A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

1-22 relating to the use of the skills development fund by certain 1-23 entities. 1-24

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

1-25 SECTION 1. Section 303.001(a), Labor Code, is amended to 1-26 read as follows:

(a) The purpose of this chapter is to remove administrative 1-27 1-28 barriers that impede the response of public community and technical colleges, community-based organizations, <u>local workforce</u> <u>development boards</u>, <u>public libraries</u>, and the Texas <u>A&M</u> Engineering 1-29 1-30 Extension Service to industry and workforce training needs and to 1-31 develop incentives for public community and technical colleges, community-based organizations, <u>local workforce development boards</u>, 1-32 1-33 public libraries, and the Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service 1-34 1-35 to provide customized assessment and training in a timely and 1-36 efficient manner.

Section 303.002(b), Labor Code, is amended to 1-37 SECTION 2. 1-38 read as follows:

1-39 (b) A public community or technical college or the Texas A&M 1-40 Engineering Extension Service may recover customized assessment 1-41 and training costs incurred by the institution if:
