTION 2.001. DEFINITIONS. In this <u>chapter</u> [subchapter]:

15 (2) "Coastal waters" means all the salt water of the 16 state, including the portion of the Gulf of Mexico that is within 17 the jurisdiction of the state.

18 (3) "Program" means the Texas shrimp marketing19 assistance program.

20 (4) "Shrimp marketing account" means the account in 21 the general revenue fund established under Section 77.002(b), Parks 22 and Wildlife Code.

(5) "Texas-produced shrimp" means wild-caught shrimp
 commercially harvested from coastal waters by a shrimp boat
 licensed by the Parks and Wildlife Department.

26 SECTION 2.004. Section 47.053(a), Agriculture Code, is 27 amended to conform to Section 2, Chapter 965 (H.B. 1903), Acts of

1 the 83rd Legislature, Regular Session, 2013, to read as follows:

2 (a) The commissioner shall appoint a shrimp advisory 3 committee to assist the commissioner in implementing the program 4 established under this <u>chapter</u> [subchapter] and in the expenditure 5 of funds appropriated for the purpose of this <u>chapter</u> [subchapter].

6 SECTION 2.005. Section 50D.021(e), Agriculture Code, is 7 amended to read as follows:

8 (e) Subject to Section 50D.026, <u>the</u> research committee is
9 subject to Chapters 551 and 2001, Government Code.

10 ARTICLE 3. CHANGES RELATING TO BUSINESS & COMMERCE CODE

SECTION 3.001. Section 17.46(b), Business & Commerce Code, as amended by Chapters 1023 (H.B. 1265) and 1080 (H.B. 2573), Acts of the 84th Legislature, Regular Session, 2015, is reenacted and amended to read as follows:

(b) Except as provided in Subsection (d) of this section, the term "false, misleading, or deceptive acts or practices" includes, but is not limited to, the following acts:

18 (1) passing off goods or services as those of another; 19 (2) causing confusion or misunderstanding as to the 20 source, sponsorship, approval, or certification of goods or 21 services;

(3) causing confusion or misunderstanding as to
 affiliation, connection, or association with, or certification by,
 another;

(4) using deceptive representations or designations
of geographic origin in connection with goods or services;

27 (5) representing that goods or services have

sponsorship, approval, characteristics, ingredients, uses,
 benefits, or quantities which they do not have or that a person has
 a sponsorship, approval, status, affiliation, or connection which
 the person does not;

5 (6) representing that goods are original or new if 6 they are deteriorated, reconditioned, reclaimed, used, or 7 secondhand;

8 (7) representing that goods or services are of a 9 particular standard, quality, or grade, or that goods are of a 10 particular style or model, if they are of another;

(8) disparaging the goods, services, or business of
another by false or misleading representation of facts;

(9) advertising goods or services with intent not to
14 sell them as advertised;

(10) advertising goods or services with intent not to supply a reasonable expectable public demand, unless the advertisements disclosed a limitation of quantity;

18 (11) making false or misleading statements of fact 19 concerning the reasons for, existence of, or amount of price 20 reductions;

(12) representing that an agreement confers or involves rights, remedies, or obligations which it does not have or involve, or which are prohibited by law;

(13) knowingly making false or misleading statements
 of fact concerning the need for parts, replacement, or repair
 service;

27 (14) misrepresenting the authority of a salesman,

1 representative or agent to negotiate the final terms of a consumer 2 transaction;

3 (15) basing a charge for the repair of any item in 4 whole or in part on a guaranty or warranty instead of on the value of 5 the actual repairs made or work to be performed on the item without 6 stating separately the charges for the work and the charge for the 7 warranty or guaranty, if any;

8 (16) disconnecting, turning back, or resetting the 9 odometer of any motor vehicle so as to reduce the number of miles 10 indicated on the odometer gauge;

11 (17) advertising of any sale by fraudulently 12 representing that a person is going out of business;

(18) advertising, selling, or distributing a card which purports to be a prescription drug identification card issued under Section 4151.152, Insurance Code, in accordance with rules adopted by the commissioner of insurance, which offers a discount on the purchase of health care goods or services from a third party provider, and which is not evidence of insurance coverage, unless:

(A) the discount is authorized under an agreement between the seller of the card and the provider of those goods and services or the discount or card is offered to members of the seller;

(B) the seller does not represent that the cardprovides insurance coverage of any kind; and

