9	Sec. 786.001. DEFINITION. In this chapter, "first
10	responder" means a public safety employee of a state agency or
11	political subdivision of this state whose duties include responding
12	rapidly to an emergency.
13	Sec. 786.002. APPLICABILITY. This chapter applies only to
14	a first responder who is:
15	(1) a peace officer licensed under Chapter 1701,
16	Occupations Code, whose duties include responding rapidly to an
17	<pre>emergency;</pre>
18	(2) fire protection personnel as defined by Section
19	419.021, Government Code; or
20	(3) emergency medical services personnel licensed
21	under Chapter 773.

provided by Subsection (b), an employer of a first responder may not

suspend, terminate, or take any other adverse employment action,

Sec. 786.003. DISCRIMINATION PROHIBITED. (a) Except as

- 1 including a loss of rank, pay, or benefits, against a first
- 2 responder solely because the employer knows or believes that the

- 12 <u>in a judicial or administrative proceeding.</u>
- 13 (b) An aggrieved person may seek:
- 14 (1) compensatory damages;
- 15 (2) reasonable attorney's fees and court costs; and
- 16 (3) any other appropriate relief.
- 17 Sec. 786.005. SOVEREIGN IMMUNITY WAIVED. Sovereign
- 18 immunity to suit is waived and abolished to the extent of liability
- 19 created by this chapter.
- 20 SECTION 2. This Act applies only to a suspension,
- 21 termination, or other adverse employment action taken by an
- 22 employer against a first responder on or after the effective date of
- 23 this Act. A suspension, termination, or other adverse employment
- 24 action that is taken by an employer against a first responder before
- 25 the effective date of this Act is governed by the law in effect on
- 26 the date the employment action is taken, and the former law is
- 27 continued in effect for that purpose.

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1 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
