C.S.S.B. No. 390

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

relating to the creation of the Northeast Houston Redevelopment District; providing authority to issue bonds; providing authority to impose assessments, fees, or taxes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Subtitle C, Title 4, Special District Local Laws Code, is amended by adding Chapter 3961 to read as follows:

CHAPTER 3961. NORTHEAST HOUSTON REDEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

SUBCHAPTER A. GENERAL PROVISIONS

Sec. 3961.0101. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:

(1) "Board" means the district's board of directors.

(2) "City" means the City of Houston.

(3) "County" means Harris County.

(4) "Director" means a board member.

(5) "District" means the Northeast Houston Redevelopment District.

Sec. 3961.0102. CREATION AND NATURE OF DISTRICT. The district is a special district created under Section 59, Article XVI, Texas Constitution.

Sec. 3961.0103. PURPOSE; LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS. (a) The creation of the district is essential to accomplish the purposes of Sections 52 and 52-a, Article III, and Section 59, Article XVI, Texas Constitution, and other public purposes stated in this chapter. By creating the district and in authorizing political

1 subdivisions to contract with the district, the legislature has
2 established a program to accomplish the public purposes set out in
3 Section 52-a, Article III, Texas Constitution.

4 (b) The creation of the district is necessary to promote,
5 develop, encourage, and maintain employment, commerce,
6 transportation, housing, tourism, recreation, the arts,
7 entertainment, economic development, safety, and the public
8 welfare in the district.

9 (c) The district is created to supplement and not to
10 supplant county services provided in the district.

11 Sec. 3961.0104. FINDINGS OF BENEFIT AND PUBLIC PURPOSE.

12 (a) The district is created to serve a public use and benefit.

13 (b) All land and other property included in the district
14 will benefit from the improvements and services to be provided by
15 the district under powers conferred by Sections 52 and 52-a,
16 Article III, and Section 59, Article XVI, Texas Constitution, and
17 other powers granted under this chapter.

18 (c) The creation of the district is in the public interest
19 and is essential to further the public purposes of:

20 (1) developing and diversifying the economy of the
21 state;

22 (2) eliminating unemployment and underemployment;

23 (3) developing or expanding transportation and
24 commerce; and

25 (4) providing quality residential housing.

26 (d) The district will:

27 (1) promote the health, safety, and general welfare of

1 residents, employers, potential employees, employees, visitors,
2 and consumers in the district, and of the public;

3 (2) provide needed funding for the district to
4 preserve, maintain, and enhance the economic health and vitality of
5 the district territory as a residential community and business
6 center; and

7 (3) promote the health, safety, welfare, and enjoyment
8 of the public by providing pedestrian ways and by landscaping,
9 removing graffiti from, and developing certain areas in the
10 district, which are necessary for the restoration, preservation,
11 and enhancement of scenic beauty.

12 (e) Pedestrian ways along or across a street, whether at
13 grade or above or below the surface, and street lighting, street
14 landscaping, vehicle parking, and street art objects are parts of
15 and necessary components of a street and are considered to be an
16 improvement project that includes a street or road improvement.

17 (f) The district will not act as the agent or
18 instrumentality of any private interest even though the district
19 will benefit many private interests as well as the public.

20 Sec. 3961.0105. DISTRICT TERRITORY. (a) The district is
21 initially composed of the territory described by Section 2 of the
22 Act enacting this chapter.

23 (b) The boundaries and field notes contained in Section 2 of
24 the Act enacting this chapter form a closure. A mistake in the
25 field notes or in copying the field notes in the legislative process
26 does not affect the district's:

27 (1) organization, existence, or validity;

1 (2) right to issue any type of bond for the purposes
2 for which the district is created or to pay the principal of and
3 interest on a bond;

4 (3) right to impose or collect an assessment or tax; or

5 (4) legality or operation.

6 Sec. 3961.0106. ELIGIBILITY FOR INCLUSION IN SPECIAL ZONES.

7 All or any part of the area of the district is eligible to be
8 included in:

9 (1) a tax increment reinvestment zone created under
10 Chapter 311, Tax Code;

11 (2) a tax abatement reinvestment zone created under
12 Chapter 312, Tax Code; or

13 (3) an enterprise zone created under Chapter 2303,
14 Government Code.

