A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

- 2 relating to the expiration date of a commercial driver's license;
- 3 increasing a fee.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Section 522.029, Transportation Code, is amended
- 6 by amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsection (m) to read as
- 7 follows:
- 8 (a) The fee for a commercial driver's license issued by the
- 9 department is \$96 [\$60], except as provided by Subsections (f),
- 10 (h), (j), [and] (k), and (m).
- 11 (m) The fee for a commercial driver's license with a
- 12 hazardous materials endorsement issued by the department is \$60,
- 13 except as provided by Subsections (h), (j), and (k).
- 14 SECTION 2. Section 522.051, Transportation Code, is amended
- 15 by amending Subsections (a), (b), (c), (d), and (f) and adding
- 16 Subsections (i), (j), (k), and (l) to read as follows:
- 17 (a) Except as provided by <u>Subsections</u> [<u>Subsection</u>] (f) <u>and</u>
- 18 <u>(i)</u> and Sections 522.013(e), 522.033, and 522.054, an original
- 19 commercial driver's license expires eight [five] years after the
- 20 applicant's next birthday.
- 21 (b) Except as provided by <u>Subsection</u> (j) and Section
- 22 522.054, a commercial driver's license issued to a person holding a
- 23 Texas Class A, B, C, or M license that would expire one year or more
- 24 after the date of issuance of the commercial driver's license

- 1 expires eight [five] years after the applicant's next birthday.
- 2 (c) Except as provided by Subsection (k) and Section
- 3 522.054, a commercial driver's license issued to a person holding a
- 4 Texas Class A, B, C, or M license that would expire less than one
- 5 year after the date of issuance of the commercial driver's license
- 6 or that has been expired for less than one year expires <u>eight</u> [five]
- 7 years after the expiration date shown on the Class A, B, C, or M
- 8 license.
- 9 (d) Except as provided by Subsection (1) and Section
- 10 522.054, a commercial driver's license issued to a person holding a
- 11 Texas Class A, B, C, or M license that has been expired for at least
- 12 one year but not more than two years expires eight [five] years
- 13 after the applicant's last birthday.
- 14 (f) Except as provided by Section 522.013, a non-domiciled
- 15 commercial driver's license other than a temporary non-domiciled
- 16 commercial driver's license under Section 522.013(e) expires on:
- 17 (1) the earlier of:
- 18 (A) the first birthday of the license holder
- 19 occurring after the eighth [fifth] anniversary of the date of the
- 20 application; or
- 21 (B) the expiration date of the license holder's
- 22 lawful presence in the United States as determined by the
- 23 appropriate United States agency in compliance with federal law; or
- 24 (2) the first anniversary of the date of issuance, if
- 25 there is no definitive expiration date for the applicant's
- 26 authorized stay in the United States.
- 27 (i) Except as provided by Subsection (f) and Sections

- 1 <u>522.013(e)</u>, <u>522.033</u>, and <u>522.054</u>, an original commercial driver's
- 2 license with a hazardous materials endorsement expires five years
- 3 after the applicant's next birthday.
- 4 (j) Except as provided by Section 522.054, a commercial
- 5 driver's license with a hazardous materials endorsement issued to a
- 6 person holding a Texas Class A, B, C, or M license that would expire
- 7 one year or more after the date of issuance of the commercial
- 8 driver's license expires five years after the applicant's next
- 9 birthday.
- 10 (k) Except as provided by Section 522.054, a commercial
- 11 <u>driver's license with a hazardous materials endorsement is</u>sued to a
- 12 person holding a Texas Class A, B, C, or M license that would expire
- 13 less than one year after the date of issuance of the commercial
- 14 driver's license or that has been expired for less than one year
- 15 expires five years after the expiration date shown on the Class A,
- 16 B, C, or M license.
- 17 (1) Except as provided by Section 522.054, a commercial
- 18 driver's license with a hazardous materials endorsement issued to a
- 19 person holding a Texas Class A, B, C, or M license that has been
- 20 expired for at least one year but not more than two years expires
- 21 five years after the applicant's last birthday.
- SECTION 3. Section 522.052, Transportation Code, is amended
- 23 by amending Subsections (b) and (c) and adding Subsections (k) and
- 24 (1) to read as follows:
- 25 (b) Except as provided by Section 522.054, a renewal of a
- 26 commercial driver's license that has been expired for less than one
- 27 year expires eight [five] years after the expiration date shown on

- 1 the commercial driver's license.
- 2 (c) Except as provided by Section 522.054, a renewal of a
- 3 commercial driver's license that has been expired for at least one
- 4 year but not more than two years expires seven [six] years after the
- 5 applicant's last birthday.
- 6 (k) Except as provided by Section 522.054, a renewal of a
- 7 commercial driver's license with a hazardous materials endorsement
- 8 that has been expired for less than one year expires five years
- 9 after the expiration date shown on the commercial driver's license.
- 10 (1) Except as provided by Section 522.054, a renewal of a
- 11 commercial driver's license with a hazardous materials endorsement
- 12 that has been expired for at least one year but not more than two
- 13 years expires five years after the applicant's last birthday.
- 14 SECTION 4. The changes in law made by this Act to Sections
- 15 522.029, 522.051, and 522.052, Transportation Code, apply only to a
- 16 commercial driver's license issued or renewed on or after June 1,
- 17 2020. A commercial driver's license issued or renewed before June
- 18 1, 2020, is governed by the law in effect immediately before the
- 19 effective date of this Act, and the former law is continued in
- 20 effect for that purpose.
- 21 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
