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## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

## AN ACT

2 relating to evaluating public school performance.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

4 SECTION 1. Section 11.252(a), Education Code, is amended to 5 read as follows:

6 (a) Each school district shall have a district improvement 7 plan that is developed, evaluated, and revised annually, in accordance with district policy, by the superintendent with the 8 assistance of the district-level committee established under 9 Section 11.251. The purpose of the district improvement plan is to 10 guide district and campus staff in the improvement of student 11 performance for all student groups in order to attain state 12 standards in respect to the achievement indicators adopted under 13 Section 39.053(c) [Sections 39.053(c)(1)-(4)]. The district 14 improvement plan must include provisions for: 15

16 (1) a comprehensive needs assessment addressing district student performance on the achievement indicators, and 17 other appropriate measures of performance, that are disaggregated 18 by all student groups served by the district, including categories 19 of ethnicity, socioeconomic status, sex, and populations served by 20 special programs, including students in special education programs 21 under Subchapter A, Chapter 29; 22

(2) measurable district performance objectives for24 all appropriate achievement indicators for all student

No. 2051 populations, including students in special education programs 1 under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, and other measures of student 2 3 performance that may be identified through the comprehensive needs 4 assessment; 5 (3) strategies for improvement of student performance 6 that include: (A) 7 instructional methods for addressing the 8 needs of student groups not achieving their full potential; 9 methods for addressing the needs of students (B) 10 for special programs, including: (i) suicide 11 prevention programs, in accordance with Subchapter O-1, Chapter 161, Health and Safety 12 Code, which includes a parental or guardian notification procedure; 13 14 (ii) conflict resolution programs; 15 (iii) violence prevention programs; and 16 (iv) dyslexia treatment programs; 17 (C) dropout reduction; integration of technology in instructional 18 (D) 19 and administrative programs; discipline management; 20 (E) 21 staff development for professional staff of (F) the district; 22 (G) career education to 23 assist students in 24 developing the knowledge, skills, and competencies necessary for a broad range of career opportunities; and 25 26 (H) accelerated education; 27 (4) strategies for providing to middle school, junior

No. 2051 high school, and high school students, those students' teachers and 1 school counselors, and those students' parents information about: 2 higher education admissions and financial 3 (A) aid opportunities; 4 5 the TEXAS grant program and the Teach for (B) Texas grant program established under Chapter 56; 6 7 (C) the need for students to make informed 8 curriculum choices to be prepared for success beyond high school; and 9 10 (D) sources of information on higher education admissions and financial aid; 11 12 (5) resources needed to implement identified 13 strategies; 14 (6) staff responsible for ensuring the accomplishment 15 of each strategy; (7) timelines for 16 ongoing monitoring of the 17 implementation of each improvement strategy; (8) formative evaluation criteria for determining 18 19 periodically whether strategies are resulting in intended improvement of student performance; and 20 21 (9) the policy under Section 38.0041 addressing sexual abuse and other maltreatment of children. 22 SECTION 2. Section 11.253(c), Education Code, is amended to 23 24 read as follows: (c) Each school year, the principal of each school campus, 25 26 with the assistance of the campus-level committee, shall develop, review, and revise the campus improvement plan for the purpose of 27

1 improving student performance for all student populations, 2 including students in special education programs under Subchapter 3 A, Chapter 29, with respect to the achievement indicators adopted 4 under <u>Section 39.053(c)</u> [Sections 39.053(c)(1)-(4)] and any other 5 appropriate performance measures for special needs populations.

6 SECTION 3. Section 12.1013(c), Education Code, is amended 7 to read as follows:

8 (c) The report must include the performance of each public 9 school in each class described by Subsection (b) as measured by the 10 achievement indicators adopted under <u>Section 39.053(c)</u> [<del>Sections</del> 11 <del>39.053(c)(1)=(4)</del>] and student attrition rates.

SECTION 4. Section 29.062(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

14 (a) The legislature recognizes that compliance with this 15 subchapter is an imperative public necessity. Therefore, in accordance with the policy of the state, the agency shall evaluate 16 17 the effectiveness of programs under this subchapter based on the achievement indicators adopted under Section 39.053(c) [Sections 18 19  $\frac{39.053(c)(1)-(4)}{1}$ including the results of assessment 20 instruments. The agency may combine evaluations under this section 21 with federal accountability measures concerning students of limited English proficiency. 22

23 SECTION 5. Section 29.202(a), Education Code, is amended to 24 read as follows:

(a) A student is eligible to receive a public education
grant or to attend another public school in the district in which
the student resides under this subchapter if the student is