15 Sec. 3961.0107. APPLICABILITY OF MUNICIPAL MANAGEMENT
16 DISTRICTS LAW. Except as otherwise provided by this chapter,
17 Chapter 375, Local Government Code, applies to the district.

18 Sec. 3961.0108. CONSTRUCTION OF CHAPTER. This chapter
19 shall be liberally construed in conformity with the findings and
20 purposes stated in this chapter.

21 SUBCHAPTER B. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

22 Sec. 3961.0201. GOVERNING BODY; TERMS. (a) The district
23 is governed by a board of 13 voting directors who must be qualified
24 under and appointed by the governing body of the city as provided by
25 Subchapter D, Chapter 375, Local Government Code.

26 (b) The directors serve staggered terms of four years with
27 six or seven directors' terms expiring June 1 of each odd-numbered

1 year.

2 Sec. 3961.0202. DIRECTOR'S OATH OR AFFIRMATION. (a) A
3 director shall file the director's oath or affirmation of office
4 with the district, and the district shall retain the oath or
5 affirmation in the district records.

6 (b) A director shall file a copy of the director's oath or
7 affirmation with the clerk of the county.

8 Sec. 3961.0203. QUORUM. A vacant director position is not
9 counted for purposes of establishing a quorum.

10 Sec. 3961.0204. OFFICERS. The board shall elect from among
11 the directors a chair, a vice chair, and a secretary. The offices
12 of chair and secretary may not be held by the same person.

13 Sec. 3961.0205. COMPENSATION; EXPENSES. (a) The district
14 may compensate each director in an amount not to exceed \$50 for each
15 board meeting. The total amount of compensation a director may
16 receive each year may not exceed \$2,000.

17 (b) A director is entitled to reimbursement for necessary
18 and reasonable expenses incurred in carrying out the duties and
19 responsibilities of the board.

20 Sec. 3961.0206. LIABILITY INSURANCE. The district may
21 obtain and pay for comprehensive general liability insurance
22 coverage from a commercial insurance company or other source that
23 protects and insures a director against personal liability and from
24 all claims relating to:

25 (1) actions taken by the director in the director's
26 capacity as a member of the board;

27 (2) actions and activities taken by the district; or

1 (3) the actions of others acting on behalf of the
2 district.

3 Sec. 3961.0207. NO EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. The board may not
4 create an executive committee to exercise the powers of the board.

5 Sec. 3961.0208. BOARD MEETINGS. The board shall hold
6 meetings at a place accessible to the public.

7 Sec. 3961.0209. INITIAL DIRECTORS. (a) The initial board
8 consists of the following directors:

23 (b) Of the initial directors, the terms of directors
24 appointed for positions 1 through 6 expire June 1, 2021, and the
25 terms of directors appointed for positions 7 through 13 expire June
26 1, 2023.

27 (c) Section 375.063, Local Government Code, does not apply

1 to the initial directors named by Subsection (a).

2 (d) This section expires September 1, 2023.

3 SUBCHAPTER C. POWERS AND DUTIES

4 Sec. 3961.0301. GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES. The district
5 has the powers and duties necessary to accomplish the purposes for
6 which the district is created.

7 Sec. 3961.0302. IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS AND SERVICES. The
8 district may provide, design, construct, acquire, improve,
9 relocate, operate, maintain, or finance an improvement project or
10 service using money available to the district, or contract with a
11 governmental or private entity to provide, design, construct,
12 acquire, improve, relocate, operate, maintain, or finance an
13 improvement project or service authorized under this chapter or
14 Chapter 375, Local Government Code.

15 Sec. 3961.0303. LOCATION OF IMPROVEMENT PROJECT. An
16 improvement project described by Section 3961.0302 may be located:

17 (1) in the district; or

18 (2) in an area outside but adjacent to the district if
19 the project is for the purpose of extending a public infrastructure
20 improvement beyond the district's boundaries to a logical terminus.

21 Sec. 3961.0304. DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION POWERS. The
22 district, using money available to the district, may exercise the
23 powers given to a development corporation under Chapter 505, Local
24 Government Code, including the power to own, operate, acquire,
25 construct, lease, improve, or maintain a project under that
26 chapter.