25 (C) the discount is not false, misleading, or 26 deceptive;

27 (19) using or employing a chain referral sales plan in

connection with the sale or offer to sell of goods, merchandise, or 1 2 anything of value, which uses the sales technique, plan, arrangement, or agreement in which the buyer or prospective buyer 3 4 is offered the opportunity to purchase merchandise or goods and in connection with the purchase receives the seller's promise or 5 representation that the buyer shall have the right to receive 6 7 compensation or consideration in any form for furnishing to the seller the names of other prospective buyers if receipt of the 8 9 compensation or consideration is contingent upon the occurrence of an event subsequent to the time the buyer purchases the merchandise 10 11 or goods;

(20) representing that a guaranty or warranty confers or involves rights or remedies which it does not have or involve, provided, however, that nothing in this subchapter shall be construed to expand the implied warranty of merchantability as defined in Sections 2.314 through 2.318 and Sections 2A.212 through 2A.216 to involve obligations in excess of those which are appropriate to the goods;

19 (21) promoting a pyramid promotional scheme, as 20 defined by Section 17.461;

(22) representing that work or services have been performed on, or parts replaced in, goods when the work or services were not performed or the parts replaced;

(23) filing suit founded upon a written contractual obligation of and signed by the defendant to pay money arising out of or based on a consumer transaction for goods, services, loans, or extensions of credit intended primarily for personal, family,

household, or agricultural use in any county other than in the 1 2 county in which the defendant resides at the time of the commencement of the action or in the county in which the defendant 3 4 in fact signed the contract; provided, however, that a violation of this subsection shall not occur where it is shown by the person 5 filing such suit that the person neither knew or had reason to know 6 7 that the county in which such suit was filed was neither the county in which the defendant resides at the commencement of the suit nor 8 9 the county in which the defendant in fact signed the contract;

10 (24) failing to disclose information concerning goods 11 or services which was known at the time of the transaction if such 12 failure to disclose such information was intended to induce the 13 consumer into a transaction into which the consumer would not have 14 entered had the information been disclosed;

15 (25) using the term "corporation," "incorporated," or 16 an abbreviation of either of those terms in the name of a business 17 entity that is not incorporated under the laws of this state or 18 another jurisdiction;

selling, offering to sell, or illegally promoting 19 (26) an annuity contract under Chapter 22, Acts of the 57th Legislature, 20 3rd Called Session, 1962 (Article 6228a-5, Vernon's Texas Civil 21 Statutes), with the intent that the annuity contract will be the 22 subject of a salary reduction agreement, as defined by that Act, if 23 24 the annuity contract is not an eligible qualified investment under 25 that Act or is not registered with the Teacher Retirement System of Texas as required by Section 8A of that Act; 26

27 (27) taking advantage of a disaster declared by the

1 governor under Chapter 418, Government Code, by:

2 (A) selling or leasing fuel, food, medicine, or
3 another necessity at an exorbitant or excessive price; or

4 (B) demanding an exorbitant or excessive price in
5 connection with the sale or lease of fuel, food, medicine, or
6 another necessity;

7 (28) using the translation into a foreign language of a title or other word, including "attorney," "lawyer," "licensed," 8 9 "notary," and "notary public," in any written or electronic material, including an advertisement, a business 10 card, a 11 letterhead, stationery, a website, or an online video, in reference to a person who is not an attorney in order to imply that the person 12 13 is authorized to practice law in the United States;

14 (29) [(28)] delivering or distributing a solicitation 15 in connection with a good or service that:

16 (A) represents that the solicitation is sent on17 behalf of a governmental entity when it is not; or

(B) resembles a governmental notice or form that
represents or implies that a criminal penalty may be imposed if the
recipient does not remit payment for the good or service;

21 (30) [(29)] delivering or distributing a solicitation 22 in connection with a good or service that resembles a check or other 23 negotiable instrument or invoice, unless the portion of the 24 solicitation that resembles a check or other negotiable instrument 25 or invoice includes the following notice, clearly and conspicuously 26 printed in at least 18-point type:

27 "SPECIMEN-NON-NEGOTIABLE";

1 (31) [(30)] in the production, sale, distribution, or 2 promotion of a synthetic substance that produces and is intended to 3 produce an effect when consumed or ingested similar to, or in excess 4 of, the effect of a controlled substance or controlled substance 5 analogue, as those terms are defined by Section 481.002, Health and 6 Safety Code:

