A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the essential knowledge and skills of the technology
3	applications curriculum and the establishment of a computer science
4	strategic advisory committee to increase computer science
5	instruction and participation in public schools.
6	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
7	SECTION 1. Section 28.002, Education Code, is amended by
8	adding Subsection (c-3) to read as follows:
9	(c-3) In adopting the essential knowledge and skills for the
10	technology applications curriculum for kindergarten through grade
11	eight, the State Board of Education shall adopt essential knowledge
12	and skills that include coding, computer programming,
13	computational thinking, and cybersecurity. The State Board of
14	Education shall review and revise, as needed, the essential
15	knowledge and skills of the technology applications curriculum
16	every five years to ensure that the curriculum:
17	(1) is relevant to student education; and
18	(2) aligns with current or emerging professions.
19	SECTION 2. Subchapter A, Chapter 28, Education Code, is
20	amended by adding Section 28.0181 to read as follows:
21	Sec. 28.0181. COMPUTER SCIENCE STRATEGIC ADVISORY
22	COMMITTEE. (a) In this section, "advisory committee" means the
23	computer science strategic advisory committee established under
24	this section.

1	(b) The agency shall establish the computer science
2	strategic advisory committee to develop and provide
3	recommendations for increasing computer science instruction and
4	participation in public schools.
5	(c) The advisory committee is composed of at least 11
6	members. The members must include:
7	(1) two members appointed by the governor;
8	(2) two members appointed by the lieutenant governor;
9	(3) two members appointed by the speaker of the house
10	of representatives;
11	(4) one member appointed by the chair of the senate
12	committee with primary jurisdiction over primary and secondary
13	education;
14	(5) one member appointed by the chair of the senate
15	committee with primary jurisdiction over higher education;
16	(6) one member appointed by the chair of the house of
17	representatives committee with primary jurisdiction over primary
18	and secondary education;
19	(7) one member appointed by the chair of the house of
20	representatives committee with primary jurisdiction over higher
21	education;
22	(8) one member appointed by the chair of the State
23	Board of Education; and
24	(9) any other members added by the advisory committee
25	in a manner determined by the committee in the committee's
26	discretion.
27	(d) In appointing members to the advisory committee, the

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governor, lieutenant governor, and speaker of the house of 1 2 representatives shall coordinate appointments to ensure that the 3 six individuals appointed to the advisory committee collectively by 4 those officers include: 5 (1) three educators who teach in a public school and are certified in computer science; 6 7 (2) one parent or person standing in parental relation to a student enrolled in a public school; 8 9 (3) one person employed in the technology industry; and 10 11 (4) one faculty member of an institution of higher 12 education. 13 (e) The governor shall designate a member of the advisory committee as the presiding officer of the advisory committee to 14 15 serve in that capacity at the pleasure of the governor. 16 (f) The advisory committee may hold public meetings. 17 (g) Members of the advisory committee are not entitled to compensation but are entitled to reimbursement for actual and 18 necessary expenses incurred in fulfilling committee duties. 19 members of the agency shall provide 20 (h) Staff administrative support for the advisory committee. 21 22 (i) Funding for the administrative and operational expenses 23 of the advisory committee shall be provided by appropriation to the 24 agency for that purpose. 25 (j) Not later than September 1, 2020, the advisory committee shall submit to the governor and the legislature a report that 26 27 includes recommended changes to state law, including funding

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1	proposals and timelines for the implementation of the recommended
2	changes. The report shall include recommendations that are
3	intended to:
4	(1) increase the number of certified computer science
5	<pre>teachers;</pre>
6	(2) increase the number of public high schools
7	offering computer science courses;
8	(3) increase the number of high school students
9	enrolled in computer science courses;
10	(4) encourage the enrollment of diverse student
11	populations in computer science courses; and
12	(5) expand computer science learning opportunities,
13	including computer programming, computer coding, cybersecurity,
14	and computational thinking, in public schools.
15	(k) The advisory committee is abolished and this section
16	expires January 1, 2021.
17	SECTION 3. Not later than December 31, 2022, the State Board
18	of Education shall review and revise, as needed, the essential
19	knowledge and skills of the technology applications curriculum as
20	required by Section 28.002(c-3), Education Code, as added by this
21	Act.
22	SECTION 4. As soon as practicable after the effective date
23	of this Act, the appropriate persons, as provided by Section
24	28.0181(c), Education Code, as added by this Act, shall appoint
25	members to the computer science strategic advisory committee.
26	SECTION 5. The Texas Education Agency is required to
27	implement a provision of this Act only if the legislature

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1 appropriates money specifically for that purpose. If the 2 legislature does not appropriate money specifically for that 3 purpose, the Texas Education Agency may, but is not required to, 4 implement a provision of this Act using other appropriations 5 available for that purpose.

6 SECTION 6. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 7 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 8 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 9 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 10 Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
