[(a)] The 38th Judicial District is composed of 12 $[Medina_{\tau}]$ Real $[\tau]$ and Uvalde counties. [(b) The terms of the 38th District Court begin: 13 14 [(1) in Medina County on the first Mondays in January and June; 15 16 [(2) in Real County on the first Mondays in April and 17 November; and 18 [(3) in Uvalde County on the first Mondays in February 19 and September.] SECTION 2. Subchapter C, Chapter 24, Government Code, is 20 amended by adding Section 24.598 to read as follows: 21 Sec. 24.598. 454TH JUDICIAL DISTRICT (MEDINA COUNTY). The 22 23 454th Judicial District is composed of Medina County. SECTION 3. Section 44.001, Government Code, is amended to 24

The voters of each of the following 2 3 counties elect a criminal district attorney: Anderson, Austin, Bastrop, Bexar, Bowie, Brazoria, Caldwell, Calhoun, Cass, Collin, 4 5 Comal, Dallas, Deaf Smith, Denton, Eastland, Fannin, Galveston, Grayson, Gregg, Harrison, Hays, Hidalgo, Jackson, 6 Jasper, Jefferson, Kaufman, Kendall, Lubbock, McLennan, Madison, Medina, 7 8 Navarro, Newton, Panola, Polk, Randall, Rockwall, San Jacinto, Smith, Tarrant, Taylor, Tyler, Upshur, Van Zandt, Victoria, Walker, 9 10 Waller, Wichita, Wood, and Yoakum.

20 <u>(b) The criminal district attorney has all the powers,</u> 21 <u>duties, and privileges in Medina County that are conferred by law on</u> 22 <u>county and district attorneys in the various counties and</u> 23 <u>districts.</u>

(c) The criminal district attorney shall attend each term
 and session of the district and inferior courts of Medina County,
 except municipal courts, held for the transaction of criminal
 business and shall exclusively represent the state in all criminal

1 matters before those courts. 2 (d) The criminal district attorney shall represent Medina 3 County in any court in which the county has pending business. This subsection does not require the criminal district attorney to 4 5 represent the county in a delinquent tax suit or condemnation proceeding and does not prevent the county from retaining other 6 7 legal counsel in a civil matter at any time it considers 8 appropriate.

9 <u>(e) The criminal district attorney shall collect the fees,</u> 10 <u>commissions, and perquisites that are provided by law for similar</u> 11 <u>services rendered by a district or county attorney.</u>

12 (f) The criminal district attorney is entitled to receive in equal monthly installments compensation from the state equal to the 13 14 amount paid by the state to district attorneys. The state 15 compensation shall be paid by the comptroller as appropriated by the legislature. The Commissioners Court of Medina County shall 16 17 pay the criminal district attorney an additional amount so that the total compensation of the criminal district attorney equals at 18 19 least 90 percent of the total salary paid to the judge of the 454th District Court in Medina County. The compensation paid by the 20 county shall be paid in semiweekly or bimonthly installments, as 21 22 determined by the commissioners court.

23 (g) The criminal district attorney or the Commissioners 24 Court of Medina County may accept gifts and grants from any 25 individual, partnership, corporation, trust, foundation, 26 association, or governmental entity for the purpose of financing or 27 assisting effective prosecution, crime prevention or suppression,

H.B. No. 1481 1 rehabilitation of offenders, substance abuse education, treatment 2 and prevention, or crime victim assistance programs in Medina County. The criminal district attorney shall account for and 3 report to the commissioners court all gifts or grants accepted 4 5 under this subsection. 6 (h) The criminal district attorney, for the purpose of 7 conducting affairs of the office, may appoint a staff composed of 8 assistant criminal district attorneys, investigators, stenographers, clerks, and other personnel that the commissioners 9 court may authorize. The salary of a staff member is an amount 10 recommended by the criminal district attorney and approved by the 11 12 commissioners court. The commissioners court shall pay the salaries of the staff in equal semiweekly or bimonthly installments 13 from county funds. 14 15 (i) The criminal district attorney shall, with the advice and consent of the commissioners court, designate one or more 16 17 individuals to act as an assistant criminal district attorney with exclusive responsibility for assisting the commissioners court. An 18 19 individual designated as an assistant criminal district attorney under this subsection must have extensive experience in 20 representing public entities and knowledge of the laws affecting 21 22 counties, including the open meetings and open records laws under 23 Chapters 551 and 552. 24 (j) Medina County is entitled to receive from the state an amount equal to the amount provided in the General Appropriations 25

26 Act to district attorneys for the payment of staff salaries and

27 <u>office expenses.</u>

(k) The legislature may provide for additional staff
 members to be paid from state funds if it considers supplementation
 of the criminal district attorney's staff to be necessary.

4 <u>(1) The criminal district attorney and assistant criminal</u> 5 <u>district attorney may not engage in the private practice of law or</u> 6 <u>receive a fee for the referral of a case.</u>

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3 (3) the county attorneys performing the duties of district attorneys in the counties of Andrews, Aransas, Callahan, 4 5 Cameron, Castro, Colorado, Crosby, Ellis, Falls, Freestone, Gonzales, Guadalupe, Lamar, Lamb, Lampasas, Lavaca, 6 Lee, Limestone, Marion, Milam, Morris, Ochiltree, Oldham, Orange, 7 Rains, Red River, Robertson, Rusk, Swisher, Terry, Webb, and 8 Willacy. 9

10 SECTION 6. (a) The local administrative district judge 11 shall transfer to the 454th District Court all cases from Medina 12 County that are pending in the 38th District Court on the effective 13 date of this Act.

14 (b) When a case is transferred as provided by Subsection (a)15 of this section:

16 (1) all processes, writs, bonds, recognizances, or 17 other obligations issued from the 38th District Court are 18 returnable to the 454th District Court as if originally issued by 19 that court; and

20 (2) the obligees on all bonds and recognizances taken 21 in and for the 38th District Court and all witnesses summoned to 22 appear in the 38th District Court are required to appear before the 23 454th District Court as if originally required to appear before 24 that court.

(c) The 454th Judicial District is created on the effectivedate of this Act.

27 (d) The office of county attorney of Medina County is

1 abolished on the effective date of this Act.

2 SECTION 7. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