1 assigned to attend a public school campus[+ 2 [(1)]issued an unacceptable performance rating made publicly available under Section 39.054 [at which 50 percent or 3 more of the students did not perform satisfactorily on an 4 5 assessment instrument administered under Section 39.023(a) or (c) in any two of the preceding three years; or 6 7 [(2) that, at any time in the preceding three years, failed to satisfy any standard under Section 39.054(e)]. 8 9 SECTION 6. Subchapter B, Chapter 39, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 39.0211 to read as follows: 10 Sec. 39.0211. RULES. The commissioner may adopt rules as 11 12 necessary to administer this chapter. SECTION 7. Section 39.052(b), Education Code, is amended to 13 14 read as follows: 15 (b) In determining the accreditation status of a school district, the commissioner: 16 17 (1)shall evaluate and consider: 18 (A) performance achievement on indicators described by Section 39.053 [39.053(c)]; and 19 20 (B) performance under the financial 21 accountability rating system developed under Subchapter D; and 22 (2) may evaluate and consider: (A) the district's compliance with statutory 23 24 requirements and requirements imposed by rule of the commissioner or State Board of Education under specific statutory authority that 25 26 relate to: (i) reporting data through 27 the Public

No. 2051 1 Education Information Management System (PEIMS) or other reports required by state or federal law or court order; 2 3 (ii) the hiqh school graduation requirements under Section 28.025; or 4 5 (iii) an item listed under Sections 6 7.056(e)(3)(C)-(I) that applies to the district; 7 the effectiveness of the district's programs (B) 8 for special populations; and (C) the effectiveness of the district's career 9 10 and technology program. SECTION 8. Section 39.053, Education Code, is amended by 11 amending Subsections (a), (a-1), (b), (c), (d-1), (f), (g), (g-1), 12 (g-2), and (i) and adding Subsection (c-3) to read as follows: 13 14 (a) The commissioner shall adopt a set of indicators, 15 including indicators under Subsection (c), of the quality of learning and achievement. The commissioner [biennially] shall 16 17 periodically review the indicators for the consideration of appropriate revisions. 18 The indicators adopted by the commissioner under 19 (a**-**1) Subsection (a) [, including the indicators identified under 20 Subsection (c), must measure and evaluate school districts and 21 campuses with respect to: 22 23 (1)improving student preparedness for success in: 24 (A) subsequent grade levels; and 25 entering the workforce, the military, or (B) 26 postsecondary education; 27 reducing, with the goal of eliminating, student (2)

1 academic achievement differentials among students from different 2 racial and ethnic groups and socioeconomic backgrounds; and

(b) Performance on the achievement indicators adopted under
Subsections (c)(1), (2), and (3)(B) and (C) [(c)(1)-(4)] shall be
compared to state-established standards. <u>To the extent feasible</u>,
<u>the</u> [<del>The</del>] indicators <u>should allow for disaggregation</u> [<del>must be based</del>
<u>on information that is disaggregated</u>] by race, ethnicity, and
socioeconomic status.

13 (c) School districts and campuses must be evaluated based on 14 <u>at least three</u> [five] domains of indicators of achievement adopted 15 under this section that include:

16 (1) in the <u>student achievement</u> [first] domain, 17 <u>indicators of student achievement that may include</u> [the results 18 of]:

19 (A) for evaluating the performance of districts
 20 and campuses generally:

(i) an indicator that accounts for the results of assessment instruments required under Sections 39.023(a), (c), and (l), as applicable for the district and campus, including the results of assessment instruments required for graduation retaken by a student, aggregated across grade levels by subject area, including:

23 on an assessment instrument in reading or mathematics designated by 24 the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board under Section 25 51.3062(c);

26 (ii) students who satisfy relevant

1 achievement not associated with performance on standardized assessment instruments determined appropriate for consideration by 2 3 the commissioner in consultation with educators, parents, business and industry representatives, and employers]; and 4 5 (3) [<del>(5)</del>] in the school climate [<del>fifth</del>] domain, indicators of school climate, which may include: 6 7 (A) three programs or specific categories of 8 performance related to community and student engagement locally selected and evaluated as provided by Section 39.0546; 9 10 (B) the percentage of students who successfully complete varied, rigorous, and relevant curricular options that 11 lead to postsecondary success, including successfully completing 12 advanced placement courses or other similar courses; and 13 14 (C) the percentage of students who successfully 15 complete a coherent sequence of career and technical courses that lead to industry certifications or college credit. 16 17 (c-3) For purposes of Subsection (c), the commissioner, to the extent feasible, shall determine a method by which the 18 19 performance of students who have been continuously enrolled in a school district or at a district campus, as applicable, as 20 determined by continuous enrollment criteria established by the 21 commissioner, shall be given greater weight in determining the 22 overall and domain performance rating of the district or campus 23 24 under Section 39.054 than the performance of students who do not meet the continuous enrollment criteria established by the 25 26 commissioner. (d-1) In aggregating results of assessment instruments 27

