Section 206). 13 (b) Subsection (a) of this section does not apply to: 14 (1) wages paid to an individual to whom Section 15 62.057, Labor Code, applies, as that section existed on January 1, 2018; or 16 (2) an employer to which an exemption under Subchapter 17 D, Chapter 62, Labor Code, applies, as that subchapter existed on 18 January 1, 2018. 19 (c) The legislature by general law may repeal or otherwise 20 limit but may not expand the applicability of Section 62.057, Labor 21 22 Code, or an exemption under Subchapter D, Chapter 62, Labor Code,