27 Sec. 3961.0305. NONPROFIT CORPORATION. (a) The board by

1 resolution may authorize the creation of a nonprofit corporation to
2 assist and act for the district in implementing a project or
3 providing a service authorized by this chapter.

4 (b) The nonprofit corporation:

5 (1) has each power of and is considered to be a local
6 government corporation created under Subchapter D, Chapter 431,
7 Transportation Code; and

8 (2) may implement any project and provide any service
9 authorized by this chapter.

10 (c) The board shall appoint the board of directors of the
11 nonprofit corporation. The board of directors of the nonprofit
12 corporation shall serve in the same manner as the board of directors
13 of a local government corporation created under Subchapter D,
14 Chapter 431, Transportation Code, except that a board member is not
15 required to reside in the district.

16 Sec. 3961.0306. AGREEMENTS; GRANTS. (a) As provided by
17 Chapter 375, Local Government Code, the district may make an
18 agreement with or accept a gift, grant, or loan from any person.

19 (b) The implementation of a project is a governmental
20 function or service for the purposes of Chapter 791, Government
21 Code.

22 Sec. 3961.0307. LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES. To protect the
23 public interest, the district may contract with a qualified party,
24 including the county, to provide law enforcement services in the
25 district for a fee.

26 Sec. 3961.0308. MEMBERSHIP IN CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS.
27 The district may join and pay dues to a charitable or nonprofit

1 organization that performs a service or provides an activity
2 consistent with the furtherance of a district purpose.

3 Sec. 3961.0309. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT. (a) The district
4 may engage in activities that accomplish the economic development
5 purposes of the district.

6 (b) The district may establish and provide for the
7 administration of one or more programs to promote state or local
8 economic development and to stimulate business and commercial
9 activity in the district, including programs to:

10 (1) make loans and grants of public money; and

11 (2) provide district personnel and services.

12 (c) The district may create economic development programs
13 and exercise the economic development powers that:

14 (1) Chapter 380, Local Government Code, provides to a
15 municipality; and

16 (2) Subchapter A, Chapter 1509, Government Code,
17 provides to a municipality.

18 Sec. 3961.0310. CONCURRENCE ON ADDITIONAL POWERS. If the
19 territory of the district is located in the corporate boundaries or
20 the extraterritorial jurisdiction of a municipality, the district
21 may not exercise a power granted to the district after the date the
22 district was created unless the governing body of the municipality
23 by resolution consents to the district's exercise of the power.

24 Sec. 3961.0311. NO EMINENT DOMAIN POWER. The district may
25 not exercise the power of eminent domain.

26 SUBCHAPTER D. GENERAL FINANCIAL PROVISIONS

27 Sec. 3961.0401. DISBURSEMENTS AND TRANSFERS OF MONEY. The

1 board by resolution shall establish the number of signatures and
2 the procedure required for a disbursement or transfer of the
3 district's money.

4 Sec. 3961.0402. MONEY USED FOR IMPROVEMENTS OR SERVICES.
5 The district may acquire, construct, finance, operate, or maintain
6 an improvement project or service authorized under this chapter or
7 Chapter 375, Local Government Code, using any money available to
8 the district.

9 Sec. 3961.0403. GENERAL POWERS REGARDING PAYMENT OF
10 DISTRICT BONDS, OBLIGATIONS, OR OTHER COSTS. The district may
11 provide or secure the payment or repayment of any bond, note, or
12 other temporary or permanent obligation or reimbursement or other
13 contract with any person and the costs and expenses of the
14 establishment, administration, and operation of the district and
15 the district's costs or share of the costs or revenue of an
16 improvement project or district contractual obligation or
17 indebtedness by:

18 (1) the imposition of an ad valorem tax or sales and
19 use tax or an assessment, user fee, concession fee, or rental
20 charge; or

21 (2) any other revenue or resources of the district.

22 Sec. 3961.0404. COSTS FOR IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS. The
23 district may undertake separately or jointly with other persons,
24 including the city or the county, all or part of the cost of an
25 improvement project, including an improvement project:

26 (1) for improving, enhancing, and supporting public
27 safety and security, fire protection and emergency medical

1 services, and law enforcement in or adjacent to the district; or
2 (2) that confers a general benefit on the entire
3 district or a special benefit on a definable part of the district.