1 across grade levels by subject in accordance with <u>Subsections</u>
2 [<u>Subsection</u>] (c)(1)(<u>A)(i) and (ii)</u>, the performance of a student
3 enrolled below the high school level on an assessment instrument

(f) Annually, the commissioner shall define the state 6 7 standard for the current school year for each achievement indicator 8 adopted under this section. In consultation with educators, parents, and business and industry representatives, as necessary, 9 the commissioner shall establish and modify standards to 10 continuously improve student performance to achieve the goals of 11 12 eliminating achievement gaps based on race, ethnicity, and socioeconomic status and to ensure Texas is a national leader in 13 preparing students for postsecondary success [described by 14 15 Subsections (c)(1)-(4) and shall project the state standards for each indicator for the following two school years. 16 The 17 commissioner shall periodically raise the state standards for the college readiness achievement indicator described by Subsection 18 19 (c)(1)(A)(ii) for accreditation as necessary to reach the goals of achieving, by not later than the 2019-2020 school year: 20

21 [(1) student performance in this state, disaggregated
22 by race, ethnicity, and socioeconomic status, that ranks nationally
23 in the top 10 states in terms of college readiness; and

rates under Subsection (c)(1)(B)(ix) [rate indicator described by 1 Subsections (c)(4)(A)(i) and (B)(ii)(a)], the commissioner may not 2 3 consider as a dropout a student whose failure to attend school results from: 4 5 (1)the student's expulsion under Section 37.007; and (2) as applicable: 6 7 adjudication as having engaged in delinquent (A) 8 conduct or conduct indicating a need for supervision, as defined by Section 51.03, Family Code; or 9 10 (B) conviction of and sentencing for an offense under the Penal Code. 11 12 (q-1) In computing dropout and completion rates such as high 13 school graduation rates under Subsection (c)(1)(B)(ix) 14 [Subsections (c)(4)(A)(i) and (B)(ii)(a)], the commissioner shall 15 exclude: 16 (1)students who are ordered by a court to attend a 17 high school equivalency certificate program but who have not yet earned a high school equivalency certificate; 18 19 (2)students who were previously reported to the state as dropouts, including a student who is reported as a dropout, 20 reenrolls, and drops out again, regardless of the number of times of 21 reenrollment and dropping out; 22 23 (3) students in attendance who are not in membership 24 for purposes of average daily attendance; 25 (4) students whose initial enrollment in a school in 26 the United States in grades 7 through 12 was as unschooled refugees or asylees as defined by Section 39.027(a-1); 27

1 (5) students who are in the district exclusively as a 2 function of having been detained at a county detention facility but 3 are otherwise not students of the district in which the facility is 4 located; and

5 (6) students who are incarcerated in state jails and 6 federal penitentiaries as adults and as persons certified to stand 7 trial as adults.

8 (g-2) In computing completion rates <u>such as high school</u> 9 <u>graduation rates</u> under Subsection <u>(c)(1)(B)(ix)</u> [<del>(c)(2)</del>], the 10 commissioner shall exclude students who:

(1) are at least 18 years of age as of September 1 of the school year as reported for the fall semester Public Education Information Management System (PEIMS) submission and have satisfied the credit requirements for high school graduation;

15 (2) have not completed their individualized education 16 program under 19 T.A.C. Section 89.1070(b)(2) and the Individuals 17 with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C. Section 1400 et seq.); 18 and

19 (3) are enrolled and receiving individualized20 education program services.

(i) <u>Each school district shall submit the data required for</u>
<u>the indicators adopted under this section to the</u> [<del>The</del>] commissioner
[by rule shall adopt accountability measures to be used in
assessing the progress of students who have failed to perform
satisfactorily as determined by the commissioner under Section
<u>39.0241(a) or under the college readiness standard as determined</u>
under Section <u>39.0241</u> in the preceding school year on an assessment

#### 1 instrument required under Section 39.023(a), (c), or (1)].

2 SECTION 9. Sections 39.054(a), (a-1), (a-2), (a-3), (c), 3 and (e), Education Code, as effective on September 1, 2017, are 4 amended to read as follows:

5 (a) The commissioner shall adopt rules to evaluate school district and campus performance and assign each district and campus 6 an overall performance rating of A, B, C, D, or F. In addition to the 7 8 overall performance rating, the commissioner shall assign each district and campus a separate domain performance rating of A, B, C, 9 10 D, or F for each domain under <u>Section 39.053(c)</u> [Sections 39.053(c)(1)-(4)]. An overall or domain performance rating of A 11 12 reflects exemplary performance. An overall or domain performance rating of B reflects recognized performance. An overall or domain 13 performance rating of C reflects acceptable performance. 14 An 15 overall or domain performance rating of D or F reflects unacceptable performance. A district may not receive an overall or 16 17 domain performance rating of A if the district includes any campus with a corresponding overall or domain performance rating of D or F. 18 19 A reference in law to an acceptable rating or acceptable performance includes an overall or domain performance rating of A, 20 B, or C or exemplary, recognized, or acceptable performance. 21

