5	SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 76, Parks and Wildlife
6	Code, is amended by adding Section 76.0205 to read as follows:
7	Sec. 76.0205. SUSTAINABILITY OF OYSTER INDUSTRY. (a) In
8	order to enhance the viability of commercial oyster fishing and
9	ensure the sustainability of the oyster industry to accommodate the
10	highest number of commercial oyster fishing boats, a person who
11	purchases oysters under Section 47.0091 and holds a shellfish
12	certificate, as defined by Section 436.002, Health and Safety Code,
13	<u>must:</u>
14	(1) distribute, in an area designated by the
15	department, oyster shells or other cultch material approved by the
16	department in an amount equal to not less than 30 percent of the
17	total volume of oysters purchased by the person in the previous
18	license year; or
19	(2) pay a fee to the department in an amount calculated
20	under Subsection (c).
21	(b) The distribution of oyster shells or other cultch
22	material must be directly supervised by an agent or employee of the
23	department.
24	(c) The department shall calculate the current market cost

1	of the acquisition and deposition of cultch material on a per cubic
2	yard basis. The fee charged under Subsection (a)(2) is the market
3	cost established under this subsection multiplied by 30 percent of
4	the total volume of oysters purchased by the person in the previous
5	license year. The fee charged under this section shall be deposited
6	to the credit of the oyster shell recovery and replacement program
7	account.
8	(d) A person who possesses oysters that do not meet the
9	requirements of Section 76.112:
10	(1) shall replace the oysters in the beds from which
11	they were taken as directed by an authorized employee of the
12	department; and
13	(2) is subject to any penalty and must perform any
14	remedy authorized by law.
15	SECTION 2. Sections 76.101(b) and (d), Parks and Wildlife
16	Code, are amended to read as follows:
17	(b) <u>No</u> [Except as provided in Subsection (d) of this
18	section, no] person may take or attempt to take oysters from the
19	public water of this state, without the use of a boat, for pay or for
20	the purpose of sale, barter, or exchange or any other commercial
21	purpose without first having acquired from the department a
22	commercial oyster fisherman's license.
23	(d) <u>Each member of the</u> [The captain and] crew of a licensed
24	commercial oyster boat <u>is</u> [are not] required to have <u>a general</u>
25	commercial [oyster] fisherman's <u>license</u> [licenses] to take oysters
26	while they are on a licensed boat that is being used to take
27	oysters.

SECTION 3. Section 76.118, Parks and Wildlife Code, is amended by amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsections (e-2) and (e-3) to read as follows:

4 (a) Except as provided in Subsections (b), [and] (c), (e-2),
5 and (e-3) [of this section], a person who violates a provision of
6 this subchapter or a regulation of the commission issued under this
7 subchapter commits an offense that is a Class C Parks and Wildlife
8 Code misdemeanor.

(e-2) If it is shown at the trial of a defendant, including 9 10 the captain of a commercial oyster boat, a member of the crew of a commercial oyster boat, or a person who purchases oysters from the 11 12 captain or a member of the crew of a commercial oyster boat, for a violation of a statute or a regulation adopted relating to oyster 13 size that the defendant has been convicted once in the oyster season 14 in which the offense under trial was allegedly committed of a 15 violation of a statute or a regulation adopted relating to oyster 16 17 size, the defendant is guilty of a Class B Parks and Wildlife Code misdemeanor. 18

19 (e-3) If it is shown at the trial of a defendant, including the captain of a commercial oyster boat, a member of the crew of a 20 commercial oyster boat, or a person who purchases oysters from the 21 22 captain or a member of the crew of a commercial oyster boat, for a violation of a statute or a regulation adopted relating to oyster 23 size that the defendant was in possession of a cargo of oysters in 24 which 30 percent or more of the oysters were less than three inches 25 26 in length along an imaginary straight line through the long axis of the shell, the defendant is guilty of a Class B Parks and Wildlife 27

1 Code misdemeanor. 2 SECTION 4. Subchapter C, Chapter 76, Parks and Wildlife 3 Code, is amended by adding Section 76.1181 to read as follows: 4 Sec. 76.1181. SUSPENSION OF LICENSE. (a) For purposes of 5 this section, "final conviction" includes a plea of guilty or nolo contendere to or the imposition of deferred adjudication for an 6 7 offense. 8 (b) On final conviction for an offense punishable under Section 76.118(e-3), the commercial oyster boat license of the boat 9 10 used in the commission of the violation is suspended for 30 days. (c) On final conviction for an offense punishable under 11 12 Section 76.118(e-3), the commercial oyster boat captain's license of the captain of the boat used in the commission of the violation 13 is suspended for 30 days. During the period of suspension, the 14 15 holder of the suspended license may not purchase a general 16 commercial fisherman's license or a commercial oyster fisherman's 17 license. (d) On final conviction for an offense punishable under 18 19 Section 76.118(e-3), the general commercial fisherman's license of a member of the crew of a boat on which the violation was committed 20 is suspended for 30 days. During the suspension period, the holder 21 22 of the suspended license may not purchase a commercial oyster boat captain's license or a commercial oyster fisherman's license. 23

24 (d-1) On final conviction for an offense punishable under Section 76.118(e-3), the commercial oyster fisherman's license of 25 26 the person who takes or attempts to take oysters without the use of 27 a boat is suspended for 30 days.