7 (A) making a deceptive representation or8 designation about the synthetic substance; or

9 (B) causing confusion or misunderstanding as to 10 the effects the synthetic substance causes when consumed or 11 ingested; or

(32) [(31)] a licensed public insurance 12 adjuster 13 directly or indirectly soliciting employment, as defined by Section 38.01, Penal Code, for an attorney, or a licensed public insurance 14 adjuster entering into a contract with an insured for the primary 15 16 purpose of referring the insured to an attorney without the intent to actually perform the services customarily provided by a licensed 17 public insurance adjuster, provided that this subdivision may not 18 be construed to prohibit a licensed public insurance adjuster from 19 20 recommending a particular attorney to an insured.

21 ARTICLE 4. CHANGES RELATING TO CIVIL PRACTICE AND REMEDIES CODE

SECTION 4.001. Section 91A.001, Civil Practice and Remedies Code, is amended to conform to changes made by Chapter 838 (S.B. 24 202), Acts of the 84th Legislature, Regular Session, 2015, to read as follows:

Sec. 91A.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
(1) "Audiologist" means an individual licensed to

1 practice audiology by the <u>Texas Department of Licensing and</u>
2 <u>Regulation</u> [State Board of Examiners of Speech-Language Pathology
3 and Audiology].

4 (2) "Speech-language pathologist" means an individual
5 licensed to practice speech-language pathology by the <u>Texas</u>
6 <u>Department of Licensing and Regulation</u> [State Board of Examiners
7 for Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology].

ARTICLE 5. CHANGES RELATING TO CODE OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE

9 SECTION 5.001. Articles 17.033(c) and (d), Code of Criminal 10 Procedure, are amended to correct a reference to read as follows:

11 (c) On the filing of an application by the attorney 12 representing the state, a magistrate may postpone the release of a 13 person under Subsection (a) [, (a-1),] or (b) for not more than 72 14 hours after the person's arrest. An application filed under this 15 subsection must state the reason a magistrate has not determined 16 whether probable cause exists to believe that the person committed 17 the offense for which the person was arrested.

18 (d) The time limits imposed by Subsections (a) $\left[\frac{1}{r} - \left(\frac{a-1}{r}\right)\right]$ and (b) do not apply to a person arrested without a warrant who is taken 19 20 to a hospital, clinic, or other medical facility before being taken before a magistrate under Article 15.17. For a person described by 21 22 this subsection, the time limits imposed by Subsections (a)[$_{ au}$ $(a=1)_r$] and (b) begin to run at the time, as documented in the 23 records of the hospital, clinic, or other medical facility, that a 24 physician or other medical professional releases the person from 25 the hospital, clinic, or other medical facility. 26

27 SECTION 5.002. Article 45.0216(f), Code of Criminal

1 Procedure, is amended to correct a reference to read as follows:

2 (f) The court shall order the conviction, together with all 3 complaints, verdicts, sentences, and prosecutorial and law 4 enforcement records, and any other documents relating to the 5 offense, expunged from the person's record if the court finds that:

6 (1) for a person applying for the expunction of a 7 conviction for an offense described by Section 8.07(a)(4) or (5), 8 Penal Code, the person was not convicted of any other offense 9 described by Section 8.07(a)(4) or (5), Penal Code, while the 10 person was a child; and

(2) for a person applying for the expunction of a conviction for an offense described by Section 43.261, Penal Code, the person was not found to have engaged in conduct indicating a need for supervision described by Section <u>51.03(b)(6)</u> [<u>51.03(b)(7)</u>], Family Code, while the person was a child.

16 SECTION 5.003. Article 56.021(d), Code of Criminal Procedure, as added by Chapter 1032 (H.B. 1447), Acts of the 84th 17 Legislature, Regular Session, 2015, is repealed as duplicative of 18 Article 56.021(d), Code of Criminal Procedure, as added by Chapter 19 20 1153 (S.B. 630), Acts of the 84th Legislature, Regular Session, 2015. 21

ARTICLE 6. CHANGES RELATING TO EDUCATION CODE

23 SECTION 6.001. Section 25.007(b), Education Code, as 24 amended by Chapters 746 (H.B. 1804), 822 (H.B. 3748), and 1206 (S.B. 25 1494), Acts of the 84th Legislature, Regular Session, 2015, is 26 reenacted and amended to read as follows:

