Section 1101.006, Occupations Code, is amended to read as follows: 7 Sec. 1101.006. APPLICATION OF SUNSET ACT. The Texas Real 8 9 Estate Commission is subject to Chapter 325, Government Code (Texas Sunset Act). Unless continued in existence as provided by that 10 chapter, the commission is abolished and this chapter, Chapter 11 1102, and Chapter 1303 of this code and Chapter 221, Property Code, 12 expire September 1, 2025 [2019]. 13 14 SECTION 2. Section 1101.059, Occupations Code, is amended by amending Subsections (b) and (c) and adding Subsection (d) to 15 read as follows: 16 17 (b) The training program must provide the person with information regarding: 18 the law governing commission operations [this 19 (1)chapter and other laws regulated by the commission]; 20 21 (2) the programs, functions, rules, and budget of the 22 commission; 23 (3) the scope of and limitations on the rulemaking 24 authority of the commission;