(e) On final conviction for an offense punishable under Section 76.118(e-3), any license issued by the department to a person that purchases oysters is suspended for 30 days. During the suspension period, the holder of the suspended license may not purchase a license issued by the department allowing the taking or purchase of oysters.

7 (f) A suspension period described by this section must be 8 served during the public oyster season in which the violation 9 occurred, unless less than 30 days remain in the public oyster 10 season, in which case the suspension must be served at the beginning 11 of the next public oyster season.

12 SECTION 5. Section 76.119, Parks and Wildlife Code, is 13 amended by amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsections (c) and 14 (d) to read as follows:

15 (a) If a vessel licensed as a commercial oyster boat is involved in a violation of this chapter, the captain of the vessel 16 17 licensed as a commercial oyster boat is primarily responsible for the violation. A member of the crew of a vessel licensed as a 18 commercial oyster boat is not guilty of a violation unless the 19 member of the crew committed the violation against the captain's 20 orders, except for a violation of Section 76.109, 76.112, or 21 76.116, in which case each person on the vessel is responsible for 22 the violation. 23

24 (c) The captain of a vessel licensed as a commercial oyster
 25 boat shall identify the name of the captain, the vessel, and each
 26 member of the crew to each purchaser of oysters.

27 (d) A person who purchases oysters under Section 47.0091,

who holds a shellfish certificate as defined by Section 436.002, Health and Safety Code, and who purchases oysters from a captain of a vessel licensed as a commercial oyster boat, the holder of a commercial oyster boat license, or a member of the crew of a commercial oyster boat in violation of Section 76.109, 76.112, or 76.116 or this section may not possess the oysters and is subject to any penalty prescribed by law.

8 SECTION 6. Section 76.301, Parks and Wildlife Code, is 9 amended by amending Subsections (c) and (f) and adding Subsection 10 (h) to read as follows:

(c) A proclamation issued under Subsection (a) of this section may limit the quantity and size of oysters that may be taken, possessed, sold, or purchased and may prescribe the times, places, conditions, and means and manner of taking oysters. [However, measures dealing with sale and purchase may only be implemented at first sale or exchange transaction.]

(f) A person who violates a proclamation issued under [Subsection (a) of] this <u>subchapter</u> [section] commits an offense that is a Parks and Wildlife Code Class C misdemeanor. [An offense under this section is punishable by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$200.]

(h) A proclamation of the commission under this section applies to any person who:

24 (1) purchases oysters from the captain of a commercial 25 oyster boat, the holder of a commercial oyster boat license, or a 26 member of the crew of a commercial oyster boat;

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(2) purchases oysters under Section 47.0091; and

13	Code, is amended by adding Sections 76.405, 76.406, and 76.407 to

15	Sec. 76.405. LICENSE BUYBACK PROGRAM. (a) The department
16	shall implement a license buyback program for licenses issued under
17	this subchapter as part of the oyster license moratorium program
18	established by this subchapter.
19	(b) The commission by rule shall establish criteria, using
20	reasonable classifications, for the department's use in selecting
21	licenses to be purchased. The department or executive director
22	shall consult with the oyster license moratorium review board
23	concerning establishment of the criteria.
24	(c) The department shall retire each license purchased
25	under the license buyback program until the commission finds that
26	management of the oyster fishery allows reissue of those licenses
27	through auction or lottery.

Sec. 76.406. PREVAILING AUTHORITY. A proclamation of the 18 commission under this subchapter prevails over any conflicting 19 provision of this chapter to the extent of the conflict. 20 21 Sec. 76.407. REPORT TO LEGISLATURE. (a) Not later than November 1, 2020, the department shall report to the governor and 22 each member of the legislature an overview of the administration 23 24 and status of the oyster license buyback program, including the biological, sociological, and economic effects of the program. 25 26 (b) This section expires September 1, 2021. 27 SECTION 9. The Parks and Wildlife Commission shall adopt

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any rules required to implement Sections 76.405, 76.406, and
 76.407, Parks and Wildlife Code, as added by this Act, not later
 than June 1, 2018.

There would be a positive, but indeterminate, revenue gain to the General Revenue-Dedicated Game, Fish, and Water Safety Account No. 9 due to unknown collections from a new fee and new commercial fishing license requirements.

The bill would amend the Parks and Wildlife Code to require those who purchase oysters and hold a shellfish certificate to distribute oyster shells or other approved material in an amount equal to 30 percent or more of the total volume of oysters purchased, or pay a fee determined by the Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD).

