## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

2	relating to the health literacy advisory committee and health
3	literacy in the state health plan.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Section 104.002, Health and Safety Code, is
6	amended by adding Subdivision (6) to read as follows:
7	(6) "Health literacy" means the degree to which
8	individuals have the capacity to obtain, process, and understand
9	basic health information and health services needed to make
10	appropriate health decisions.
11	SECTION 2. Subchapter B, Chapter 104, Health and Safety
12	Code, is amended by adding Section 104.0157 to read as follows:
13	Sec. 104.0157. HEALTH LITERACY ADVISORY COMMITTEE. (a)
14	The statewide health coordinating council shall form an advisory
15	committee on health literacy. The advisory committee must include
16	representatives of interested groups, including the academic
17	community, consumer groups, health plans, pharmacies, and
18	associations of physicians, dentists, hospitals, and nurses.
19	(b) The advisory committee shall develop a long-range plan
20	for increasing health literacy in this state. The committee shall
21	update the plan at least once every two years.
22	(c) In developing the long-range plan, the advisory
23	committee shall study the economic impact of low health literacy on
24	state health care programs and insurance coverage for residents of

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1	this state. The advisory committee shall:
2	(1) identify key risk factors for low health literacy;
3	(2) examine methods for health care practitioners,
4	health care facilities, and others to address health literacy with
5	patients and the public;
6	(3) examine the effectiveness of using quality
7	measures in state health programs to improve health literacy;
8	(4) identify ways to expand the use of plain language
9	instructions for patients; and
10	(5) identify the ways that increasing health literacy
11	can improve patient safety, reduce preventable events, and increase
12	medication adherence to attain greater cost-effectiveness and
13	better patient outcomes in health care.
14	(d) Not later than December 1 of each even-numbered year,
15	the advisory committee shall submit the long-range plan developed
16	or updated, as applicable, under this section to the governor, the
17	lieutenant governor, the speaker of the house of representatives,
18	and each member of the legislature.
19	(e) The advisory committee shall elect a presiding officer.
20	(f) Members of the advisory committee serve without
21	compensation but are entitled to reimbursement for the members'
22	travel expenses as provided by Chapter 660, Government Code, and
23	the General Appropriations Act.
24	(g) Sections 2110.002, 2110.003, and 2110.008, Government
25	Code, do not apply to the advisory committee.
26	(h) Meetings of the advisory committee under this section
27	are subject to Chapter 551, Government Code.

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C.S.H.B. No. 2032 SECTION 3. Sections 104.022(e) and (f), Health and Safety 1 2 Code, are amended to read as follows: 3 (e) The state health plan shall be developed and used in accordance with applicable state and federal law. The plan must 4 5 identify: 6 (1) major statewide health concerns, including the prevalence of low health literacy of health care consumers; 7 8 (2) the availability and use of current health resources of the state, including resources associated with 9 10 information technology and state-supported institutions of higher education; and 11 12 (3) future health service, information technology, and facility needs of the state. 13 14 (f) The state health plan must: 15 (1) propose strategies for the correction of major deficiencies in the service delivery system; 16 17 (2) propose strategies for increasing health literacy to attain greater cost-effectiveness and better patient outcomes in 18 19 health care; (3) [<del>(2)</del>] propose strategies 20 for incorporating 21 information technology in the service delivery system; 22 (4) [<del>(3)</del>] propose strategies for involving 23 state-supported institutions of higher education in providing 24 health services and for coordinating those efforts with health and human services agencies in order to close gaps in services; and 25 26 (5) [<del>(4)</del>] provide direction for the state's legislative and executive decision-making processes to implement 27

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1 the strategies proposed by the plan.

2 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
