A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Section 4.001(b), Education Code, is amended to
- 6 read as follows:
- 7 (b) The objectives of public education are:
- 8 OBJECTIVE 1: Parents will be full partners with educators
- 9 in the education of their children.
- 10 OBJECTIVE 2: Students will be encouraged and challenged to
- 11 meet their full educational potential.
- OBJECTIVE 3: Through enhanced dropout prevention efforts,
- 13 all students will remain in school until they obtain a high school
- 14 diploma.
- OBJECTIVE 4: A well-balanced and appropriate curriculum
- 16 will be provided to all students. Through that curriculum,
- 17 students will be prepared to succeed in a variety of postsecondary
- 18 activities, including employment, workforce training, and
- 19 enrollment in institutions of higher education.
- OBJECTIVE 5: Educators will prepare students to be
- 21 thoughtful, active citizens who have an appreciation for the basic
- 22 values of our state and national heritage and who can understand and
- 23 productively function in a free enterprise society.
- OBJECTIVE 6: Qualified and highly effective personnel will

- OBJECTIVE 7: The state's students will demonstrate

- 5 OBJECTIVE 8: School campuses will maintain a safe and

- 7 OBJECTIVE 9: Educators will keep abreast of the development
- 8 of creative and innovative techniques in instruction and
- 9 administration using those techniques as appropriate to improve
- 10 student learning.
- OBJECTIVE 10: Technology will be implemented and used to
- 12 increase the effectiveness of student learning, instructional
- 13 management, staff development, and administration.
- OBJECTIVE 11: The State Board of Education, the agency, and
- 15 the commissioner shall assist school districts and charter schools
- 16 in providing career and technology education and effective
- 17 workforce training opportunities to students.
- 18 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 19 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 20 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 21 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 22 Act takes effect September 1, 2017.

IN RE: HB136 by Bell (Relating to inclusion of career and technology education and workforce training in the mission of public education.), As Passed 2nd House

No significant fiscal implication to the State is anticipated.

The bill would amend Education Code Sec. 4.001 (b), which lists ten objectives for public education in Texas. The bill would amend objective four to state that through the state's curriculum, students should be "prepared to succeed in a variety of postsecondary activities, including employment and enrollment in institutions of higher education." The bill would also add a new objective that the State Board of Education, the Texas Education Agency (TEA), and commissioner of education should assist school districts and charter schools in providing career and technology education (CTE).

According to TEA, the agency and the SBOE already conduct activities consistent with the bill's requirements.

The bill would take effect immediately if it received a two-thirds vote in each house of the Legislature. Otherwise it would take effect September 1, 2017.

Local Government Impact

According to TEA, there are between 200 and 300 school districts that do not currently offer CTE programs. To the degree that those school districts expand the services they provide to satisfy the amended objectives, those districts could see increased costs. These costs could vary widely depending on the type of courses the district begins to offer to fulfill the requirements of the bill.
