## RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, On February 18 and 19, 2019, proud residents of the 2 Texas Panhandle are visiting Austin for Panhandle Days at the State 3 Capitol, a celebration of the rich heritage of this important 4 region of the Lone Star State; and

5 WHEREAS, The striking landscape of the Panhandle ranges from the vast grasslands and open sky of the Llano Estacado to the 6 breathtaking vistas of Palo Duro Canyon and the Caprock Escarpment 7 to the gently undulating rolling plains of the southeast; the 8 ancient Paleo-Indians once lived here, as did members of later 9 Native American cultures, and in 1541, when the explorer Francisco 10 11 Vázquez de Coronado passed through the area, he found a rich 12 rangeland, thick with buffalo; and

13 WHEREAS, The Panhandle's distinctive shape results from 14 boundaries that were established by the Compromise of 1850, and in the decades after the Civil War, pioneering cattlemen such as 15 Charles Goodnight, James Adair, and Thomas Sherman Bugbee 16 established enormous ranching empires; the arrival of the railroad 17 in the late 1880s hastened the development of wheat and cotton 18 farming, and the discovery of oil and natural gas in the 1920s 19 further boosted and diversified the region's economy; and 20

21 WHEREAS, Today, the Panhandle continues to prosper from 22 farming and from the oil, gas, and wind industries, and 23 cattle-raising remains a multibillion-dollar business, with more 24 feedlots in the region than anywhere else in the nation; Amarillo,

the Panhandle's largest city, is home to such large employers as 1 Xcel Energy, Tyson Foods, Bell Helicopter, Pantex, and several 2 3 health care systems, as well as to the Texas Cattle Feeders Association; Pampa, the second-largest city, is a thriving center 4 for petroleum and livestock, and Dalhart boasts the annual XIT 5 Rodeo and Reunion and the Hilmar Cheese Company; Sunray is home to a 6 Valero refinery, while Dumas and Hereford are known for cattle 7 8 feeding and beef processing enterprises; the town of Panhandle serves as county seat of Carson County and is home to Panhandle 9 10 Elementary School, a National Blue Ribbon School, and Borger is the site of a Phillips 66 refinery and a Nutrien nitrogen plant; and 11

WHEREAS, The educational needs of the Panhandle's residents are served by the nationally recognized Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center and West Texas A&M University, as well as Amarillo College, Frank Phillips College, and Clarendon College; and

17 WHEREAS, The Panhandle features a variety of notable cultural and recreational attractions; Amarillo supports the Lone Star 18 19 Ballet and the Amarillo Symphony, and the city's many museums include the American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame and Museum, the Don 20 Harrington Discovery Center, the Texas Air and Space Museum, the 21 Amarillo Railroad Museum, the Amarillo Museum of Art, and the 22 Kwahadi Museum of the American Indian; the Panhandle-Plains 23 24 Historical Museum in Canyon houses more than two million artifacts that evoke the heritage of the region, while Palo Duro Canyon State 25 26 Park hosts the outdoor musical drama Texas, which portrays the struggles and triumphs of area settlers in the 19th century; Dumas 27

draws visitors from across the region for its Dogie Days every June,
and Stratford, the county seat of Sherman County, hosts its popular
Jamboree each July; and
