4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Chapter 8, Education Code, is amended by adding
6	Subchapter E to read as follows:
7	SUBCHAPTER E. MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE USE RESOURCES FOR
8	SCHOOL DISTRICT PERSONNEL
9	Sec. 8.151. DEFINITIONS. In this subchapter, "local mental
10	health authority" and "non-physician mental health professional"
11	have the meanings assigned by Section 571.003, Health and Safety
12	Code.
13	Sec. 8.152. EMPLOYMENT OF NON-PHYSICIAN MENTAL HEALTH
14	PROFESSIONAL AS MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE USE RESOURCE. (a) A
15	local mental health authority shall employ a non-physician mental
16	health professional to serve as a mental health and substance use
17	resource for school districts located in the region served by a
18	regional education service center and in which the local mental
19	health authority provides services.
20	(b) If two or more local mental health authorities provide
21	services in a region served by a regional education service center,
22	the local mental health authority that primarily operates in the
23	county in which the center is located shall:
24	(1) employ the non-physician mental health

1	professional;
2	(2) in making a hiring decision, consult with other
3	local mental health authorities providing services in that region;
4	and
5	(3) before making the final hiring decision, consult
6	with the center.
7	Sec. 8.153. INTERAGENCY COLLABORATION; MEMORANDUM OF
8	UNDERSTANDING. (a) A local mental health authority that employs a
9	non-physician mental health professional under Section 8.152 and
10	the regional education service center shall collaborate in carrying
11	out this subchapter.
12	(b) Each regional education service center shall provide
13	for a non-physician mental health professional employed for the
14	region served by the center with a space for the professional to
15	carry out the professional's duties under Section 8.155. The local
16	mental health authority that employs the professional shall pay the
17	center a reasonable, negotiated cost-recovery fee for providing the
18	space and administrative support as outlined in the memorandum of
19	understanding entered into under Subsection (c). The cost-recovery
20	fee may not exceed \$15,000 per year unless the local mental health
21	authority and center agree to a higher amount.
22	(c) A local mental health authority and a regional education
23	service center shall enter into a memorandum of understanding for
24	the administration of this section.
25	Sec. 8.154. SUPERVISION OF NON-PHYSICIAN MENTAL HEALTH
26	PROFESSIONAL. A local mental health authority that employs a
27	non-physician mental health professional under Section 8.152

1	shall:
2	(1) supervise the professional in carrying out the
3	professional's duties under Section 8.155; and
4	(2) consult with any other local mental health
5	authorities in the region and the regional education service center
6	for input on supervising the professional.
7	Sec. 8.155. DUTIES OF NON-PHYSICIAN MENTAL HEALTH
8	PROFESSIONAL. (a) A non-physician mental health professional
9	employed under Section 8.152 shall, to the greatest extent
10	possible, work collaboratively with the regional education service
11	center and shall act as a resource for the center and school
12	district personnel by:
13	(1) helping personnel gain awareness and a better
14	understanding of mental health and co-occurring mental health and
15	substance use disorders;
16	(2) assisting personnel to implement initiatives
17	related to mental health or substance use under state law or agency
18	rules, interagency memorandums of understanding, and related
19	programs;
20	(3) ensuring personnel are aware of:
21	(A) the list of recommended best practice-based
22	programs and research-based practices developed under Section
23	161.325, Health and Safety Code;
24	(B) other public and private mental health and
25	substance use prevention, treatment, and recovery programs
26	available in the school district, including evidence-based
27	programs provided by a local mental health authority and other

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1 public or private mental health providers; and 2 (C) other available public and private mental 3 health and substance use prevention, treatment, and recovery program resources administered by the local mental health authority 4 5 or the Health and Human Services Commission to support school districts, students, and families; 6 7 (4) on a monthly basis, facilitating mental health 8 first aid training; 9 (5) on a monthly basis, facilitating training 10 regarding the effects of grief and trauma and providing support to children with intellectual or developmental disabilities who 11 12 suffer from grief or trauma; and (6) on a monthly basis, facilitating training on 13 prevention and intervention programs that have been shown to be 14 15 effective in helping students cope with pressures to: 16 (A) use alcohol, cigarettes, or illegal drugs; or 17 (B) misuse prescription drugs. (b) A non-physician mental health professional employed 18 19 under Section 8.152 may not treat or provide counseling to a student 20 or provide specific advice to school district personnel regarding a student. 21 Sec. 8.156. PARTICIPATION BY SCHOOL DISTRICT NOT REQUIRED. 22 This subchapter does not require a school district to participate 23 24 in training provided by a non-physician mental health professional or otherwise use the professional as a resource. 25 26 Sec. 8.157. DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDING. A state agency to 27 which money is appropriated to carry out this subchapter shall

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1 ensure that the money is distributed equally among the local mental health authorities that employ and supervise non-physician mental 2 3 health professionals under this subchapter. 4 Sec. 8.158. REPORT. (a) Before the last business day of each calendar year, each local mental health authority that employs 5 and supervises a non-physician mental health professional under 6 7 this subchapter shall prepare and submit a report to the Health and Human Services Commission regarding the outcomes for school 8 districts and students resulting from services provided by the 9 10 non-physician mental health professional. (b) Not later than January 31 of the following calendar 11 12 year, the Health and Human Services Commission shall compile the information submitted under this section and prepare and submit a 13 report to the lieutenant governor, the speaker of the house of 14 15 representatives, each standing committee of the legislature having

primary jurisdiction over mental health, each standing committee of the legislature having primary jurisdiction over public education, and the agency. Before submitting the report under this subsection, the commission shall provide the agency a reasonable opportunity to review and provide input on the contents of the report.

SECTION 2. A local mental health authority is required to implement a provision of this Act only if the legislature appropriates money specifically for that purpose. If the legislature does not appropriate money specifically for that purpose, a local mental health authority may, but is not required to, implement a provision of this Act using other appropriations

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available for that purpose.
SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
