## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

- 1 WHEREAS, Social Security is the foundation for retirement
- 2 income for tens of millions of American workers and their families;
- 3 nearly two-thirds of the older Americans who receive program
- 4 benefits rely on Social Security for 50 percent or more of their
- 5 total income, and one-third rely on it for 90 percent or more; among
- 6 beneficiaries aged 80 and older, 42 percent rely on Social Security
- 7 for nearly all of their income; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Two Social Security provisions, however, the
- 9 Government Pension Offset (GPO), enacted in 1977, and the Windfall
- 10 Elimination Provision (WEP), enacted in 1983, severely and unfairly
- 11 penalize recipients of public pensions; and
- 12 WHEREAS, The GPO effectively prohibits some government
- 13 retirees from collecting both their own pension and full Social
- 14 Security benefits as a surviving spouse; an estimated 9 out of 10
- 15 public employees affected by the GPO lose their entire spousal
- 16 benefit, even though their spouses paid Social Security taxes for
- 17 many years; and
- 18 WHEREAS, The WEP reduces the Social Security benefit for
- 19 public employees who did not participate in Social Security while
- 20 working for the government, but who at some time in their careers
- 21 were in jobs where they paid Social Security taxes for the period
- 22 required to qualify for retirement benefits; the WEP can deprive a
- 23 retiree of nearly \$450 a month in Social Security benefits duly
- 24 earned by that individual; and

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1 WHEREAS, Although these provisions were intended to curtail the payment of windfall benefits to highly paid government 2 3 employees, in practice they have had and continue to have devastating consequences for low-income employees who worked for 4 many years as public servants; more than two million government 5 employees and retirees are affected by either the GPO or the WEP or 6 both, and the repercussions are felt most acutely in Texas and 14 7 other states where a high proportion of public 8 participate in state or municipal retirement systems that do not 9 10 include Social Security; and

WHEREAS, These punitive and discriminatory provisions target 11 12 hundreds of thousands of teachers, police officers, firefighters, and other public servants; although the vast majority of Texas 13 14 school employees participate in the state's teacher retirement 15 system and therefore are not required to and do not participate in the Social Security system, many Texas teachers and other public 16 17 school employees nonetheless have earned Social Security benefits behalf through other 18 their own employment, 19 notwithstanding, or would be entitled to spousal Social Security benefits based on their spouses' lifetime earnings were it not for 20 the GPO penalty; these provisions cause veteran teachers to retire 21 prematurely and discourage qualified individuals from entering the 22 23 teaching profession at precisely the time that Texas and the nation 24 face a severe shortage of highly qualified educators; and

WHEREAS, The GPO and WEP as applied to public employees are unreasonable and unjust and will cause tens of thousands of government retirees to experience a diminished quality of life or

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- 1 be forced to return to work to make up for the effects of these
- 2 provisions; now, therefore, be it
- RESOLVED, That the 86th Legislature of the State of Texas
- 4 hereby respectfully urge the Congress of the United States to
- 5 repeal the Government Pension Offset and the Windfall Elimination
- 6 Provision of the Social Security Act; and, be it further
- 7 RESOLVED, That the Texas secretary of state forward official
- 8 copies of this resolution to the president of the United States, to
- 9 the president of the Senate and the speaker of the House of
- 10 Representatives of the United States Congress, and to all the
- 11 members of the Texas delegation to Congress with the request that
- 12 this resolution be officially entered in the Congressional Record
- 13 as a memorial to the Congress of the United States of America.
