A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

2 relating to testing for lead contamination in public school

- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 38, Education Code, is
- 6 amended by adding Section 38.039 to read as follows:
- 7 Sec. 38.039. REQUIRED TESTING FOR LEAD CONTAMINATION IN
- 8 PUBLIC SCHOOL DRINKING WATER. (a) In this section:
- 9 <u>(1) "First-draw tap test" means a water sample</u>
- 10 collected and tested in the manner prescribed by the federal
- 11 monitoring requirements for lead and copper in tap water under 40
- 12 <u>C.F.R. Section 141.86(b).</u>
- 13 (2) "Safe Drinking Water Act" means the federal Safe
- 14 Drinking Water Act (42 U.S.C. Section 300f et seq.).
- 15 (b) In addition to any water test required by the Safe
- 16 Drinking Water Act, each school district and open-enrollment
- 17 charter school shall conduct first-draw tap tests of potable water
- 18 outlets every five years, before the start of the school year, to
- 19 monitor the amount of lead in the water in each occupied school
- 20 building under the jurisdiction of the district or school. The
- 21 district or school shall perform the first-draw tap test as
- 22 required by this section by using existing qualified personnel or
- 23 through a third party.
- 24 (c) If a person conducting a first-draw tap test determines

- 1 that the amount of lead in a potable water outlet of a school
- 2 building exceeds the level of lead considered safe for human
- 3 consumption as established by rules adopted under Subsection (h),
- 4 the affected school district or open-enrollment charter school
- 5 shall prevent the use of the potable water outlet until:
- 6 (1) the district or school implements a lead
- 7 remediation plan designed to lower the level of lead in the potable
- 8 water outlet; and
- 9 (2) tests confirm the water in the potable water
- 10 <u>outlet is safe for human consumption.</u>
- 11 (d) A school district or open-enrollment charter school is
- 12 not required to conduct a first-draw tap test on a water outlet
- 13 under this section if the outlet is located in a school building
- 14 that is lead free, as defined by the Safe Drinking Water Act (42
- 15 <u>U.S.C. Section 300g-6).</u>
- 16 (e) A school district or open-enrollment charter school is
- 17 not required to conduct the first-draw tap tests under this section
- 18 if the district or school has fewer than 1,000 students and is
- 19 unable to secure funding for the tests from grants or donations.
- 20 (f) Each school district and open-enrollment charter school
- 21 that conducts lead testing under this section shall make the test
- 22 <u>results and any lead remediation plan available to the public by:</u>
- 23 (1) posting the information on the district's or
- 24 school's Internet website; or
- 25 (2) any other method the district or school considers
- 26 appropriate.
- 27 (g) Each school district and open-enrollment charter school

- 1 shall:
- 2 (1) submit the information described by Subsection
- 3 (f), in a format approved by the agency, to each local health
- 4 authority with jurisdiction in the municipality or county in which
- 5 the district or school is located; and
- 6 (2) maintain a record of the information submitted
- 7 under Subdivision (1) for a period not less than 12 years from the
- 8 date the information was submitted.
- 9 (h) The commissioner, in consultation with the Texas
- 10 Commission on Environmental Quality, shall adopt rules to implement
- 11 this section, including rules to establish the level of lead in
- 12 drinking water that is considered safe for human consumption. The
- 13 rules adopted under this section must be consistent with the
- 14 requirements for school districts or open-enrollment charter
- 15 schools that are classified as a public water system under the Safe
- 16 <u>Drinking Water Act.</u>
- 17 SECTION 2. (a) Except as provided by Subsection (b) of
- 18 this section, this Act applies beginning with the 2020-2021 school
- 19 year.
- 20 (b) A school district or open-enrollment charter school
- 21 that has completed first-draw tap tests of potable water outlets
- 22 during the 36-month period preceding the effective date of this Act
- 23 shall comply with this Act beginning with the 2022-2023 school
- 24 year.
- 25 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