(b) In recognition of the challenges faced by students who

1 are homeless or in substitute care, the agency shall assist the 2 transition of students who are homeless or in substitute care from 3 one school to another by:

4 (1) ensuring that school records for a student who is
5 homeless or in substitute care are transferred to the student's new
6 school not later than the 10th working day after the date the
7 student begins enrollment at the school;

8 (2) developing systems to ease transition of a student 9 who is homeless or in substitute care during the first two weeks of 10 enrollment at a new school;

(3) developing procedures for awarding credit, including partial credit if appropriate, for course work, including electives, completed by a student who is homeless or in substitute care while enrolled at another school;

(4) promoting practices that facilitate access by a student who is homeless or in substitute care to extracurricular programs, summer programs, credit transfer services, electronic courses provided under Chapter 30A, and after-school tutoring programs at nominal or no cost;

(5) establishing procedures to lessen the adverse impact of the movement of a student who is homeless or in substitute care to a new school;

(6) entering into a memorandum of understanding with the Department of Family and Protective Services regarding the exchange of information as appropriate to facilitate the transition of students in substitute care from one school to another;

27 (7) encouraging school districts and open-enrollment

1 charter schools to provide services for a student who is homeless or 2 in substitute care in transition when applying for admission to 3 postsecondary study and when seeking sources of funding for 4 postsecondary study;

5 (8) requiring school districts, campuses, and 6 open-enrollment charter schools to accept a referral for special 7 education services made for a student who is homeless or in 8 substitute care by a school previously attended by the student;

9 (9) requiring school districts, campuses, and 10 open-enrollment charter schools to provide notice to the child's 11 educational decision-maker and caseworker regarding events that 12 may significantly impact the education of a child, including:

(A) requests or referrals for an evaluation under
Section 504, Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. Section 794), or
special education under Section 29.003;

16 (B) admission, review, and dismissal committee 17 meetings;

18 (C) manifestation determination reviews required19 by Section 37.004(b);

(D) any disciplinary actions under Chapter 37 for
 which parental notice is required;

(E) citations issued for Class C misdemeanor
 offenses on school property or at school-sponsored activities;

(F) reports of restraint and seclusion requiredby Section 37.0021; and

26 (G) use of corporal punishment as provided by27 Section 37.0011;

1 (10) developing procedures for allowing a student who 2 is homeless or in substitute care who was previously enrolled in a 3 course required for graduation the opportunity, to the extent 4 practicable, to complete the course, at no cost to the student, 5 before the beginning of the next school year;

6 (11) ensuring that a student who is homeless or in 7 substitute care who is not likely to receive a high school diploma 8 before the fifth school year following the student's enrollment in 9 grade nine, as determined by the district, has the student's course 10 credit accrual and personal graduation plan reviewed;

(12) ensuring that a student in substitute care who is in grade 11 or 12 be provided information regarding tuition and fee exemptions under Section 54.366 for dual-credit or other courses provided by a public institution of higher education for which a high school student may earn joint high school and college credit; [and]

(13) designating at least one agency employee to act as a liaison officer regarding educational issues related to students in the conservatorship of the Department of Family and Protective Services; and

21 (14) [(13)] providing other assistance as identified
22 by the agency.

23 SECTION 6.002. Section 26.002, Education Code, is amended 24 to correct a reference to read as follows:

25 Sec. 26.002. DEFINITION. In this chapter, "parent" 26 includes a person standing in parental relation. The term does not 27 include a person as to whom the parent-child relationship has been

terminated or a person not entitled to possession of or access to a 1 2 child under a court order. Except as provided by federal law, all rights of a parent under Title 2 of this code and all educational 3 rights under Section 151.001(a)(10) [151.003(a)(10)], Family Code, 4 shall be exercised by a student who is 18 years of age or older or 5 whose disabilities of minority have been removed for general 6 7 purposes under Chapter 31, Family Code, unless the student has been determined to be incompetent or the student's rights have been 8 9 otherwise restricted by a court order.

10 SECTION 6.003. Section 38.158(b), Education Code, is 11 amended to conform to changes made by Chapter 838 (S.B. 202), Acts 12 of the 84th Legislature, Regular Session, 2015, to read as follows:

(b) The <u>Texas</u> Department of <u>Licensing and Regulation</u> [State Health Services Advisory Board of Athletic Trainers] shall approve for athletic trainers training courses in the subject matter of concussions and shall maintain an updated list of individuals and organizations authorized by the board to provide the training.

