10	Chapter 1601, or Chapter 1602 to account for any hours of
11	instruction completed under those chapters on the basis of clock
12	hours or credit hours; and
13	(2) establish standards for determining the
14	equivalency and conversion of clock hours to credit hours and
15	credit hours to clock hours.
16	SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2017.

#### A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

#### 1 AN ACT 2 relating to the regulation of barbering and cosmetology. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 3 SECTION 1. Section 1602.254(b), Occupations Code, is 4 amended to read as follows: 5 (b) To be eligible for an operator license, an applicant 6 must meet the requirements of Subsection (c) or: 7 8 (1) be at least 17 years of age; (2) have obtained a high school diploma or the 9 equivalent of a high school diploma or have passed a valid 10 examination administered by a certified testing agency that 11 measures the person's ability to benefit from training; and 12 (3) have completed: 13 (A) 1,000 [1,500] hours of instruction in a 14 licensed beauty culture school; or 15 (B) 1,000 hours of instruction in beauty culture 16 courses and 500 hours of related high school courses prescribed by 17 the commission in a vocational cosmetology program in a public 18 19 school. SECTION 2. Section 1602.451(a), Occupations Code, is 20 amended to read as follows: 21 (a) The holder of a private beauty culture school license 22 shall: 23

24 (1) maintain a sanitary establishment;

1 (2) maintain on duty one licensed instructor for each 2 25 students in attendance; (3) maintain a daily record of students' attendance; 3 establish regular class and instruction hours and (4) 4 grades; 5 (5) require a school term of not less than <u>six</u> [nine] 6 months and not less than 1,000 [1,500] hours instruction for a 7 8 complete course in cosmetology; (6) require a school term of not less than 600 hours 9 instruction for a complete course in manicuring; 10 (7) hold examinations before issuing diplomas; 11 12 (8) maintain a copy of the school's curriculum in a conspicuous place and verify that the curriculum is being followed; 13 14 (9) publish in the school's catalogue and enrollment contract a description of the refund policy required under Section 15 1602.458; and 16 (10) provide the department with information on: 17 (A) the current course completion rates of 18 students who attend a course of instruction offered by the school; 19 20 and (B) job placement rates and employment rates of 21 22 students who complete the course of instruction. SECTION 3. Section 1603.102, Occupations Code, is amended 23 to read as follows: 24 25 Sec. 1603.102. SANITATION RULES. (a) The commission shall 26 establish sanitation rules to prevent the spread of an infectious or contagious disease. 27

(b) Rules adopted under this section applicable to an
 individual or facility regulated under Chapter 1602 shall be
 consistent with the standards and terminology related to safety and
 sanitation that are commonly used in the cosmetology industry.

5 SECTION 4. Section 1603.255, Occupations Code, is amended 6 to read as follows:

Sec. 1603.255. EARLY EXAMINATION. The department may allow for the early written examination of a student who has completed the following number of hours of instruction in a department-approved training program:

(1) 1,000 hours for a student seeking a Class A barber
certificate [or operator license] in a private barber [or
School; [or]

14 (2) <u>900 hours for a student seeking an operator</u>
15 license in a private cosmetology school; or

16 (3) 900 hours for a student seeking a Class A barber 17 certificate or operator license in a publicly funded barber or 18 cosmetology school.

SECTION 5. Section 1603.256(c), Occupations Code, is amended to read as follows:

(c) The following persons may administer a practicalexamination required under this subchapter:

23 (1) the department; [<del>or</del>]

24 (2) a person with whom the department contracts under
 25 Section 1603.252; or

26 (3) a private beauty culture school or a vocational
 27 cosmetology program in a public school licensed under this chapter

2 SECTION 6. Section 1603.351, Occupations Code, is amended
3 by adding Subsection (a-1) to read as follows:

4 (a-1) Notwithstanding any other law, the commission may
5 adopt rules to:

6 (1) authorize a school licensed under this chapter, 7 Chapter 1601, or Chapter 1602 to account for any hours of 8 instruction completed under those chapters on the basis of clock 9 hours or credit hours; and

10 (2) establish standards for determining the 11 equivalency and conversion of clock hours to credit hours and 12 credit hours to clock hours.

13 SECTION 7. As soon as practicable after the effective date 14 of this Act, the Texas Commission of Licensing and Regulation shall 15 adopt rules implementing Chapter 1602, Occupations Code, as amended 16 by this Act.

SECTION 8. The change in law made by this Act to Section 18 1602.254(b), Occupations Code, applies only to an application for 19 an operator license submitted on or after September 1, 2018. An 20 application for an operator license submitted before that date is 21 governed by the law in effect on the date the application was 22 submitted, and the former law is continued in effect for that 23 purpose.

SECTION 9. The change in law made by this Act to Section 1603.256(c), Occupations Code, applies to an examination administered on or after the effective date of this Act. An examination administered before the effective date of this Act is

1 governed by the law in effect on the date the examination was 2 administered, and that law is continued in effect for that purpose.

3 SECTION 10. (a) The changes in law made by this Act do not 4 affect the validity of a proceeding pending before a court or other 5 governmental entity on the effective date of this Act.

6 (b) An offense or other violation of law committed before 7 the effective date of this Act is governed by the law in effect when 8 the offense or violation was committed, and the former law is 9 continued in effect for that purpose. For purposes of this 10 subsection, an offense or violation was committed before the 11 effective date of this Act if any element of the offense or 12 violation occurred before that date.

13 SECTION 11. This Act takes effect September 1, 2017.
