Sec. 153.371. RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF NONPARENT APPOINTED AS 16 17 SOLE MANAGING CONSERVATOR. Unless limited by court order or other provisions of this chapter, a nonparent, a licensed child-placing 18 19 agency, or the Department of Family and Protective Services appointed as a managing conservator of the child has the following 20 rights and duties: 21

(1) the right to have physical possession and to 22 23 direct the moral and religious training of the child;

24 (2) the duty of care, control, protection, and reasonable discipline of the child; 25

26 (3) the duty to provide the child with clothing, food, shelter, education, and medical, psychological, and dental care; 27

(4) the right to consent for the child to medical,
 psychiatric, psychological, dental, and surgical treatment and to
 have access to the child's medical records;

7 (6) the right to the services and earnings of the 8 child;

9 (7) the right to consent to marriage and to enlistment 10 in the armed forces of the United States;

(8) the right to represent the child in legal action and to make other decisions of substantial legal significance concerning the child;

(9) except when a guardian of the child's estate or a guardian or attorney ad litem has been appointed for the child, the right to act as an agent of the child in relation to the child's estate if the child's action is required by a state, the United States, or a foreign government;

(10) the right to designate the primary residence of the child and to make decisions regarding the child's education; [and]

(11) if the parent-child relationship has been terminated with respect to the parents, or only living parent, or if there is no living parent, the right to consent to the adoption of the child and to make any other decision concerning the child that a parent could make; and

The changes in law made by this Act apply only to5a suit affecting the parent-child relationship that is pending in a6trial court on or filed on or after the effective date of this Act.7SECTION 4.