18 SECTION 6.004. Sections 61.806(c) and (d), Education Code, 19 as amended by Chapter 443 (S.B. 715), Acts of the 83rd Legislature, 20 Regular Session, 2013, are repealed to conform to the repeal of 21 Subchapter Q, Chapter 61, Education Code, by Chapter 1155 (S.B. 22 215), Acts of the 83rd Legislature, Regular Session, 2013.

23 SECTION 6.005. Section 61.833(a), Education Code, is 24 amended to read as follows:

(a) In this section<u>:</u>[7]

(1) "<u>Lower-division</u> [lower-division] institution of
 higher education" means a public junior college, public state

1 college, or public technical institute.[; and]

2 (2) "<u>Reverse</u> [reverse] transfer data sharing 3 platform" means:

4 (A) the National Student Clearinghouse; or
5 (B) a similar national electronic data sharing
6 and exchange platform operated by an agent of the institution that
7 meets nationally accepted standards, conventions, and practices.

8 SECTION 6.006. Section 130.008(g), Education Code, as added 9 by Chapter 1177 (S.B. 1004), Acts of the 84th Legislature, Regular 10 Session, 2015, is redesignated as Section 130.008(g-1), Education 11 Code, and amended to conform to the repeal of Section 130.008(f), 12 Education Code, by Chapter 90 (H.B. 505), Acts of the 84th 13 Legislature, Regular Session, 2015, to read as follows:

(g-1) [(g)] A public junior college with a service area 14 15 located wholly or partly in a county with a population of more than 16 three million shall enter into an agreement with each school district located wholly or partly in a county with a population of 17 more than three million to offer one or more courses as provided by 18 this section. A student enrolled in a school district to which this 19 20 subsection applies may enroll in a course at any junior college that has entered into an agreement with the district to offer the course 21 22 under this subsection. [Subsection (f) does not apply to a student who seeks to enroll in a course under this subsection.] 23

SECTION 6.007. The heading to Chapter 143, Education Code, is repealed to conform to the repeal and redesignation of the provisions of that chapter by Chapter 1155 (S.B. 215), Acts of the 83rd Legislature, Regular Session, 2013.

(a) A digitized signature on an original petition or application under this title or any other pleading or order in a proceeding under this title satisfies the requirements for and imposes the duties of signatories to pleadings, motions, and other papers identified under Rule 13, Texas Rules of Civil Procedure.

(b) A digitized signature under this section may be applied
only by, and must remain under the sole control of, the person whose
signature is represented.

condition that circumvents the purpose of this chapter. (Acts 74th
Leg., R.S., Ch. 219, Secs. 2, 11.)

Sec. 1101.003. DEFINITIONS. (a) In this chapter: (1) "Acquisition closing date" means the date on which ownership of, or a direct or indirect majority interest in the ownership of, a regulated facility or operation is acquired in an asset purchase, equity purchase, merger, or similar transaction.

(2) "Audit report" means an audit report described by
 Section 1101.051.

(3) "Environmental or health and safety audit" 3 or 4 "audit" means a systematic voluntary evaluation, review, or assessment of compliance with environmental or health and safety 5 laws or with any permit issued under an environmental or health and 6 7 safety law conducted by an owner or operator, an employee of an owner or operator, a person, including an employee or independent 8 9 contractor of the person, that is considering the acquisition of a regulated facility or operation, or an independent contractor of: 10

(A) a regulated facility or operation; or
(B) an activity at a regulated facility or
operation.

14 (4) "Environmental or health and safety law" means:

15 (A) a federal or state environmental or16 occupational health and safety law; or

(B) a rule, regulation, or regional or local lawadopted in conjunction with a law described by Paragraph (A).

19 (5) "Owner or operator" means a person who owns or20 operates a regulated facility or operation.

(6) "Penalty" means an administrative, civil, or criminal sanction imposed by the state to punish a person for a violation of a statute or rule. The term does not include a technical or remedial provision ordered by a regulatory authority.

(7) "Regulated facility or operation" means a facility
or operation that is regulated under an environmental or health and
safety law.

(b) A person acts intentionally for purposes of this chapter
 if the person acts intentionally within the meaning of Section
 6.03, Penal Code.

4 (c) For purposes of this chapter, a person acts knowingly, 5 or with knowledge, with respect to the nature of the person's 6 conduct when the person is aware of the person's physical acts. A 7 person acts knowingly, or with knowledge, with respect to the 8 result of the person's conduct when the person is aware that the 9 conduct will cause the result.

