2	relating to local goals for public education and governance of
3	local school districts.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subchapter C, Chapter 11, Education Code, is
6	amended by adding Sections 11.0595 and 11.0596 to read as follows:
7	Sec. 11.0595. TERM LIMITS. The board of trustees of an
8	independent school district by resolution may:
9	(1) limit the number of terms that trustees may serve,
10	subject to Section 11.0596, if applicable; or
11	(2) remove a limit on the number of terms that trustees
12	may serve other than a limit prescribed by Section 11.0596, if
13	applicable.
14	Sec. 11.0596. TERM LIMITS FOR TRUSTEES OF CERTAIN SCHOOL
15	DISTRICTS. (a) This section applies only to a school district with
16	an enrollment of 20,000 or more students.
17	(b) A trustee of a school district to which this section
18	applies may serve for a maximum of, as applicable:
19	(1) three three-year terms; or
20	(2) two four-year terms.
21	SECTION 2. Section 11.252(a), Education Code, is amended to
22	read as follows:
23	(a) Each school district shall have a district improvement
24	plan that is developed, evaluated, and revised annually, in

accordance with district policy, by the superintendent with the 1 assistance of the district-level committee established under 2 3 Section 11.251. The purpose of the district improvement plan is to guide district and campus staff in the improvement of student 4 performance for all student groups in order to attain state 5 standards in respect to the achievement indicators adopted under 6 Section 39.053(c). The district improvement plan must be aligned 7 8 with the student outcomes plans developed under Section 11.2522 and include provisions for: 9

(1) a 10 comprehensive needs assessment addressing 11 district student performance on the achievement indicators, and 12 other appropriate measures of performance, that are disaggregated by all student groups served by the district, including categories 13 14 of ethnicity, socioeconomic status, sex, and populations served by 15 special programs, including students in special education programs under Subchapter A, Chapter 29; 16

17 (2) measurable district performance objectives for all achievement indicators 18 appropriate for all student 19 populations, including students in special education programs under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, and other measures of student 20 performance that may be identified through the comprehensive needs 21 22 assessment;

(3) strategies for improvement of student performancethat include:

(A) instructional methods for addressing the
26 needs of student groups not achieving their full potential;

27 (B) methods for addressing the needs of students

for special programs, including: 1 2 (i) suicide prevention programs, in accordance with Subchapter 0-1, Chapter 161, Health and Safety 3 Code, which includes a parental or guardian notification procedure; 4 5 (ii) conflict resolution programs; 6 (iii) violence prevention programs; and 7 (iv) dyslexia treatment programs; 8 (C) dropout reduction; 9 (D) integration of technology in instructional 10 and administrative programs; discipline management; 11 (E) staff development for professional staff of 12 (F) the district; 13 (G) career education to assist students 14 in 15 developing the knowledge, skills, and competencies necessary for a broad range of career opportunities; and 16 17 (H) accelerated education; 18 (4)strategies for providing to middle school, junior high school, and high school students, those students' teachers and 19 school counselors, and those students' parents information about: 20 21 (A) higher education admissions and financial aid opportunities; 22 the TEXAS grant program and the Teach for 23 (B) 24 Texas grant program established under Chapter 56; 25 (C) the need for students to make informed curriculum choices to be prepared for success beyond high school; 26 27 and

No. 2201 sources of information on higher education 1 (D) admissions and financial aid; 2 (5) resources 3 needed to implement identified 4 strategies; 5 (6) staff responsible for ensuring the accomplishment 6 of each strategy; 7 (7) timelines for ongoing monitoring of the 8 implementation of each improvement strategy; 9 (8) formative evaluation criteria for determining periodically whether strategies are resulting 10 in intended improvement of student performance; and 11 (9) the policy under Section 38.0041 addressing sexual 12 abuse and other maltreatment of children. 13 SECTION 3. Subchapter F, Chapter 11, Education Code, is 14 15 amended by adding Section 11.2522 to read as follows: 16 Sec. 11.2522. STUDENT OUTCOMES PLANS. (a) In addition to 17 the district improvement plan developed under Section 11.252, each school district shall develop one-year, three-year, and five-year 18 plans for improving student outcomes in reading, mathematics, and 19 any other area identified by the district. 20 21 (b) Each plan developed under Subsection (a) must identify student achievement goals for the district and each campus in the 22 district for each of the following demographic categories: 23 24 (1) household income; 25 (2) native language; 26 (3) ethnicity;

