## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the protection of expressive activities at public
3	institutions of higher education.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subchapter Z, Chapter 51, Education Code, is
6	amended by adding Section 51.9315 to read as follows:
7	Sec. 51.9315. PROTECTED EXPRESSION ON CAMPUS. (a) In this
8	section:
9	(1) "Benefit" includes:
10	(A) recognition by or registration with an
11	institution of higher education;
12	(B) the use of an institution of higher
13	education's facilities for meetings or speaking purposes;
14	(C) the use of channels of communication
15	controlled by an institution of higher education; and
16	(D) funding sources made generally available to
17	student organizations at an institution of higher education.
18	(2) "Expressive activities" means any speech or
19	expressive conduct protected by the First Amendment to the United
20	States Constitution or by Section 8, Article I, Texas Constitution,
21	and includes assemblies, protests, speeches, the distribution of
22	written material, the carrying of signs, and the circulation of
23	petitions. The term does not include commercial speech.
24	(3) "Institution of higher education" has the meaning

- 1 assigned by Section 61.003. 2 (4) "Student organization" includes any organization 3 that is composed mostly of students enrolled at an institution of higher education and that receives a benefit from the institution. 4 5 (b) It is the policy of this state to protect the expressive rights of persons guaranteed by the constitutions of the United 6 7 States and of this state by: 8 (1) recognizing freedom of speech and assembly as central to the mission of institutions of higher education; and 9 10 (2) ensuring that all persons may assemble peaceably on the campuses of institutions of higher education for expressive 11 12 activities, including to listen to the speech of others. (c) An institution of higher education shall: 13 14 (1) ensure that the common outdoor areas of the 15 institution's campus are deemed traditional public forums; and 16 (2) permit any person to engage in expressive activities in those areas of the institution's campus freely, as 17 long as the person's conduct: 18 19 (A) is not unlawful; and 20 (B) does not materially and substantially disrupt the functioning of the institution. 21 (d) Notwithstanding Subsection (c), an institution of 22 higher education may adopt a policy that imposes reasonable 23
  - (1) are narrowly tailored to serve a significant

restrictions on the time, place, and manner of expressive

activities in the common outdoor areas of the institution's campus

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if those restrictions:

1 institutional interest; 2 (2) employ clear, published, content-neutral, and 3 viewpoint-neutral criteria; 4 (3) provide for ample alternative means of expression; 5 and 6 (4) allow members of the university community to 7 spontaneously and contemporaneously assemble or distribute written 8 material without a permit or other permission from the institution. (e) Subsections (c) and (d) do not limit the right of 9 student expression at other campus locations. 10 (f) Each institution of higher education shall adopt a 11 12 policy detailing students' rights and responsibilities regarding expressive activities at the institution. The policy must: 13 (1) allow students, student organizations, and 14 15 faculty to: 16 (A) subject to reasonable restrictions adopted under Subsection (d), engage in expressive activities on campus, 17 including by responding to the expressive activities of others; and 18 (B) subject to Subsection (h), invite speakers to 19 20 speak on campus; 21 (2) establish disciplinary sanctions for students or student organizations who unduly interfere with the expressive 22 activities of others on campus; 23 24 (3) include a grievance procedure for addressing

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1	(5) be posted on the institution's Internet website.
2	(g) An institution of higher education may not take action
3	against a student organization or deny the organization any benefit
4	generally available to other student organizations at the
5	institution on the basis of a political, religious, philosophical,
6	ideological, or academic viewpoint expressed by the organization or
7	of any expressive activities of the organization.
8	(h) In determining whether to approve a speaker to speak on
9	campus or in determining the amount of a fee to be charged for use of
10	the institution's facilities for purposes of engaging in expressive
11	activities, an institution of higher education:
12	(1) may consider only content-neutral and
13	viewpoint-neutral criteria related to the needs of the event, such
14	<u>as:</u>
15	(A) the proposed venue and the expected size of
16	the audience;
17	(B) any anticipated need for campus security;
18	(C) any necessary accommodations; and
19	(D) any relevant history of compliance or
20	noncompliance by the requesting student, student organization, or
21	faculty member with the institution's policy adopted under
22	Subsection (f) and any other relevant policies; and
23	(2) may not consider:
24	(A) the anticipated attendance of persons not
25	intending to participate in the event; or
26	(B) any anticipated controversy related to the
27	event.

- 1 (i) Each institution of higher education shall make the
- 2 institution's policies adopted in accordance with this section
- 3 available to students enrolled at and employees of the institution
- 4 by:
- 5 (1) including the policies in the institution's
- 6 student handbook and personnel handbook;
- 7 (2) providing a copy of each policy to students during
- 8 the institution's freshman or transfer student orientation; and
- 9 (3) posting the policies on the institution's Internet
- 10 website.
- 11 <u>(j) Each institution of higher education shall develop</u>
- 12 materials, programs, and procedures to ensure that the
- 13 institution's employees responsible for educating or disciplining
- 14 students understand the requirements of this section and all
- 15 policies adopted by the institution in accordance with this
- 16 <u>section</u>.
- 17 (k) Not later than December 1, 2020, each institution of
- 18 higher education shall prepare, post on the institution's Internet
- 19 website, and submit to the governor and the members of the
- 20 legislature a report regarding the institution's implementation of
- 21 the requirements under this section. This subsection expires
- 22 <u>September 1, 2021.</u>
- SECTION 2. Not later than August 1, 2020, each public
- 24 institution of higher education shall adopt the policy required
- 25 under Section 51.9315(f), Education Code, as added by this Act.
- SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