10 (d) A person acts recklessly or is reckless for purposes of 11 this chapter if the person acts recklessly or is reckless within the 12 meaning of Section 6.03, Penal Code.

(e) To fully implement the privilege established by this
chapter, the term "environmental or health and safety law" shall be
construed broadly. (Acts 74th Leg., R.S., Ch. 219, Sec. 3.)

16 Sec. 1101.004. APPLICABILITY. The privilege established 17 by this chapter applies to environmental or health and safety 18 audits that are conducted on or after May 23, 1995. (Acts 74th 19 Leg., R.S., Ch. 219, Sec. 12.)

Sec. 1101.005. RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER RECOGNIZED PRIVILEGES. This chapter does not limit, waive, or abrogate the scope or nature of any statutory or common law privilege, including the work product doctrine and the attorney-client privilege. (Acts 74th Leg., R.S., Ch. 219, Sec. 13.)

SUBCHAPTER B. GENERAL AUDIT PROVISIONS
 Sec. 1101.051. AUDIT REPORT. (a) An audit report is a
 report that includes each document and communication, other than

those described by Section 1101.102, produced from an environmental
 or health and safety audit.

3 (b) General components that may be contained in a completed 4 audit report include:

5 (1) a report prepared by an auditor, monitor, or 6 similar person, which may include:

7 (A) a description of the scope of the audit;

8 (B) the information gained in the audit and9 findings, conclusions, and recommendations; and

10 (C) exhibits and appendices;

(2) memoranda and documents analyzing all or a portion of the materials described by Subdivision (1) or discussing implementation issues; and

14 (3) an implementation plan or tracking system to 15 correct past noncompliance, improve current compliance, or prevent 16 future noncompliance.

17 (c) The types of exhibits and appendices that may be 18 contained in an audit report include supporting information that is 19 collected or developed for the primary purpose of and in the course 20 of an environmental or health and safety audit, including:

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(1) interviews with current or former employees;

(2) field notes and records of observations;

(3) findings, opinions, suggestions, conclusions,
 guidance, notes, drafts, and memoranda;

25 (4) legal analyses;

26 (5) drawings;

27 (6) photographs;

1 (7) laboratory analyses and other analytical data;

2 (8) computer-generated or electronically recorded 3 information;

4 (9) maps, charts, graphs, and surveys; and
5 (10) other communications associated with an

environmental or health and safety audit.

7 (d) To facilitate identification, each document in an audit report should be labeled "COMPLIANCE REPORT: PRIVILEGED DOCUMENT" 8 9 or labeled with words of similar import. Failure to label a document under this section does not constitute a waiver of the 10 11 privilege established by this chapter or create a presumption that the privilege does or does not apply. (Acts 74th Leg., R.S., Ch. 12 13 219, Secs. 4(a), (b), (c), (d).)

Sec. 1101.052. PERIOD FOR COMPLETION OF AUDIT. (a) Unless an extension is approved by the governmental entity with regulatory authority over the regulated facility or operation based on reasonable grounds, an environmental or health and safety audit must be completed within a reasonable time not to exceed six months after:

20 (1) the date the audit is initiated; or

(2) the acquisition closing date, if the personcontinues the audit under Section 1101.053.

8 (e) An employee of a state agency may not request, review, 9 or otherwise use an audit report during an agency inspection of a 10 regulated facility or operation or an activity of a regulated 11 facility or operation.

12 (f) A party asserting the privilege created by this section 13 has the burden of establishing the applicability of the privilege. 14 (Acts 74th Leg., R.S., Ch. 219, Sec. 5.)

Sec. 1101.102. NONPRIVILEGED MATERIALS. (a) The privilege established by Section 1101.101 does not apply to:

(1) a document, communication, datum, or report or
other information required by a regulatory agency to be collected,
developed, maintained, or reported under a federal or state
environmental or health and safety law;

(2) information obtained by observation, sampling, or
 monitoring by a regulatory agency; or

(3) information obtained from a source not involved inthe preparation of the audit report.