4 Sec. 3961.0405. TAX AND ASSESSMENT ABATEMENTS. The
5 district may designate reinvestment zones and may grant abatements
6 of a tax or assessment on property in the zones.

7 Sec. 3961.0406. PROPERTY EXEMPT FROM IMPACT FEES. The
8 district may not impose an impact fee on a residential property,
9 including a multiunit residential property, or a condominium.

10 Sec. 3961.0407. PROPERTY OF CERTAIN UTILITIES EXEMPT FROM
11 ASSESSMENTS AND FEES. The district may not impose an assessment,
12 impact fee, or standby fee on the property, including the
13 equipment, rights-of-way, easements, facilities, or improvements,
14 of:

15 (1) an electric utility or a power generation company
16 as defined by Section 31.002, Utilities Code;

17 (2) a gas utility, as defined by Section 101.003 or
18 121.001, Utilities Code, or a person who owns pipelines used for the
19 transportation or sale of oil or gas or a product or constituent of
20 oil or gas;

21 (3) a person who owns pipelines used for the
22 transportation or sale of carbon dioxide;

23 (4) a telecommunications provider as defined by
24 Section 51.002, Utilities Code; or

25 (5) a cable service provider or video service provider
26 as defined by Section 66.002, Utilities Code.

SUBCHAPTER E. ASSESSMENTS

Sec. 3961.0501. PETITION REQUIRED FOR FINANCING SERVICES AND IMPROVEMENTS WITH ASSESSMENTS. (a) The board may not finance a service or improvement project with assessments under this chapter unless a written petition requesting that service or improvement has been filed with the board.

(b) The petition must be signed by the owners of at least 50 percent of the property in the district subject to assessment according to the most recent certified tax appraisal roll for the county.

Sec. 3961.0502. ASSESSMENTS; LIENS FOR ASSESSMENTS.

(a) The board by resolution may impose and collect an assessment for any purpose authorized by this chapter in all or any part of the district that is not a residential property, including a multiunit residential property or a condominium.

(b) An assessment, a reassessment, or an assessment resulting from an addition to or correction of the assessment roll by the district, penalties and interest on an assessment or reassessment, an expense of collection, and reasonable attorney's fees incurred by the district:

(1) are a first and prior lien against the property assessed;

(2) are superior to any other lien or claim other than a lien or claim for county, school district, or municipal ad valorem taxes; and

(3) are the personal liability of and a charge against the owners of the property even if the owners are not named in the

1 assessment proceedings.

2 (c) The lien is effective from the date of the board's
3 resolution imposing the assessment until the date the assessment is
4 paid. The board may enforce the lien in the same manner that the
5 board may enforce an ad valorem tax lien against real property.

6 (d) The board may make a correction to or deletion from the
7 assessment roll that does not increase the amount of assessment of
8 any parcel of land without providing notice and holding a hearing in
9 the manner required for additional assessments.

10 Sec. 3961.0503. METHOD OF NOTICE FOR HEARING. The district
11 may mail the notice required by Section 375.115(c), Local
12 Government Code, by certified or first class United States mail.
13 The board shall determine the method of notice.

14 SUBCHAPTER F. TAXES AND BONDS

15 Sec. 3961.0601. TAX ABATEMENT. The district may enter into
16 a tax abatement agreement in accordance with the general laws of
17 this state authorizing and applicable to a tax abatement agreement
18 by a municipality.

19 Sec. 3961.0602. PROPERTY TAX AUTHORIZED. (a) The district
20 may impose an ad valorem tax on all taxable property in the district
21 to:

22 (1) pay for an improvement project of the types
23 authorized by Section 52(b), Article III, and Section 59, Article
24 XVI, Texas Constitution; or

25 (2) secure the payment of bonds issued for a purpose
26 described by Subdivision (1).

27 (b) The district may not impose an ad valorem tax to pay for

1 an improvement project under this chapter unless:

2 (1) a written petition has been filed with the board
3 requesting an election to approve the imposition of the tax signed
4 by the owners of at least 50 percent of the property in the district
5 subject to assessment according to the most recent certified county
6 property tax rolls; and

7 (2) the imposition of the tax is approved by the voters
8 of the district voting at the requested election.

