SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1-18 WHEREAS, The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is charged 1-19 with ensuring the health and well-being of the nation's veterans, 1-20 but in recent years, its failure to adequately perform its mission 1-21 has been the source of scandal; and 1-22 WHEREAS, In 2014, the United States Congress responded to