(b) This section does not limit the right of a person to

25 agreement between the person for whom the audit report was prepared 26 or the owner or operator of the audited facility or operation and: 27 (A) a partner or potential partner of the owner

1 or operator of the facility or operation;

2 (B) a transferee or potential transferee of the3 facility or operation;

4 (C) a lender or potential lender for the facility5 or operation;

6 (D) a governmental official of a state; or

7 (E) a person engaged in the business of insuring,8 underwriting, or indemnifying the facility or operation; or

9 (3) is made under a claim of confidentiality to a 10 governmental official or agency by the person for whom the audit 11 report was prepared or by the owner or operator.

(c) A party to a confidentiality agreement described by Subsection (b)(2) who violates that agreement is liable for damages caused by the disclosure and for any other penalties stipulated in the confidentiality agreement.

16 (d) Information that is disclosed under Subsection (b)(3) 17 is confidential and is not subject to disclosure under Chapter 552, Government Code. A public entity, public employee, or public 18 official who discloses information in violation of this subsection 19 20 is subject to any penalty provided by Chapter 552, Government Code. It is an affirmative defense to the clerical dissemination of a 21 privileged audit report that the report was not clearly labeled 22 "COMPLIANCE REPORT: PRIVILEGED DOCUMENT" or labeled with words of 23 similar import. 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Sec. 1101.104. EXCEPTION: DISCLOSURE REQUIRED BY COURT OR 4 ADMINISTRATIVE HEARINGS OFFICIAL. (a) A court or administrative 5 hearings official with competent jurisdiction may 6 require 7 disclosure of a portion of an audit report in a civil or administrative proceeding if the court or administrative hearings 8 official determines, after an in camera review consistent with the 9 appropriate rules of procedure, that: 10

13 (2) the portion of the audit report is not subject to14 the privilege by application of Section 1101.102; or

(b) A party seeking disclosure under this section has the

(c) Notwithstanding Chapter 2001, Government Code, a decision of an administrative hearings official under Subsection (a)(1), (2), or (3) of this section is directly appealable to a court of competent jurisdiction without disclosure of the audit report to any person unless so ordered by the court.

27 (d) A person claiming the privilege is subject to sanctions

1 as provided by Rule 215 of the Texas Rules of Civil Procedure or to a 2 fine not to exceed \$10,000 if the court finds, consistent with 3 fundamental due process, that the person intentionally or knowingly 4 claimed the privilege for information that, by application of 5 Section 1101.102, is not subject to the privilege.

6 (e) A determination of a court under this section is subject
7 to interlocutory appeal to an appropriate appellate court. (Acts
8 74th Leg., R.S., Ch. 219, Sec. 7.)

9 Sec. 1101.105. REVIEW OF PRIVILEGED DOCUMENTS ΒY 10 GOVERNMENTAL AUTHORITY. (a) If an audit report is obtained, 11 reviewed, or used in a criminal proceeding, the administrative or civil evidentiary privilege established by Section 1101.101 is not 12 waived or eliminated for any other purpose. 13

(b) Notwithstanding the privilege established by Section 15 1101.101, a regulatory agency may review information that is 16 required to be available under a specific state or federal law, but 17 that review does not waive or eliminate the administrative or civil 18 evidentiary privilege if applicable.

(c) If information is required to be available to the public by operation of a specific state or federal law, the governmental authority shall notify the person claiming the privilege of the potential for public disclosure before obtaining the information under Subsection (a) or (b).

(d) If privileged information is disclosed under Subsection
(b) or (c), on the motion of a party, a court or the appropriate
administrative official shall suppress evidence offered in any
civil or administrative proceeding that arises or is derived from

1 review, disclosure, or use of information obtained under this 2 section unless the review, disclosure, or use is authorized under 3 Section 1101.102. A party having received information under 4 Subsection (b) or (c) has the burden of proving that the evidence 5 offered did not arise and was not derived from the review of 6 privileged information. SUBCHAPTER Z. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

The 15 commissioner's order may require the district or campus to:

16 (1) select or be assigned an external auditor, data 17 quality expert, professional authorized to monitor district 18 assessment instrument administration, or curriculum or program 19 expert; or

20 (2) provide for or participate in the appropriate 21 training of district staff or board of trustees members in the case 22 of a district, or campus staff, in the case of a campus. (Ed. Code, 23 Sec. 39.109.)