9 (c) The district may not impose an ad valorem tax on a
10 residential property, including a multiunit residential property
11 or a condominium.

12 Sec. 3961.0603. SALES AND USE TAX. (a) The district may
13 impose a sales and use tax if authorized by a majority of the voters
14 of the district voting at an election called for that purpose.
15 Revenue from the tax may be used for any purpose for which ad
16 valorem tax revenue of the district may be used.

17 (b) The district may not adopt a sales and use tax if as a
18 result of the adoption of the tax the combined rate of all sales and
19 use taxes imposed by the district and other political subdivisions
20 of this state having territory in the district would exceed two
21 percent at any location in the district.

22 (c) If the voters of the district approve the adoption of
23 the tax at an election held on the same election date on which
24 another political subdivision adopts a sales and use tax or
25 approves an increase in the rate of its sales and use tax and as a
26 result the combined rate of all sales and use taxes imposed by the
27 district and other political subdivisions of this state having

1 territory in the district would exceed two percent at any location
2 in the district, the election to adopt a sales and use tax under
3 this chapter has no effect.

4 Sec. 3961.0604. BONDS AND OTHER OBLIGATIONS. (a) The
5 district may issue, by public or private sale, bonds, notes, or
6 other obligations payable wholly or partly from ad valorem taxes,
7 sales and use taxes, or assessments in the manner provided by
8 Subchapter A, Chapter 372, or Subchapter J, Chapter 375, Local
9 Government Code.

10 (b) In exercising the district's borrowing power, the
11 district may issue a bond or other obligation in the form of a bond,
12 note, certificate of participation or other instrument evidencing a
13 proportionate interest in payments to be made by the district, or
14 other type of obligation.

15 (c) In addition to the sources of money described by
16 Subchapter A, Chapter 372, or Subchapter J, Chapter 375, Local
17 Government Code, district bonds may be secured and made payable
18 wholly or partly by a pledge of any part of the money the
19 district receives from improvement revenue or from any other
20 source.

21 Sec. 3961.0605. BOND MATURITY. Bonds may mature not more
22 than 40 years from their date of issue.

23 Sec. 3961.0606. TAXES FOR BONDS AND OTHER OBLIGATIONS. At
24 the time bonds or other obligations payable wholly or partly from ad
25 valorem taxes are issued:

26 (1) the board shall impose a continuing direct annual
27 ad valorem tax for each year that all or part of the bonds are

1 outstanding; and

2 (2) the district annually shall impose an ad valorem
3 tax on all taxable property in the district in an amount sufficient
4 to:

5 (A) pay the interest on the bonds or other
6 obligations as the interest becomes due; and

7 (B) create a sinking fund for the payment of the
8 principal of the bonds or other obligations when due or the
9 redemption price at any earlier required redemption date.

10 SUBCHAPTER G. DISSOLUTION

11 Sec. 3961.0701. DISSOLUTION BY ORDINANCE. (a) A
12 municipality that includes territory of the district, in the
13 corporate boundaries or extraterritorial jurisdiction of the
14 municipality, by ordinance may dissolve the district.

15 (b) The municipality may not dissolve the district until the
16 district's outstanding debt or contractual obligations that are
17 payable from ad valorem taxes have been repaid or discharged, or the
18 municipality has affirmatively assumed the obligation to pay the
19 outstanding debt from municipal revenue.

20 Sec. 3961.0702. COLLECTION OF ASSESSMENTS AND OTHER
21 REVENUE. (a) If the dissolved district has bonds or other
22 obligations outstanding secured by and payable from assessments or
23 other revenue, other than ad valorem taxes, the municipality that
24 dissolves the district shall succeed to the rights and obligations
25 of the district regarding enforcement and collection of the
26 assessments or other revenue.

27 (b) The municipality shall have and exercise all district

1 powers to enforce and collect the assessments or other revenue to
2 pay:

3 (1) the bonds or other obligations when due and
4 payable according to their terms; or

5 (2) special revenue or assessment bonds or other
6 obligations issued by the municipality to refund the outstanding
7 bonds or obligations.

