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## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to the establishment of the work-based learning task 3 force. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 5 SECTION 1. Chapter 133, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 133.010 to read as follows: 6 7 Sec. 133.010. WORK-BASED LEARNING TASK FORCE. (a) In this section: 8 9 (1) "Agency" means the Texas Education Agency. (2) "Coordinating board" means the Texas Higher 10 Education Coordinating Board. 11 12 (3) "Institution of higher education" has the meaning assigned by Section 61.003. 13 14 (4) "Open-enrollment charter school" has the meaning assigned by Section 5.001. 15 16 (5) "Task force" means the work-based learning task force established under this section. 17 18 (6) "Work-based learning opportunity" includes a 19 youth or adult apprenticeship or internship that provides paid work experience and corresponding classroom instruction, delivered in 20 an employment relationship that both the business and worker intend 21 to lead to an industry-recognized credential and full-time 22 23 employment after completion of the program. 24 (b) The work-based learning task force is established to

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develop strategies for expanding and improving the delivery of 1 work-based learning opportunities in this state. 2 (c) The task force is composed of the following 18 members: 3 4 (1) one member of the commission, appointed by the 5 executive director of the commission; 6 (2) one member of the coordinating board, appointed by 7 the commissioner of higher education; (3) one member of the agency, appointed by the 8 commissioner of education; 9 10 (4) five members appointed by the governor as follows: (A) one member from a school district or 11 12 open-enrollment charter school; (B) one member from an institution of higher 13 14 education; 15 (C) two members from a high-growth, high-wage 16 industry; and 17 (D) one member from a statewide advocacy organization representing young adults, a statewide education 18 19 advocacy organization, or a student organization that focuses on 20 apprenticeships; 21 (5) five members appointed by the lieutenant governor 22 as follows: (A) one member from a school district or 23 24 open-enrollment charter school; 25 (B) one member from an institution of higher 26 education; 27 (C) two members from a high-growth, high-wage

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1 industry; and 2 (D) one member from a statewide advocacy 3 organization representing young adults, a statewide education advocacy organization, or a student organization that focuses on 4 5 apprenticeships; and 6 (6) five members appointed by the speaker of the house 7 of representatives as follows: 8 (A) one member from a school district or open-enrollment charter school; 9 10 (B) one member from an institution of higher education; 11 12 (C) two members from a high-growth, high-wage industry; and 13 14 (D) one member from a statewide advocacy 15 organization representing young adults, a statewide education advocacy organization, or a student organization that focuses on 16 17 apprenticeships. (d) The members of the task force shall select a presiding 18 19 officer from among the membership. (e) The task force shall meet at the call of the presiding 20 officer. 21 (f) A member of the task force serves at the will of the 22 member's appointing authority. A vacancy on the task force must be 23 24 filled in the same manner as the original appointment. (g) A member of the task force may not receive compensation 25 26 for serving on the task force but is entitled to reimbursement for travel expenses incurred by the member while conducting the 27

No. 3818 1 business of the task force as provided by the General Appropriations Act. 2 3 (h) The commission, the coordinating board, and the agency shall each provide necessary administrative and technical support 4 5 for the activities of the task force. 6 (i) The task force may solicit gifts, grants, and donations 7 from any public or private source for use in carrying out the task 8 force's duties under this section. 9 (j) The task force shall: 10 (1) develop recommendations for: 11 (A) increasing the number of work-based learning 12 opportunities in this state and the availability of those opportunities, including for persons experiencing barriers to 13 employment and who are historically underrepresented 14 in 15 high-growth, high-wage industries, with a particular focus on occupations other than building and construction trades; 16 17 (B) removing barriers that impede the growth of work-based learning oppor<u>tunities in this state</u>, including in small 18 19 and mid-size companies and in industries that have not historically offered work-based learning opportunities; 20 21 (C) addressing employer concerns regarding 22 liability for work-based learning opportunities; 23 (D) improving a diverse pipeline of access to and 24 success in work-based learning opportunities, including assistance with child care, food, and transportation; 25 26 (E) aligning public and private funding for 27 work-based learning opportunities;

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1	(F) identifying data to be collected from

3	(G) establishing a process for the collection and
4	maintenance of data described by Paragraph (F) and for the
5	reporting of that data to policymakers and the public;
6	(2) develop critical guidance for local sector or
7	industry partnerships on how to serve as intermediaries

7	SECTION 2. As soon as practicable after the effective date
8	of this Act, the appropriate persons shall appoint the members of
9	the task force created by Section 133.010, Education Code, as added
10	by this Act.

11 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
