S.B. No. 2170

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT relating to pollinator health. 2 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 131, Agriculture Code, is 4 5 amended by adding Sections 131.011 and 131.012 to read as follows: 6 Sec. 131.011. POLLINATOR HEALTH EDUCATION. (a) The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, in consultation with the 7 department, shall develop educational materials regarding the best 8 9 practices for avoiding adverse effects from pesticides on populations of bees and other pollinating insects. The educational 10 materials must include information on measures that pesticide 11 applicators may take to protect honeybees and bumblebees. The 12 Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and the department shall 13 14 jointly design the requirements to ensure that any pesticide applicator applying or supervising the application of a pesticide 15 is knowledgeable regarding alternatives to, the appropriateness 16 of, and precautions for pesticide use that may be injurious to the 17 health of bees and other pollinating insects. 18 (b) The department shall make the educational materials 19 described in this section a part of the education required to obtain 20 a pesticide applicator license under Chapter 76. 21 Sec. 131.012. TASK FORCE ON POLLINATOR HEALTH. (a) In this 22 23 section, "task force" means the task force on pollinator health

24 established under this section.

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1	(b) The task force consists of the following 10 members:
2	(1) one member of the senate, appointed by the
3	lieutenant governor after consultation with the speaker of the
4	house of representatives, who serves as a nonvoting member of the
5	task force;
6	(2) one member of the house of representatives,
7	appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives after
8	consultation with the lieutenant governor, who is from a different
9	political party than the member appointed under Subdivision (1) and
10	who serves as a nonvoting member of the task force;
11	(3) one member, appointed by the governor, who is a
12	university faculty member specializing in the science of pollinator
13	health;
14	(4) one member, appointed by the governor,
15	representing an advocacy group for nurseries and greenhouse
16	producers;
17	(5) one member, appointed by the governor,
18	representing an advocacy group for farmers;
19	(6) one member, appointed by the governor,
20	representing an advocacy group dedicated to the protection of
21	pollinators and invertebrates;
22	(7) one member, appointed by the governor,
23	representing an advocacy group dedicated to environmental
24	protection;
25	(8) one member, appointed by the governor,
26	representing an advocacy group for retailers;
27	(9) one member, appointed by the governor, who is

No. 2170 certified as a master gardener by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension 1 2 Service and who represents the public; and (10) one member, appointed by the governor, who is a 3 beekeeper and who represents the public. 4 5 The task force shall undertake activities to examine (c) issues relevant to pollinator health, including: 6 7 (1) studying proposed and enacted pesticide regulations from other states and countries that are more 8 protective of pollinator health than the pesticide regulations of 9 10 the United States Environmental Protection Agency; (2) studying public education and outreach plans 11 12 regarding pollinator health that have been successful in other 13 states; (3) evaluating the effectiveness of applicator 14 15 licensing and other legal requirements, and of any state or federal incentives, in matters affecting pollinator health; 16 17 (4) identifying possible funding streams for efforts to promote or protect pollinator health; 18 19 (5) investigating the means used by other states to gather data on populations of bees or other pollinating insects; 20 21 and 22 (6) evaluating existing best management practices for applying neonicotinoids in a manner that avoids harming pollinating 23 24 insects. (d) The task force may take actions necessary and proper to 25 26 carry out the work of the task force, including scheduling hearings and taking testimony on matters related to pollinator health. 27

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1	(e) A majority of the voting members of the task force
2	constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business.
3	(f) Official action by the task force requires the approval
4	of five or more voting members of the task force.
5	(g) The task force shall elect one of its voting members to
6	serve as presiding officer.
7	(h) The appropriate appointing officer shall appoint a
8	qualified person to fill a vacancy on the task force.
9	(i) The task force shall meet at times and places specified
10	by the call of the presiding officer or of a majority of the voting
11	members of the task force.
12	(j) The task force may adopt bylaws necessary for the
13	operation of the task force.
14	(k) Not later than October 1, 2020, the task force shall
15	submit a report, which may include recommendations for legislation,
16	to the standing committees of the senate and the house of
17	representatives with primary jurisdiction over agriculture. The
18	task force may provide progress reports to those committees before
19	<u>October 1, 2020.</u>
20	(1) The department shall provide staff support to the task
21	force.
22	(m) Members of the task force who are not members of the
23	legislature are not entitled to compensation but may be reimbursed
24	for actual and necessary travel and other expenses incurred in the
25	performance of their official duties in the manner and amounts
26	provided for in the General Appropriations Act.
27	(n) Each state agency shall assist the task force in the

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performance of its duties and, to the extent permitted by laws 1 relating to confidentiality, shall furnish information and advice 2 that the members of the task force consider necessary to perform 3 their duties. 4 5 (o) This section expires December 31, 2020. SECTION 2. Not later than October 1, 2019, the relevant 6 appointing authorities shall appoint the members of the task force 7 on pollinator health under Section 131.012(b), Agriculture Code, as 8

9 added by this Act.

10 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 11 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 12 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 13 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 14 Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
