4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subtitle C, Title 2, Health and Safety Code, is
6	amended by adding Chapter 65 to read as follows:
7	CHAPTER 65. BORDER PUBLIC HEALTH INITIATIVE
8	Sec. 65.0001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
9	(1) "Border county" means a county adjacent to this
10	state's international border with Mexico.
11	(2) "Promotora" or "community health worker" has the
12	meaning assigned by Section 48.001.
13	Sec. 65.0002. BORDER PUBLIC HEALTH INITIATIVE. (a) To the
14	extent funding is available, the department shall develop an
15	initiative to reduce the adverse health impacts of diabetes,
16	hypertension, and obesity for adults and children in border
17	counties. The initiative must promote:
18	(1) educational resources designed to prevent those
19	<pre>conditions;</pre>
20	(2) screenings of persons at risk for those
21	conditions; and
22	(3) referrals to and treatment by health care
23	providers for those conditions.
24	(b) In developing the border public health initiative, the

1	department may consult and collaborate with:
2	(1) other health and human services agencies;
3	(2) other appropriate state or federal agencies;
4	(3) health science centers and medical schools; and
5	(4) public and private health care providers and
6	hospitals.
7	Sec. 65.0003. OUTREACH CAMPAIGNS. The department shall,
8	subject to available funding, conduct bilingual, culturally
9	appropriate outreach campaigns in consultation and collaboration
10	with appropriate individuals and entities that may include:
11	(1) promotoras and community health workers;
12	(2) academic centers located in border counties;
13	(3) nonprofit organizations;
14	(4) public schools;
15	(5) public and private health care providers and
16	hospitals;
17	(6) worksite wellness programs;
18	(7) local business and health care providers that
19	provide early detection of prediabetes, prehypertension, and
20	obesity; and
21	(8) other local entities, as the department determines
22	appropriate.
23	SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
