A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

2 relating to guidelines for policies of school districts and

open-enrollment charter schools for the care of certain students at

4 risk for anaphylaxis.

- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 6 SECTION 1. Section 38.0151, Education Code, is amended by
- 7 amending Subsections (a), (b), and (e) and adding Subsections (g),
- 8 (h), (i), and (j) to read as follows:
- 9 (a) The board of trustees of each school district and the
- 10 governing body or an appropriate officer of each open-enrollment
- 11 charter school shall adopt and administer a policy for the care of
- 12 students with a diagnosed food allergy at risk for anaphylaxis
- 13 based on "Guidelines for the Care of Students With Food Allergies
- 14 At-Risk for Anaphylaxis" [guidelines] developed by the
- 15 commissioner of state health services <u>under this section and</u>
- 16 updated by the commissioner of state health services in
- 17 consultation with an ad hoc committee appointed by the commissioner
- 18 of state health services as provided by Section 38.0152.
- 19 (b) A school district or open-enrollment charter school
- 20 [that implemented a policy for the care of students with a diagnosed
- 21 food allergy at risk for anaphylaxis before the development of the
- 22 guidelines described by Subsection (a) shall annually review [the
- 23 policy and, as necessary, revise its [the] policy for the care of
- 24 students with a diagnosed food allergy at risk for anaphylaxis [as

- 1 necessary | to ensure the policy is consistent with the most current
- 2 version of the guidelines described by Subsection (a).
- 3 (e) The agency shall post the guidelines <u>described</u> by
- 4 Subsection (a) [developed by the commissioner of state health
- 5 services under this section] on the agency's website with any other
- 6 information relating to students with special health needs. The
- 7 <u>information posted by the agency must include a summary of the</u>
- 8 guidelines. The agency shall annually review and, as necessary,
- 9 revise the summary and any other information to reflect the most
- 10 current version of the guidelines.
- 11 (g) Each school year, the board of trustees of each school
- 12 district and the governing body of each open-enrollment charter
- 13 school shall post a summary of the guidelines on the district's or
- 14 school's Internet website, including instructions on obtaining
- 15 <u>access to the complete guidelines document. The district's or</u>
- 16 school's website must be accessible by each student enrolled in the
- 17 district or school and a parent or guardian of each student. Any
- 18 forms used by a district or school requesting information from a
- 19 parent or guardian enrolling a child with a food allergy in the
- 20 district or school must include information to access on the
- 21 district's or school's Internet website a summary of the guidelines
- 22 and instructions on obtaining access to the complete guidelines
- 23 document.
- 24 (h) The guidelines described by Subsection (a) may not:
- 25 (1) require a school district or open-enrollment
- 26 charter school to purchase treatments approved by the United States
- 27 Food and Drug Administration or make any other expenditure that

- 1 would result in a negative fiscal impact on the district or school;
- 2 <u>or</u>
- 3 (2) require the personnel of a district or school to
- 4 administer treatments approved by the United States Food and Drug
- 5 Administration to a student unless the medication is prescribed for
- 6 that student by the student's physician.
- 7 <u>(i) This section does not:</u>
- 8 <u>(1) waive any liability or immunity of a school</u>
- 9 district or open-enrollment charter school or district or school
- 10 officers or employees; or
- 11 (2) create any liability for or a cause of action
- 12 against a school district or open-enrollment charter school or
- 13 district or school officers or employees.
- 14 (j) Notwithstanding any other law, this section, including
- 15 any information or materials developed under this section and the
- 16 dissemination of information or materials developed under this
- 17 section, does not create a civil, criminal, or administrative cause
- 18 of action or liability or create a standard of care, obligation, or
- 19 duty that provides the basis for a cause of action.
- 20 SECTION 2. Subchapter A, Chapter 38, Education Code, is
- 21 amended by adding Section 38.0152 to read as follows:
- 22 <u>Sec. 38.0152. COMMITTEE TO ASSIST IN UPDATING GUIDELINES</u>
- 23 FOR CARE OF STUDENTS AT RISK FOR ANAPHYLAXIS. (a) In this section:
- 24 (1) "Commissioner" means the commissioner of state
- 25 <u>health services</u>.
- 26 (2) "Department" means the Department of State Health
- 27 Services.

