H.B. No. 3576

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

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- 2 relating to the investigation of, and release of information
- 3 concerning, communicable disease, including the Zika virus and
- 4 other high consequence communicable diseases.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 6 SECTION 1. Section 81.046(c), Health and Safety Code, as
- 7 amended by Chapters 789 (H.B. 2646) and 1278 (S.B. 1574), Acts of
- 8 the 84th Legislature, Regular Session, 2015, is reenacted and
- 9 amended to read as follows:
- 10 (c) Medical or epidemiological information, including
- 11 information linking a person who is exposed to a person with a
- 12 communicable disease, may be released:
- 13 (1) for statistical purposes if released in a manner
- 14 that prevents the identification of any person;
- 15 (2) with the consent of each person identified in the
- 16 information;
- 17 (3) to medical personnel treating the individual,
- 18 appropriate state agencies in this state or another state, a health
- 19 authority or local health department in this state or another
- 20 state, or federal, county, or district courts to comply with this
- 21 chapter and related rules relating to the control and treatment of
- 22 communicable diseases and health conditions or under another state
- 23 or federal law that expressly authorizes the disclosure of this
- 24 information;

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- 1 (4) to appropriate federal agencies, such as the
- 2 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention [of the United States
- 3 Public Health Service], but, except as provided under Subsection
- 4 (c-3), the information must be limited to the name, address, sex,
- 5 race, and occupation of the patient, the date of disease onset, the
- 6 probable source of infection, and other requested information
- 7 relating to the case or suspected case of a communicable disease or
- 8 health condition;
- 9 (5) to medical personnel to the extent necessary in a
- 10 medical emergency to protect the health or life of the person
- 11 identified in the information; [or]
- 12 (6) to a designated infection control officer;
- 13 $\underline{(7)}$ [$\overline{(6)}$] to governmental entities that provide first
- 14 responders who may respond to a situation involving a potential
- 15 communicable disease of concern and need the information to
- 16 properly respond to the situation; or
- (8) $\left[\frac{(7)}{1}\right]$ to a local health department or health
- 18 authority for a designated monitoring period based on the potential
- 19 risk for developing symptoms of a communicable disease of concern.
- 20 SECTION 2. Section 81.046, Health and Safety Code, is
- 21 amended by adding Subsection (c-3) to read as follows:
- 22 (c-3) The following medical or epidemiological information
- 23 relating to a person who has or is suspected of having a present or
- 24 potential health condition resulting from exposure to a high
- 25 consequence communicable disease, such as the Zika virus, may be
- 26 released to an appropriate federal agency:
- 27 (1) the name, address, sex, race, and occupation of

- 1 the person;
- 2 (2) the date of the onset of the health condition;
- 3 (3) the probable source of infection or exposure; and
- 4 (4) other requested information relating to the case
- 5 or suspected case of the infection.
- 6 SECTION 3. Sections 81.061(a) and (c), Health and Safety
- 7 Code, are amended to read as follows:
- 8 (a) The department shall investigate the causes and effects
- 9 of communicable disease and methods of prevention.
- 10 (c) The department may investigate the existence of
- 11 communicable disease in the state to determine the nature and
- 12 extent of the disease and potential effects on the health of
- 13 individuals and to formulate and evaluate the control measures used
- 14 to protect the public health. A person shall provide records and
- 15 other information to the department on request according to the
- 16 department's written instructions.
- 17 SECTION 4. To the extent of any conflict, this Act prevails
- 18 over another Act of the 85th Legislature, Regular Session, 2017,
- 19 relating to nonsubstantive additions to and corrections in enacted
- 20 codes.
- 21 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect September 1, 2017.