The bill would also amend the Parks and Wildlife Code pertaining to certain criminal and administrative penalties related to oyster size limits. The bill would require each member of the crew of a licensed oyster boat to possess a valid commercial fishing license, and the bill would also prohibit the taking of oysters without the use of a boat for commercial purposes. The bill would prohibit those who purchase oysters from possessing oysters that were illegally harvested and make those purchasers subject to penalties.

The bill would also amend the Parks and Wildlife Code to allow the TPWD to establish a vessel monitoring system for commercial oyster boats. Before establishing such a system, TPWD would be required to consult with oyster boat license holders concerning its implementation.

The bill would further amend the Parks and Wildlife Code to implement a commercial oyster boat license buyback program. The bill would require the TPWD retain at least 20 percent of the fees from resident and non-resident commercial oyster boat licenses within the General Revenue-Dedicated Game, Fish, and Water Safety Account No. 9 to be used for the buying back of commercial oyster boat licenses from willing holders. The bill would allow TPWD to reissue retired licenses through auction or lottery.

Based upon information provided by the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the bill could increase revenue to the Game, Fish, and Water Safety Account No. 9 (Fund 9) by an indeterminate amount, as the portion of oyster purchasers who would choose to pay a fee rather than distribute shell or cultch material cannot be determined. According to information provided by TPWD, 2,494,446 pounds, or 388,543 sacks, of oysters were harvested in 2016, and the average cost of oyster bed restoration totaled \$1.32 per sack of oysters, resulting in maximum revenue of \$512,877 under the provisions of the bill. The bill would also result in additional cost to the agency in an amount equivalent to the additional revenue for oyster bed restoration. Based upon information provided

by TPWD, the bill would also result in minimal revenue increase to Fund 9 as a result of the requirement that all crew members of oyster boats possess commercial fishing licenses. The Comptroller's 2018-19 Biennial Revenue Estimate anticipates revenue to Fund 9 for 2018 of \$142,643,000 and \$144,499,000 for 2019.

Based on information provided by the TPWD, duties and responsibilities associated with implementing the provisions of the bill related to the vessel monitoring system and license buyback program could be accomplished by utilizing existing resources.

The bill would do one or more of the following: create or recreate a dedicated account in the General Revenue Fund, create or recreate a special or trust fund either with or outside of the Treasury, or create a dedicated revenue source. Legislative policy, implemented as Government Code 403.094, consolidated special funds (except those affected by constitutional, federal, or other restrictions) into the General Revenue Fund as of August 31, 1993 and eliminated all applicable statutory revenue dedications as of August 31, 1995. Each subsequent Legislature has reviewed bills that affect funds consolidation. The fund, account, or revenue dedication included in this bill would be subject to funds consolidation review by the current Legislature.

Provisions of the bill relating to oyster shell restoration, the vessel monitoring system, and criminal penalties would take effect on September 1, 2017. Provisions of the bill relating to the oyster boat license buyback program would take effect June 1, 2018.

No significant fiscal implication to the State is anticipated.

The bill would amend the Parks and Wildlife Code to allow the Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) to establish a vessel monitoring system for commercial oyster boats. Before establishing such a system, TPWD would be required to consult with oyster boat license holders concerning its implementation. The bill would further amend the Parks and Wildlife Code pertaining to certain criminal penalties by adding oyster size limits to the list of violations a crew member can be guilty of regardless of whether the violation occurred against the captain's orders.

The bill would further amend the Parks and Wildlife Code to implement a commercial oyster boat license buyback program. The bill would require the TPWD retain at least 20 percent of the fees from resident and non-resident commercial oyster boat licenses within the Game, Fish, and Water Safety Account No. 9 to be used for the buying back of commercial oyster boat licenses from willing holders. The bill would allow TPWD to reissue retired licenses through auction or lottery.

According to information provided by the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the bill could reduce revenue to the Game, Fish, and Water Safety Account No. 9 by an indeterminate amount. This analysis assumes there would be a minimal revenue loss to this account.

The bill would do one or more of the following: create or recreate a dedicated account in the General Revenue Fund, create or recreate a special or trust fund either with or outside of the Treasury, or create a dedicated revenue source. Legislative policy, implemented as Government Code 403.094, consolidated special funds (except those affected by constitutional, federal, or other restrictions) into the General Revenue Fund as of August 31, 1993 and eliminated all applicable statutory revenue dedications as of August 31, 1995. Each subsequent Legislature has reviewed bills that affect funds consolidation. The fund, account, or revenue dedication included in this bill would be subject to funds consolidation review by the current Legislature.

Based on information provided by the Parks and Wildlife Department, duties and responsibilities associated with implementing the provisions of the bill could be accomplished by utilizing existing resources.

Provisions of the bill relating to the vessel monitoring system and criminal penalty would take effect on September 1, 2017. Provisions of the bill relating to the oyster boat license buyback program would take effect June 1, 2018.

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Local Government Impact

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No significant fiscal implication to units of local government is anticipated.