22 (a-1) For purposes of assigning <u>a domain</u> [<del>an overall</del>]
23 performance rating under Subsection (a) <u>for the school climate</u>
24 <u>domain</u>, the commissioner shall attribute <u>50</u>[+

[(1) 55] percent of the <u>domain</u> performance <u>rating</u>
[evaluation] to the achievement <u>indicator</u> [indicators for the
first, second, and third domains] under <u>Section 39.053(c)(3)(A)</u>

1 [Sections 39.053(c)(1)-(3);

2 [(2) for middle and junior high school and elementary 3 campuses and districts that include only those campuses, 35 percent 4 of the performance evaluation to the applicable achievement 5 indicators for the fourth domain under Section 39.053(c)(4);

6 [(3) for high school campuses and districts that
7 include those campuses:

8 [(A) 10 percent of the performance evaluation to
9 the high school graduation rate achievement indicator described by
10 Section 39.053(c)(4)(A)(ii); and

11 [(B) 25 percent to the remaining applicable 12 achievement indicators for the fourth domain under Section 13 39.053(c)(4); and

14 [(4) 10 percent of the performance evaluation to the 15 locally selected and evaluated achievement indicators provided for 16 under the fifth domain under Section 39.053(c)(5)].

17 (a-2) The commissioner by rule <u>may</u> [shall] adopt procedures 18 to ensure that a repeated performance rating of D or F or 19 unacceptable in one domain, particularly performance that is not 20 significantly improving, is reflected in the overall performance 21 rating of a district or campus and is not compensated for by a 22 performance rating of A, B, or C in another domain.

(a-3) Not later than August 15 of each year, the performance ratings of each district and campus shall be made publicly available as provided by rules adopted under this section. [If a district or campus received an overall or domain performance rating of D or F for the preceding school year, the commissioner shall

In evaluating school district and campus performance 3 (C) [on the achievement indicators for student performance 4 <del>on</del> 5 assessment instruments adopted under Sections 39.053(c)(1) and (2) and the dropout rate indicator adopted] under <u>Subsection (a)</u> 6 [Sections 39.053(c)(4)(A)(i) and (B)(ii)(a)], the commissioner 7 8 shall determine a method by which the overall performance rating of a school district or campus is adjusted to more accurately reflect 9 the overall performance of the district or campus if the 10 performance of the district or campus on the performance indicators 11 12 for a domain disaggregated by race, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, or other factors does not meet the standards established 13 [define acceptable performance as meeting the state standard 14 15 determined] by the commissioner [under Section 39.053(f) for the 16 current school year based on:

(e) Each annual performance review under this section shall include an analysis of the achievement indicators adopted under <u>Section 39.053, including Subsection (c) of that section, [Sections</u> <u>39.053(c)(1)-(4)</u>] to determine school district and campus performance in relation to standards established for each indicator.

27 SECTION 10. Section 39.054(f), Education Code, as effective

September 1, 2017, is transferred to Section 39.053, Education Code, redesignated as Section 39.053(g-3), Education Code, and amended to read as follows:

(g-3) [(f)] In the computation of dropout and completion 4 5 rates such as high school graduation rates under Subsection (c)(1)(B)(ix) [Sections 39.053(c)(4)(A)(i) and (B)(ii)(a)], a 6 7 student who is released from a juvenile pre-adjudication secure 8 detention facility or juvenile post-adjudication secure correctional facility and fails to enroll in school or a student who 9 leaves a residential treatment center after receiving treatment for 10 fewer than 85 days and fails to enroll in school may not be 11 12 considered to have dropped out from the school district or campus serving the facility or center unless that district or campus is the 13 14 one to which the student is regularly assigned. 1 PURPOSES. Notwithstanding any other provision of this code except the extent otherwise provided under Section 39.053(g-3) 2 to 3 [39.054(f)], for purposes of determining the performance of a school district, campus, or open-enrollment charter school under 4 5 this chapter, a student ordered by a juvenile court into a residential program or facility operated by or under contract with 6 the Texas Juvenile Justice Department, a juvenile board, or any 7 8 other governmental entity or any student who is receiving treatment in a residential facility is not considered to be a student of the 9 10 school district in which the program or facility is physically located or of open-enrollment charter 11 an school, as 12 applicable. The performance of such a student on an assessment instrument or other achievement indicator adopted under Section 13 14 39.053 or reporting indicator adopted under Section 39.301 shall be 15 determined, reported, and considered separately from the performance of students attending a school of the district in which 16 the program or facility is physically located or an open-enrollment 17 charter school, as applicable. 18

27 SECTION 17. Except as otherwise provided by this Act, this

Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of
