Section 11.253(d), Education Code, is amended to read as follows: 15 16 (d) Each campus improvement plan must: (1) assess the academic achievement for each student 17 in the school using the achievement indicator system as described 18 by Section 39.053; 19 20 (2) set the campus performance objectives based on the 21 achievement indicator system, including objectives for special needs populations, including students 22 in special education 23 programs under Subchapter A, Chapter 29; 24 (3) identify how the campus goals will be met for each

4 SECTION 3. Section 28.004, Education Code, is amended by 5 amending Subsections (a), (d), (d-1), (l-1), and (m) and adding 6 Subsection (m-1) to read as follows:

7 (a) The board of trustees of each school district <u>may</u> 8 [shall] establish a local school health advisory council to assist 9 the district in ensuring that local community values are reflected 10 in the district's health education instruction.

11 (d) The board of trustees shall appoint at least <u>seven</u> 12 [five] members to the local school health advisory council. A 13 majority of the members must be persons who are parents of students 14 enrolled in the district and who are not employed by the 15 district. One of those members shall serve as chair or co-chair of 16 the council. The board of trustees also may appoint one or more 17 persons from each of the following groups [<del>or a representative from</del>

2 (d-1) The local school health advisory council shall <u>hold</u>
3 [meet] at least <u>three meetings</u> [four times] each year.

4 (1-1) The local school health advisory council shall 5 [establish a physical activity and fitness planning subcommittee 6 to] consider issues relating to student physical activity and 7 fitness and make policy recommendations to increase physical 8 activity and improve fitness among students.

9 (m) In addition to performing other duties, the local school 10 health advisory council shall submit to the board of trustees, at 11 least annually, a written report that includes:

(1) any council recommendation concerning the school district's health education curriculum and instruction or related matters that the council has not previously submitted to the board;

15 (2) any suggested modification to a council16 recommendation previously submitted to the board;

17 (3) a detailed explanation of the council's activities 18 during the period between the date of the current report and the 19 date of the last prior written report; and

20 (4) any recommendations <u>to increase student</u> [made by 21 the] physical activity and <u>improve student</u> fitness [planning 22 subcommittee].

23 (m-1) A school district that maintains an Internet website
24 shall post on the website the local school health advisory
25 council's report required by Subsection (m).

26 SECTION 4. Section 551.001(3), Government Code, is amended 27 to read as follows:

"Governmental body" means: 1 (3) 2 (A) a board, commission, department, committee, 3 or agency within the executive or legislative branch of state government that is directed by one or more elected or appointed 4 5 members; 6 (B) a county commissioners court in the state; 7 (C) a municipal governing body in the state; 8 (D) a deliberative body that has rulemaking or quasi-judicial power and that is classified as a department, 9 agency, or political subdivision of a county or municipality; 10 a school district board of trustees; 11 (E) a county board of school trustees; 12 (F) a county board of education; 13 (G) 14 (H) the governing board of a special district 15 created by law; 16 (I) a local workforce development board created 17 under Section 2308.253; 18 a nonprofit corporation that is eligible to (J) receive funds under the federal community services block grant 19 program and that is authorized by this state to serve a geographic 20 area of the state; 21 22 (K) a nonprofit corporation organized under Chapter 67, Water Code, that provides a water supply or wastewater 23 24 service, or both, and is exempt from ad valorem taxation under 25 Section 11.30, Tax Code; [and] (L) a joint board created under Section 22.074, 26 27 Transportation Code; and

(M) a local school health advisory council
 established under Section 28.004, Education Code.

3 SECTION 5. On August 31, 2019, all local school health 4 advisory councils established under Section 28.004, Education 5 Code, before the effective date of this Act, are abolished. On or 6 after the effective date of this Act, the board of trustees of a 7 school district may establish a local school health advisory 8 council as provided by Section 28.004, Education Code, as amended 9 by this Act.

SECTION 6. This Act applies beginning with the 2019-2020 school year.

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SECTION 7. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