1	(3) "Guidelines" means "Guidelines for the Care of
2	Students With Food Allergies At-Risk for Anaphylaxis" on which
3	school district and open-enrollment charter school policies for the
4	care of students with a diagnosed food allergy at risk for
5	anaphylaxis are based as provided by Section 38.0151.
6	(b) The commissioner shall appoint members to an ad hoc
7	committee to consult with the commissioner on updating the current
8	guidelines to incorporate and specifically reference any new
9	food-allergy management best practices and treatments, including
10	new methods, treatments, and therapies to reduce the risk of
11	allergic reactions.
12	(c) The committee must include:
13	(1) not more than:
14	(A) one representative from:
15	(i) the department; and
16	(ii) the Texas Nurses Association; and
17	(B) one physician who is a member of the American
18	Academy of Allergy, Asthma & Immunology;
19	(2) at least two individuals from one or more national
20	patient advocacy organizations representing the interests of food
21	allergies, anaphylaxis, and related medical issues, including
22	asthma;
23	(3) one principal of a public elementary school campus
24	at which one or more students with a diagnosed food allergy at risk
25	<pre>for anaphylaxis are enrolled;</pre>
26	(4) one classroom teacher employed at a public
27	elementary school campus at which one or more students with a

- 1 diagnosed food allergy at risk for anaphylaxis are enrolled;
- 2 (5) one superintendent of a school district;
- 3 (6) one member of a board of trustees of a school
- 4 district;
- 5 (7) one member of a governing body of an
- 6 open-enrollment charter school;
- 7 (8) at least two parents of public school students
- 8 with a diagnosed food allergy at risk for anaphylaxis; and
- 9 (9) at least five physicians trained to diagnose,
- 10 treat, and manage allergies with experience in new and emerging
- 11 allergy management best practices and treatments, including new
- 12 methods, treatments, and therapies to reduce the risk of allergic
- 13 reactions, including anaphylaxis.
- 14 (d) Ad hoc committee members shall serve for a period
- 15 determined by the commissioner. On the resignation of a member of
- 16 the committee or the removal of a member from the committee by the
- 17 commissioner, the commissioner shall appoint a new member to the
- 18 committee who qualifies for the committee in the same manner that
- 19 the member who resigned or is removed qualified.
- 20 (e) Section 2110.005, Government Code, does not apply to the
- 21 ad hoc committee appointed under this section.
- 22 (f) The physicians appointed to serve on the ad hoc
- 23 committee shall provide to the committee appropriate
- 24 recommendations to be made to the commissioner on updating the
- 25 current guidelines, including any new food-allergy management best
- 26 practices and treatments, including new methods, treatments, and
- 27 therapies to reduce the risk of allergic reactions.

- 1 (g) At least once every three years, the commissioner shall
- 2 order a meeting of the committee to update the guidelines to
- 3 incorporate any new food-allergy management best practices and
- 4 treatments.
- 5 (h) The commissioner may order a meeting of the committee at
- 6 any time the commissioner determines necessary for the committee
- 7 <u>to:</u>
- 8 (1) discuss the protection of students with food
- 9 allergies at risk for anaphylaxis; and
- 10 (2) update the guidelines.
- 11 SECTION 3. The commissioner of state health services shall:
- 12 (1) not later than October 1, 2019, appoint the
- 13 members of the ad hoc committee described by Section 38.0152,
- 14 Education Code, as added by this Act, to consult with the
- 15 commissioner on updating and maintaining the "Guidelines for the
- 16 Care of Students With Food Allergies At-Risk for Anaphylaxis" as
- 17 provided by that section; and
- 18 (2) not later than March 1, 2020, in consultation with
- 19 the ad hoc committee, update the guidelines as necessary.
- 20 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 21 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 22 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 23 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 24 Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
