9	Sec. 92A.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
10	(1) "Motor vehicle" means a vehicle that is
11	self-propelled or a trailer or semitrailer designed for use with a
12	self-propelled vehicle.
13	(2) "Vulnerable individual" means:
14	(A) a child younger than seven years of age; or
15	(B) an individual who by reason of age or
16	physical or mental disease, defect, or injury is substantially
17	unable to protect the individual's self from harm.
18	Sec. 92A.002. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY. A person who, by
19	force or otherwise, enters a motor vehicle for the purpose of
20	removing a vulnerable individual from the vehicle is immune from
21	civil liability for damages resulting from that entry or removal if
22	the person:
23	(1) determines that:
24	(A) the motor vehicle is locked; or

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(B) there is no reasonable method for the 1 2 individual to exit the motor vehicle without assistance; (2) has a good faith and reasonable belief, based on 3 known circumstances, that entry into the motor vehicle is necessary 4 5 to avoid imminent harm to the individual; 6 (3) before entering the motor vehicle, ensures that 7 law enforcement is notified or 911 is called if the person is not a 8 law enforcement officer or other first responder; 9 (4) uses no more force to enter the motor vehicle and remove the individual than is necessary; and 10 (5) remains with the individual in a safe location 11 12 that is in reasonable proximity to the motor vehicle until a law enforcement officer or other first responder arrives. 13 Sec. 92A.003. EFFECT ON OTHER LAWS. This chapter does not 14 15 affect limitation under Section 74.151 or 74.152 of a person's liability for good faith administration of emergency care. 16 17 SECTION 2. Chapter 92A, Civil Practice and Remedies Code, as added by this Act, applies only to a cause of action that accrues 18 on or after the effective date of this Act. 19 20 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2017.
