A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to the inclusion of satisfactory performance on certain postsecondary readiness assessment instruments in the indicators 3 for evaluating the performance of public schools. 4 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: SECTION 1. Section 39.0238(f), Education Code, is amended 6 to read as follows: 7 The results of a postsecondary readiness assessment 8 (f) instrument administered under this section may not be used by: 9 (1) [the agency for accountability purposes for a 10 school campus or school district; 11 12 [(2)] a school district: 13 for the purpose of teacher evaluations; or (A) 14 (B) in determining a student's final course grade or determining a student's class rank for the purpose of high school 15 16 graduation; or (2) [(3)] an institution of higher education: 17 18 (A) for admission purposes; or to determine eligibility for a TEXAS grant. 19 (B) Section 39.053(c), Education Code, as amended by 20 SECTION 2. 21 Chapters 807 (H.B. 22), 842 (H.B. 2223), and 1088 (H.B. 3593), Acts of the 85th Legislature, Regular Session, 2017, is reenacted and 22 23 amended to read as follows: 24 (c) School districts and campuses must be evaluated based on

No. 843 1 three domains of indicators of achievement adopted under this section that include: 2 3 (1)in the student achievement domain, indicators of student achievement that must include: 4 5 (A) for evaluating the performance of districts and campuses generally: 6 7 (i) an indicator that accounts for the 8 results of assessment instruments required under Sections 39.023(a), (c), and (l), as applicable for the district and campus, 9 10 including the results of assessment instruments required for graduation retaken by a student, aggregated across grade levels by 11 12 subject area, including: 13 (a) for the performance standard 14 determined by the commissioner under Section 39.0241(a), the 15 percentage of students who performed satisfactorily on the assessment instruments, aggregated across grade levels by subject 16 17 area; and (b) for the college 18 readiness performance standard as determined under Section 39.0241, the 19 20 percentage of students who performed satisfactorily on the assessment instruments, aggregated across grade levels by subject 21 22 area; and an indicator that accounts for the 23 (ii) 24 results of assessment instruments required under Section 39.023(b), as applicable for the district and campus, including the 25 26 percentage of students who performed satisfactorily on the

No. 843 1 adopted by the agency, aggregated across grade levels by subject 2 area; and 3 (B) for evaluating the performance of high school and districts that include high school 4 campuses campuses, indicators that account for: 5 6 (i) students who satisfy the Texas Success 7 Initiative (TSI) college readiness benchmarks prescribed by the 8 Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board under Section 51.334 on an assessment instrument in reading or mathematics designated by 9 the coordinating board under that section; 10 11 (ii) students who satisfy relevant 12 performance standards on advanced placement tests or similar 13 assessments; 14 (iii) students who earn dual course credits 15 in the dual credit courses; 16 (iv) students who enlist in the armed 17 forces of the United States; 18 (v) students who earn industry 19 certifications; 20 (vi) students admitted into postsecondary 21 industry certification programs that require as a prerequisite for entrance successful performance at the secondary level; 22 23 (vii) students whose successful completion 24 of a course or courses under Section 28.014 indicates the student's preparation to enroll and succeed, without remediation, in an 25 26 entry-level general education course for a baccalaureate degree or associate degree; 27

1 (viii) students who successfully met standards on a composite of indicators that through research 2 3 indicates the student's preparation to enroll and succeed, without remediation, in an entry-level general education course for a 4 baccalaureate degree or associate degree; 5 (ix) high school graduation rates, computed 6 7 in accordance with standards and definitions adopted in compliance 8 with the Every Student Succeeds Act (20 U.S.C. Section 6301 et seq.) subject to the exclusions provided by Subsections (g), (g-1), 9 10 (g-2), and (g-3); 11 (x) students who successfully completed an 12 OnRamps dual enrollment course; [and] 13 (xi) [the percentage of] students who 14 successfully completed a practicum or internship approved by the 15 State Board of Education; 16 (xii) students who are awarded an associate 17 [associate's] degree; and (xiii) students who: 18 19 (a) satisfy the relevant performance standards on an Algebra II or English III postsecondary readiness 20 assessment instrument administered under Section 39.0238; or 21 22 (b) successfully completed an Algebra II or English III course with a grade of at least the equivalent of 23 24 70 on a scale of 100; in the school progress domain, indicators for 25 (2) 26 effectiveness in promoting student learning, which must include: 27 (A) for assessment instruments, including

1 assessment instruments under Subdivisions (1)(A)(i) and (ii), the 2 percentage of students who met the standard for improvement, as 3 determined by the commissioner; and

4 (B) for evaluating relative performance, the
5 performance of districts and campuses compared to similar districts
6 or campuses; and

7 (3) in the closing the gaps domain, the use of 8 disaggregated data to demonstrate the differentials among students 9 from different racial and ethnic groups, socioeconomic 10 backgrounds, and other factors, including:

11 (A) students formerly receiving special 12 education services;

13 (B) students continuously enrolled; and

(C) students who are mobile.

15 SECTION 3. To the extent of any conflict, this Act prevails 16 over another Act of the 86th Legislature, Regular Session, 2019, 17 relating to nonsubstantive additions to and corrections in enacted 18 codes.

SECTION 4. This Act applies beginning with the 2019-2020 school year.

SECTION 5. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