Sec. 39A.903. COSTS PAID BY SCHOOL DISTRICT. The costs of providing a monitor, conservator, management team, campus intervention team, technical assistance team, managing entity, or service provider under this chapter shall be paid by the school

district. If the district fails or refuses to pay the costs in a
 timely manner, the commissioner may:

3 (1) pay the costs using amounts withheld from any4 funds to which the district is otherwise entitled; or

Sec. 39A.906. TRANSITIONAL INTERVENTIONS AND SANCTIONS. (a) For a campus that received an unacceptable performance rating for the 2013-2014, 2014-2015, and 2015-2016 school years, the commissioner may apply the interventions and sanctions authorized by Chapter 39 as that chapter existed on January 1, 2015, to the campus.

(b) If a campus described by Subsection (a) receives an unacceptable performance rating for the 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 school years, the commissioner shall apply the interventions and

1 sanctions authorized by Section 39A.111 to the campus.

(c) For a campus that received an acceptable performance
rating for the 2013-2014 school year and an unacceptable
performance rating for the 2014-2015 and 2015-2016 school years,
the commissioner shall apply the interventions and sanctions
authorized by Section 39A.101(a) to the campus.

7 (d) If a campus described by Subsection (c) receives an 8 unacceptable performance rating for the 2016-2017, 2017-2018, and 9 2018-2019 school years, the commissioner shall apply the 10 interventions and sanctions authorized by Section 39A.111 to the 11 campus.

12 (e) The commissioner may adopt rules as necessary to13 implement this section.

14 (f) This section expires September 1, 2020. (Ed. Code, Sec.15 39.1071.)

16 Sec. 39A.907. SPECIAL STUDENT RECOVERY PROGRAM. (a) This 17 section applies only to a school district with a student enrollment 18 of at least 60,000 that is located in a county on the international 19 border with a population of 800,000 or more.

(b) The commissioner may require a school district to which this section applies to operate a special student recovery program if the commissioner has imposed a sanction under Subchapter A based on a determination that the district has, for the purpose of affecting the performance rating under Section 39.054 or former Section 39.072 or a distinction designation under Section 39.202 or 39.203 of the district or a campus in the district:

27 (1) assigned a student to a grade level to which the

1 student would not otherwise be assigned, in violation of local
2 policy;

3 (2) retained a student at a grade level at which the 4 student would not otherwise be retained, in violation of local 5 policy;

6 (3) declined to admit to the schools of the district a 7 student with limited English proficiency who was eligible for 8 admission; or

9 (4) encouraged a student who was eligible for 10 admission to the district to enroll in another district or drop out 11 of school.

12 (c) The commissioner shall require a school district to 13 which this section applies to operate a special student recovery 14 program if the superintendent or assistant superintendent of the 15 district or a principal or assistant principal of a campus in the 16 district is convicted of or receives a grant of deferred 17 adjudication community supervision for an offense associated with 18 conduct described by Subsection (b).

19 (d) A special student recovery program must include:

(1) identification of students affected by conduct described by Subsection (b), with an emphasis on identifying and obtaining current addresses for students who dropped out of school after the conduct;

24 (2) notification of students identified under
25 Subdivision (1) of the availability of educational services
26 provided through the program;

27 (3) provision of appropriate compensatory, intensive,

1 and accelerated instructional services for students identified 2 under Subdivision (1), including services designed to enable 3 students to obtain high school equivalency certificates under 4 Section 7.111; and

5 (4) for students identified under Subdivision (1) who 6 are at least 21 years of age and under 26 years of age, the offer of 7 admission to the schools of the school district for the purpose of 8 completing the requirements for a high school diploma, as 9 authorized by Section 25.001.

10 (e) A student who is at least 21 years of age and is admitted 11 to the schools of the school district under Subsection (d)(4) is 12 subject to the placement restrictions described by Section 13 25.001(b-2) if the student has not attended school in the three 14 preceding school years.

(f) In addition to any other available funds, a school district may use funds provided to the district under Section 42.152 to pay the costs of the program. Instructional services may be provided to students identified under Subsection (d)(1) who are under 26 years of age using funds provided under Section 42.152 or other Foundation School Program funds, notwithstanding Section 42.003.

(g) This section requires a school district to provide instructional services only to a student who is a resident of this state and is eligible for admission to the schools of the district under Section 25.001, including eligibility described by that section for students who are under 26 years of age.

27 (h) The commissioner shall determine the duration of a

special student recovery program, provided that the program must have a duration of at least two years. Before a program may be concluded, the school district must conduct a public hearing in the community served by the district to solicit comments from students, parents, and other members of the community regarding whether there is a continuing need for the program.