(4) gender; and

1	(5) any other demographic category identified by the
2	commissioner.
3	(c) Not later than September 1 of each year, each school
4	district shall submit to the agency and post on the district's
5	Internet website a report assessing the progress of the district
6	and each campus in the district toward achieving the goals
7	identified in the district's plans developed under Subsection (a).
8	(d) The commissioner may adopt rules as necessary to
9	implement this section.
10	SECTION 4. Section 11.253(d), Education Code, is amended to
11	read as follows:
12	(d) Each campus improvement plan must be aligned with the
13	student outcomes plans developed under Section 11.2522 and:
14	(1) assess the academic achievement for each student
15	in the school using the achievement indicator system as described
16	by Section 39.053;
17	(2) set the campus performance objectives based on the
18	achievement indicator system, including objectives for special
19	needs populations, including students in special education
20	programs under Subchapter A, Chapter 29;
21	(3) identify how the campus goals will be met for each
22	student;
23	(4) determine the resources needed to implement the
24	plan;
25	(5) identify staff needed to implement the plan;
26	(6) set timelines for reaching the goals;
27	(7) measure progress toward the performance

1 objectives periodically to ensure that the plan is resulting in academic improvement; 2 3 (8) include goals and methods for violence prevention and intervention on campus; 4 (9) provide for a program to encourage parental 5 involvement at the campus; and 6 7 (10)if the campus is an elementary, middle, or junior 8 high school, set goals and objectives for the coordinated health program at the campus based on: 9 10 (A) student fitness assessment data, including any data from research-based assessments such as the school health 11 12 index assessment and planning tool created by the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; 13 14 (B) student academic performance data; 15 (C) student attendance rates; 16 (D) the percentage of students who are educationally disadvantaged; 17 (E) the use and success of any method to ensure 18 19 that students participate in moderate to vigorous physical activity as required by Section 28.002(1); and 20 21 any other indicator recommended by the local (F) school health advisory council. 22 SECTION 5. Section 12.104(b), Education Code, as amended by 23 24 Chapters 324 (S.B. 1488), 522 (S.B. 179), and 735 (S.B. 1153), Acts of the 85th Legislature, Regular Session, 2017, is reenacted and 25 26 amended to read as follows: 27 An open-enrollment charter school is subject to: (b)

No. 2201 1 (L) public school accountability under Subchapters B, C, D, F, G, and J, Chapter 39, and Chapter 39A; 2 3 (M) the requirement under Section 21.006 to report an educator's misconduct; 4 5 (N) intensive programs of instruction under Section 28.0213; 6 7 (O)the right of a school employee to report a 8 crime, as provided by Section 37.148; [and] 9 bullying prevention policies and procedures (P) under Section 37.0832; 10 (Q) the right of a school under Section 37.0052 11 12 to place a student who has engaged in certain bullying behavior in a disciplinary alternative education program or to expel the student; 13 14 [and] 15 (R) the right under Section 37.0151 to report to local law enforcement certain conduct constituting assault or 16 17 harassment; (S) [(P)] a parent's 18 right to information 19 regarding the provision of assistance for learning difficulties to the parent's child as provided by Sections 26.004(b)(11) and 20 26.0081(c) and (d); and 21 22 (T) the student outcomes plans under Section 23 11.2522. 24 SECTION 6. A term of office that begins before the effective date of this Act is not counted in determining whether a trustee is 25 26 eligible to serve on the board of trustees of a school district under Section 11.0596, Education Code, as added by this Act. 27

1 SECTION 7. Sections 11.252, 11.253, and 12.104, Education 2 Code, as amended by this Act, and Section 11.2522, Education Code, 3 as added by this Act, apply beginning with the 2019-2020 school 4 year.

5 SECTION 8. Not later than September 1, 2020, each school 6 district shall submit and post on the district's Internet website 7 the initial report required under Section 11.2522, Education Code, 8 as added by this Act.

9 SECTION 9. To the extent of any conflict, this Act prevails 10 over another Act of the 86th Legislature, Regular Session, 2019, 11 relating to nonsubstantive additions to and corrections in enacted 12 codes.

13 SECTION 10. This Act takes effect immediately if it 14 receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each 15 house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. 16 If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate 17 effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2019.
