The total number of countywide polling places may not be less than: 16 17 (1)except as provided by Subdivisions [Subdivision] (2) and (3), 50 percent of the number of precinct polling places 18 19 that would otherwise be located in the county for that election; [or] 20 21 (2) except as provided by Subdivision (3), for an election held in the first year in which the county participates in 22 23 the program, 65 percent of the number of precinct polling places 24 that would otherwise be located in the county for that election; or 25 (3) for an election held on the November general 26 election date in an even-numbered year, 80 percent of the number of precinct polling places that would otherwise be located in the 27

1 county for that election.

2 (g-1) A county participating in the program shall, at each
3 countywide polling place, post a notice of the four nearest
4 countywide polling place locations by driving distance.

5 (m) In adopting a methodology under Subsection (f), the 6 county must ensure that:

in a county with a population of less than one 7 (1)8 million, each county commissioners precinct contains at least one countywide polling place and the percentage of the total number of 9 countywide polling places located in each commissioners precinct 10 must be as equal as mathematically possible to the percentage of 11 12 registered voters of the county whose registrations are effective on the date of the election residing in each commissioners 13 14 precinct; or [and]

15 (2) in a county with a population of one million or more, the percentage of the total number of countywide polling 16 17 places located in each state representative district in the county containing territory in which the election is held must be as equal 18 19 as mathematically possible to the percentage of registered voters of the county whose registrations are effective on the date of the 20 election residing in each state representative district [the total 21 number of permanent branch and temporary branch polling places open 22 23 for voting in a county commissioners precinct does not exceed more 24 than twice the number of permanent branch and temporary branch polling places in another county commissioners precinct]. 25

(a) A counting station manager and the presiding judge of the counting station shall develop a protocol under which no 11 12 electronic device capable of being connected to the Internet is permitted inside a central counting station, except as permitted by 13 Subsection (b). 14 15 (b) The protocol developed under Subsection (a) may permit a cellular telephone or the equipment necessary to count votes to be 16 17 present in the central counting station if the devices are not connected to the Internet. 18 SECTION 4.07. Section 216.001, Election Code, is amended to 19 read as follows: 20 Sec. 216.001. APPLICABILITY OF CHAPTER. 21 (a) Except as provided by Subsection (b), this [This] chapter applies only to an 22 election that results in a tie vote as provided by Sections 23 24 2.002(i), 2.023(b) and (c), and 2.028. (b) If the results of an election show that the number of 25 26 votes cast in an election precinct exceeds the number of registered voters in the precinct, the authority designated under Section

C.S.S.B. No. 9 212.026 shall initiate an automatic recount for that precinct in 1 2 accordance with this chapter. ARTICLE 5. AUDITABLE VOTING SYSTEMS 3 4 SECTION 5.01. Chapter 127, Election Code, is amended by 5 adding Subchapter I to read as follows: 6 SUBCHAPTER I. RISK-LIMITING AUDIT 7 Sec. 127.301. APPLICABILITY OF SUBCHAPTER. (a) This 8 subchapter applies to an election: 9 (1) that occurs after August 31, 2024; 10 (2) that contains a race or measure that is voted on statewide; and 11 12 (3) in which an auditable voting system is used. (b) In this subchapter, "auditable voting system" means a 13 voting system that uses, creates, or displays a paper record that 14 15 may be read by the voter. 16 Sec. 127.302. RISK-LIMITING AUDIT. (a) Not later than 24 17 hours after all ballots have been counted in an election, the general custodian of election records shall conduct a risk-limiting 18 19 audit for a selected statewide race or measure. (b) The secretary of state shall select, in accordance with 20 rules adopted by the secretary, the precincts to be counted and the 21 22 office or proposition to be counted. (c) The general custodian of election records shall 23 24 complete the audit not later than 24 hours before the time for conducting the canvass of the election. 25 (d) The general custodian of election records shall post a 26 notice of the date, hour, and place of the audit in the custodian's 27

1 office and on the county's Internet website, if the county 2 maintains a website. 3 (e) A watcher may be present for the audit if appointed by a candidate in the election or appointed under Section 33.003 or 4 5 33.005. A watcher must deliver a certificate of appointment to the general custodian of election records at the time the watcher 6 7 reports for service. The certificate must be in writing and must 8 include: 9 (1) the printed name and signature of the watcher; 10 (2) the election subject to the audit; and 11 (3) the printed name and signature of, as appropriate: 12 (A) the candidate making the appointment; (B) the county chair of the political party 13 14 making the appointment; or 15 (C) the campaign treasurer or assistant campaign treasurer of the specific-purpose political committee making the 16 17 appointment. (f) The secretary of state may appoint personnel to assist 18 with the audit, including applicable voting system technicians or 19 representatives and persons who have assisted with the design and 20 implementation of the audit. 21 Sec. 127.303. RULES. (a) The secretary of state shall 22 adopt rules prescribing procedures necessary to implement this 23 24 subchapter. (b) Rules adopted under this subchapter must include a rule, 25 26 using widely accepted statistical methods, that provides for the number or percentage of paper records that must be counted in a 27

1 risk-limiting audit under Section 127.302. 2 Sec. 127.304. PUBLICATION OF RESULTS. The results of a risk-limiting audit conducted under this subchapter must be 3 published on the Internet website of the secretary of state not 4 5 later than three days after the completion of the audit. 6 Sec. 127.305. PILOT PROGRAM. (a) Notwithstanding Section 7 127.301(1), the secretary of state shall conduct a pilot program, 8 beginning with the election taking place November 3, 2020, of the risk-limiting audit program created under this subchapter. 9 (b) The secretary of state shall select up to five counties 10 to participate in the pilot program. At least one county 11 12 participating in the pilot program must have a population of at least 500,000. 13 14 (c) After each election conducted under the pilot program, 15 the secretary of state shall send a detailed report to each member of the legislature evaluating the success of the program and making 16 17 a recommendation as to whether the legislature should act to delay the statewide implementation of the program. 18 19 (d) The secretary of state shall adopt rules as necessary to implement this section. 20 21 (e) This section expires August 31, 2024. ARTICLE 6. REPEALER AND EFFECTIVE DATE 22 SECTION 6.01. Section 33.051(c), Election 23 Code, is 24 repealed. 25 SECTION 6.02. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
