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## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT relating to the inclusion of character education programs in evaluating districts and campuses under the public school accountability system. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: SECTION 1. Section 39.053(c), Education Code, as amended by Chapters 807 (H.B. 22), 842 (H.B. 2223), and 1088 (H.B. 3593), Acts of the 85th Legislature, Regular Session, 2017, is reenacted and amended to read as follows: (c) School districts and campuses must be evaluated based on three domains of indicators of achievement adopted under this section that include: (1) in the student achievement domain, indicators of student achievement that must include: (A) for evaluating the performance of districts and campuses generally: (i) an indicator that accounts for the results of assessment instruments required under Sections 39.023(a), (c), and (l), as applicable for the district and campus, including the results of assessment instruments required for graduation retaken by a student, aggregated across grade levels by subject area, including: (a) for the performance standard determined by the commissioner under Section 39.0241(a), the

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1 percentage of students who performed satisfactorily on the 2 assessment instruments, aggregated across grade levels by subject 3 area; and

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(b) for the college readiness
performance standard as determined under Section 39.0241, the
percentage of students who performed satisfactorily on the
assessment instruments, aggregated across grade levels by subject
area; and

9 (ii) an indicator that accounts for the 10 results of assessment instruments required under Section 39.023(b), as applicable for the district and campus, including the 11 12 percentage of students who performed satisfactorily on the assessment instruments, as determined by the performance standard 13 adopted by the agency, aggregated across grade levels by subject 14 15 area; [<del>and</del>]

16 (B) for evaluating the performance of high school 17 campuses and districts that include high school campuses, 18 indicators that account for:

(i) students who satisfy the Texas Success Initiative (TSI) college readiness benchmarks prescribed by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board under Section 51.334 on an assessment instrument in reading or mathematics designated by the coordinating board under that section;

24 (ii) students who satisfy relevant 25 performance standards on advanced placement tests or similar 26 assessments;

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(iii) students who earn dual course credits

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1 in the dual credit courses; (iv) students who enlist in the 2 armed 3 forces of the United States; 4 (v) students who earn industry 5 certifications; 6 (vi) students admitted into postsecondary 7 industry certification programs that require as a prerequisite for 8 entrance successful performance at the secondary level; 9 (vii) students whose successful completion of a course or courses under Section 28.014 indicates the student's 10 preparation to enroll and succeed, without remediation, in an 11 entry-level general education course for a baccalaureate degree or 12 13 associate degree; 14 (viii) students who successfully met 15 standards on a composite of indicators that through research indicates the student's preparation to enroll and succeed, without 16 17 remediation, in an entry-level general education course for a baccalaureate degree or associate degree; 18 (ix) high school graduation rates, computed 19 in accordance with standards and definitions adopted in compliance 20 with the Every Student Succeeds Act (20 U.S.C. Section 6301 et seq.) 21 subject to the exclusions provided by Subsections (g), (g-1), 22 23 (q-2), and (q-3); 24 (x) students who successfully completed an OnRamps dual enrollment course; [and] 25 26 (xi) [<del>the percentage of</del>] students who 27 successfully completed a practicum or internship approved by the

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1 State Board of Education; 2 (xii) students who are awarded an associate 3 [associate's] degree; and 4 (xiii) students who successfully complete a 5 character education program or course provided under Section 29.906; and 6 7 (C) for evaluating the performance of middle and 8 junior high school and elementary school campuses and districts that include those campuses an indicator that accounts for students 9 10 who successfully complete a character education program or course provided under Section 29.906; 11 12 (2) in the school progress domain, indicators for effectiveness in promoting student learning, which must include: 13 14 (A) for assessment instruments, including 15 assessment instruments under Subdivisions (1)(A)(i) and (ii), the percentage of students who met the standard for improvement, as 16 17 determined by the commissioner; and (B) for evaluating relative performance, 18 the 19 performance of districts and campuses compared to similar districts 20 or campuses; and 21 (3) in the closing the gaps domain, the use of disaggregated data to demonstrate the differentials among students 22 23 from different racial and ethnic groups, socioeconomic 24 backgrounds, and other factors, including: 25 (A) students formerly receiving special education services; 26 27 (B) students continuously enrolled; and

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(C) students who are mobile.

2 SECTION 2. To the extent of any conflict, this Act prevails 3 over another Act of the 86th Legislature, Regular Session, 2019, 4 relating to nonsubstantive additions to and corrections in enacted 5 codes.

6 SECTION 3. This Act applies beginning with the 2019-2020 7 school year.

8 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 9 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 10 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 11 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 12 Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
