1	AN ACT
2	relating to the administration by the Texas Workforce Commission of
3	a workforce diploma pilot program.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subtitle B, Title 4, Labor Code, is amended by
6	adding Chapter 317 to read as follows:
7	CHAPTER 317. WORKFORCE DIPLOMA PILOT PROGRAM
8	Sec. 317.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
9	(1) "Adult" means any individual who is over the age of
10	compulsory school attendance prescribed by Section 25.085
11	Education Code.
12	(2) "Program" means the workforce diploma pilot
13	program established under this chapter.
14	Sec. 317.002. PROGRAM ESTABLISHMENT AND ADMINISTRATION
15	PURPOSE. The commission, in consultation with the Texas Education

- Agency, shall establish and administer a workforce diploma pilot 16
- program under which eligible high school diploma-granting entities 17
- participating in the program may be reimbursed for successfully 18
- 19 assisting adult students to obtain a high school diploma and
- develop technical career readiness skills and employability. 20
- Sec. 317.003. REQUEST 21 FOR PROGRAM PROVIDER
- QUALIFICATIONS. Not later than October 15 of each year, the 22
- commission shall publish a request for qualifications for providers 23
- 24 to participate in the program.

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1	Sec. 317.004. PROVIDER ELIGIBILITY. To be eligible to
2	participate as a provider under the program, a provider must:
3	(1) apply to the commission in the manner prescribed
4	by commission rule;
5	(2) be a public, nonprofit, or private high school
6	diploma-granting entity accredited by a regional accrediting body;
7	(3) have at least two years of experience providing
8	dropout reengagement services to adult students, including
9	recruitment, learning plan development, and proactive coaching and
10	mentoring, leading to the obtainment of a high school diploma;
11	(4) be equipped to:
12	(A) provide:
13	(i) academic skill intake assessment and
14	transcript evaluations;
15	(ii) remediation coursework in literacy and
16	<pre>numeracy;</pre>
17	(iii) a research-validated academic
18	resiliency assessment and intervention;
19	(iv) employability skills development
20	aligned to employer needs;
21	(v) career pathways coursework;
22	(vi) preparation for the attainment of
23	industry-recognized credentials; and
24	(vii) career placement services; and
25	(B) develop a learning plan that integrates

(5) offer a course catalog that includes all courses

academic requirements and career goals; and

- 3 Sec. 317.005. PROVIDER APPROVAL; LIST OF APPROVED
- 4 PROVIDERS. (a) Not later than November 15 of each year, the
- 5 commission shall publish a list of providers approved by the
- 6 commission to participate in the program during the next calendar
- 7 year.
- 8 (b) An approved provider maintains approval to participate
- 9 in the program during a subsequent calendar year without reapplying
- 10 to the commission unless the provider is removed from the approved
- 11 provider list as provided by Section 317.008.
- 12 Sec. 317.006. REIMBURSEMENT OF PROGRAM PROVIDERS FOR
- 13 STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT. (a) To the extent money is available for that
- 14 purpose, the commission shall reimburse each approved provider
- 15 participating in the program for the achievement of the following
- 16 <u>milestones by students receiving services from the provider:</u>
- 17 (1) \$250 for the completion of a half credit;
- 18 (2) \$250 for the completion of an employability skills
- 19 certification program equal to at least one Carnegie unit or the
- 20 equivalent;
- 21 (3) \$250 for the attainment of an industry-recognized
- 22 <u>credential requiring not more than 50 hours of training;</u>
- 23 (4) \$500 for the attainment of an industry-recognized
- 24 credential requiring at least 50 but not more than 100 hours of
- 25 training;
- 26 (5) \$750 for the attainment of an industry-recognized
- 27 credential requiring more than 100 hours of training; and

- (6) \$1,000 for the obtainment of a high school
- 2 diploma.
- 3 (b) Not later than the 10th calendar day of each month, an
- 4 approved provider participating in the program shall submit to the
- 5 commission an invoice for the milestones achieved by the provider's
- 6 students during the previous calendar month.
- 7 (c) The commission shall reimburse approved program
- 8 providers in the order in which invoices are received by the
- 9 commission until all funds available for the program are exhausted.
- Sec. 317.007. ANNUAL REPORT. Not later than January 15 of
- 11 each year, each approved provider that participated in the program
- 12 during the previous calendar year shall report to the commission
- 13 the following data regarding the provider's students for that year:
- 14 (1) the number of students for which the provider
- 15 received reimbursement under the program;
- 16 (2) the total number of credits earned by the
- 17 students;
- 18 (3) the total number of employability skills
- 19 certification programs completed by the students;
- 20 (4) the total number of industry-recognized
- 21 credentials attained by the students in each of the funding tiers
- 22 described by Sections 317.006(a)(3), (4), and (5); and
- 23 (5) the number of students who obtained a high school
- 24 diploma.
- Sec. 317.008. PROVIDER PERFORMANCE REVIEW. (a) The
- 26 commission by rule shall prescribe minimum performance standards
- 27 for providers participating in the program. The minimum

- 1 performance standards must include:
- 2 (1) a graduation rate of at least 50 percent; and
- 3 (2) a program cost per graduate of \$7,000 or less.
- 4 (b) For purposes of Subsections (a)(1) and (2), the
- 5 commission by rule shall develop formulas to make the appropriate
- 6 <u>calculations</u>. The graduation rate must be calculated one cohort
- 7 year in arrears.
- 8 (c) The commission shall review data from each
- 9 participating approved provider annually to ensure that the
- 10 services offered by the provider are meeting the minimum
- 11 performance standards. If the commission determines that an
- 12 approved provider did not meet the minimum performance standards in
- 13 the previous calendar year, the commission shall place the provider
- 14 on probationary status for the remainder of the current calendar
- 15 <u>year.</u>
- 16 <u>(d) The commission shall remove from the approved provider</u>
- 17 list published under Section 317.005 any provider that does not
- 18 meet the minimum performance standards for two consecutive calendar
- 19 years.
- Sec. 317.009. REPORT. Not later than December 1 of each
- 21 even-numbered year, the commission shall submit to the legislature
- 22 a report on the effectiveness of the program. The commission shall
- 23 include in the report a recommendation regarding whether the
- 24 program should be continued, expanded, or terminated.
- Sec. 317.010. EXPIRATION. This chapter expires September
- 26 1, 2025.
- 27 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