8 Sec. 3961.0703. ASSUMPTION OF ASSETS AND LIABILITIES.

9 (a) If a municipality dissolves the district, the municipality
10 assumes, subject to the appropriation and availability of funds,
11 the obligations of the district, including any bonds or other debt
12 payable from assessments or other district revenue.

13 (b) If a municipality dissolves the district, the board
14 shall transfer ownership of all district property to the
15 municipality.

16 SECTION 2. The Northeast Houston Redevelopment District
17 initially includes all the territory contained in the following
18 area:

19 The Northeast Houston Redevelopment District is +/- 12,905 acres of
20 land situated east of US Hwy 59 North and north of Liberty Road
21 within the Municipal Limits of the City of Houston and Harris
22 County, Texas, and described as follows:

23 Beginning at intersection of west right-of-way (ROW) of Lockwood Dr
24 and centerline ROW of North Loop Fwy E;

25 Then generally west along centerline ROW of North Loop Fwy E to
26 centerline ROW of US Hwy 59 North;

27 Then north along centerline ROW of US Hwy 59 North to centerline of

1 Southern Pacific Railway;
2 Then north northeast along centerline of Southern Pacific Railway
3 to centerline ROW of E Crosstimbers St;
4 Then east along centerline ROW of E Crosstimbers St to centerline
5 ROW of Hirsch Rd;
6 Then north and north northeast along centerline ROW of Hirsch Rd to
7 centerline ROW of Van Zandt St;
8 Then east along centerline ROW of Van Zandt St to centerline ROW of
9 Homestead Rd;
10 Then north along centerline ROW of Homestead Rd to centerline of
11 drainage ditch P125-00-00 (Tributary 14.27 to Greens Bayou);
12 Then east, south and east along centerline of drainage ditch
13 P125-00-00 (Tributary 14.27 to Greens Bayou) to southwest corner of
14 0.1525 acre lot (NORTHWOOD MANOR SEC 4 LT 1 BLK 43);
15 Then east and generally east southeast along south boundary of
16 NORTHWOOD MANOR SEC 4 LTS 1-9 BLK 43, LTS 1-11 BLK 54, and LTS 13-16
17 BLK 53, and NORTHWOOD MANOR SEC 8 LTS 55-63 BLK 1 and LTS 191-206 BLK
18 6 to southwest corner of 0.271 acre lot (NORTHWOOD MANOR SEC 8 LT
19 191 BLK 6);
20 Then east along south boundary of said 0.271 acre lot and NORTHWOOD
21 MANOR SEC 8 to centerline ROW of N Wayside Dr and boundary line of
22 City of Houston Municipal Limits;
23 Then south along centerline ROW of N Wayside Dr and boundary line of
24 City of Houston Municipal Limits to a point west of southwest corner
25 of 233.2922 acre tract (ABST 119 J E BUNDICK TR 2C);
26 Then east to east ROW line of N Wayside Dr and along south boundary
27 of said 233.2922 acre tract, and 195.79 acre tract (ABST 119 J E

1 BUNDICK TRS 2B & 2D), and boundary line of City of Houston Municipal
2 Limits, to west boundary of 32.0224 acre tract (ABST 600 E NOLAND ML
3 (BSL&W) HOU TO ANCH TR R60);

1 SECTION 3. (a) The legal notice of the intention to
2 introduce this Act, setting forth the general substance of this
3 Act, has been published as provided by law, and the notice and a
4 copy of this Act have been furnished to all persons, agencies,
5 officials, or entities to which they are required to be furnished
6 under Section 59, Article XVI, Texas Constitution, and Chapter 313,
7 Government Code.

8 (b) The governor, one of the required recipients, has
9 submitted the notice and Act to the Texas Commission on
10 Environmental Quality.

11 (c) The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has filed
12 its recommendations relating to this Act with the governor,
13 lieutenant governor, and speaker of the house of representatives
14 within the required time.

15 (d) All requirements of the constitution and laws of this
16 state and the rules and procedures of the legislature with respect
17 to the notice, introduction, and passage of this Act have been
18 fulfilled and accomplished.

19 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
20 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
21 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
22 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
23 Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
