A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing a constitutional amendment creating the Texas Gaming Commission and authorizing and regulating the operation of casino games and slot machines by a limited number of licensed owners and certain Indian tribes to provide money for the foundation school fund and additional financial aid for higher education students; authorizing fees; imposing a tax.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
SECTION 1. Section 47(a), Article III, Texas Constitution,
is amended to read as follows:

(a) The Legislature shall pass laws prohibiting lotteries
and gift enterprises in this State other than those authorized by
Subsections (b), (d), (d-1), and (e) of this section <u>and Sections</u>
<u>47a and 47b of this article</u>.

14 SECTION 2. Article III, Texas Constitution, is amended by 15 adding Section 47a to read as follows:

Sec. 47a. (a) Casino gaming and slot gaming are authorized in this state in accordance with this section to provide additional money for the foundation school fund and additional financial aid for higher education students.

20 (b) The Texas Gaming Commission is established. The 21 commission is composed of five members appointed by the governor 22 with the advice and consent of the senate. Commission members serve 23 staggered six-year terms, with one or two members' terms, as 24 applicable, expiring February 1 of each odd-numbered year. The

S.J.R. No. 41 1 governor shall fill a vacancy in a position on the commission for the remainder of the unexpired term. The governor shall designate a 2 commission member as presiding officer of the commission to serve 3 in that capacity at the pleasure of the governor. 4 5 (c) To be eligible for appointment to the commission, a 6 person: 7 (1) must be a citizen of the United States; 8 (2) must have resided in this state for the two years preceding the date of the person's appointment; 9 10 (3) may not: (A) own a financial or other interest in an 11 12 entity engaged in the conduct of casino gaming or slot gaming or engaged in the provision of casino or slot services, or an interest 13 14 in a security issued by such an entity; or 15 (B) be related within the second degree by affinity or the third degree by consanguinity as determined by 16 general law to an individual who owns an interest described in 17 Paragraph (A) of this subdivision; 18 19 (4) may not be an applicant for or holder of a license or other affirmative regulatory approval under a law administered 20 by the commission; and 21 22 (5) may not be a member of the governing body of a political subdivision of this state. 23 24 (d) The Texas Gaming Commission has broad authority and shall exercise strict control and close supervision over all 25 26 activities related to casino gaming and slot gaming authorized and conducted in this state under this section or another 27 law

1	administered by the commission.
2	(e) The Texas Gaming Commission shall appoint an executive
3	director and other necessary personnel and shall adopt rules the
4	commission considers necessary or desirable for the public interest
5	in carrying out the policy and provisions of this section and the
6	other laws related to this section that are administered by the
7	commission, including rules on:
8	(1) licensing and regulating casino owners, slot
9	establishment owners, gaming managers, gaming employees, and
10	manufacturers and distributors of gaming equipment, including the
11	qualifications, definitions, terms, and fees for licenses;
12	(2) criteria for awarding, denying, revoking,
13	probating, and suspending licenses;
14	(3) exclusion of persons and age requirements;
15	(4) procedures for conducting investigations,
16	inspections, criminal background investigations, audits, complaint
17	investigations, and disciplinary hearings;
18	(5) reporting and internal control requirements for
19	license holders;
20	(6) consequences of criminal convictions of license
21	holders or applicants;
22	(7) enforcement provisions, including disciplinary
23	actions and penalties, and security requirements;
24	(8) prize payment and redemption;
25	(9) regulating the operations of casinos and slot
26	establishments; and
27	(10) standards for gaming equipment.

1	(f) The Texas Gaming Commission shall:
2	(1) issue four licenses to operate casinos or slot
3	establishments to persons who are licensed to conduct pari-mutuel
4	wagering on horse or greyhound races in the county in which the
5	applicants held a license to conduct pari-mutuel wagering on horse
6	or greyhound races as of January 1, 2019, and who comply with
7	requirements of this section and related state laws and commission
8	<u>rules;</u>
9	(2) issue three licenses to operate casinos to persons
10	who are licensed to conduct pari-mutuel wagering at a class 1
11	racetrack as defined by Subtitle A-1, Title 13, Occupations Code
12	(Texas Racing Act), at the location licensed for conducting
13	pari-mutuel wagering on horse races and who comply with
14	requirements of this section and related state laws and commission
15	rules;
16	(3) issue four licenses to operate casinos at
17	casino-anchored destination attraction development projects in
18	counties with a population greater than 1.5 million to persons who
19	comply with requirements of this section and related state laws and
20	commission rules;
21	(4) issue three licenses to operate casinos at
22	casino-anchored destination attraction development projects
23	located on islands in the Gulf of Mexico to persons who comply with
24	requirements of this section and related state laws and commission
25	rules; and
26	(5) allow an Indian tribe recognized by the United
27	States government under federal law to operate on the tribe's land

1	held in trust by the United States on January 1, 1998, casino gaming
2	or slot gaming in accordance with:
3	(A) federal law; and
4	(B) either:
5	(i) an effective gaming agreement that
6	includes a provision requiring the Indian tribe to remit to this
7	state a portion of the tribe's casino gaming or slot gaming revenue
8	in an amount equal to the rate provided in the agreement; or
9	(ii) general state law that includes a
10	provision requiring the Indian tribe to remit to this state a
11	portion of the tribe's casino gaming or slot gaming revenue in an
12	amount equal to the rate provided by the general law.
13	(g) In determining whether or, for multiple applicants
14	competing for a limited number of casino owner's licenses or slot
15	establishment owner's licenses within a geographic area, to whom to
16	grant a license, the Texas Gaming Commission shall consider:
17	(1) the prospective revenue to be collected by this
18	state from the conduct of casino gaming at a casino or of slot
19	gaming at a slot establishment and the impact to this state's
20	economy of each competing applicant's proposed gaming and
21	associated facilities;
22	(2) the number of state residents estimated to be
23	employed at an applicant's proposed casino or slot establishment
24	and any proposed associated hotel and nongaming businesses and the
25	applicant's good faith plan to recruit, train, and promote a
26	workforce reflecting the diverse population of this state in all
27	<pre>employment classifications;</pre>

No. 41 1 (3) the extent to which an applicant's proposed casino 2 or slot establishment and any proposed associated hotel and 3 nongaming businesses could reasonably encourage interstate tourism 4 to this state; 5 (4) the extent to which the scope, design, location, and construction of the applicant's casino or slot establishment 6 7 and any associated hotel and nongaming businesses could reasonably 8 contribute to the development of a first-class gaming industry in this state; 9 10 (5) the applicant's experience in conducting licensed gaming operations and the applicant's financial ability to promptly 11 12 construct and adequately maintain a casino or slot establishment, including the experience of partners of the applicant, of 13 14 affiliated companies of the applicant or its partners, of key 15 personnel of the applicant or its partners, and of operating companies under contract with the applicant; and 16 17 (6) the percentage of equity interest in the applicant owned or to be owned by residents of this state. 18 19 (h) To ensure that a requisite level of economic development benefiting the people of this state accompanies each casino for 20 which an owner's license is granted, the Texas Gaming Commission 21 shall require an applicant for a license described by Subsection 22 (f)(3) or (4) of this section, as a condition of receiving and 23 24 holding an owner's license, to enter into an agreement with this state guaranteeing the applicant will construct a casino-anchored 25 26 destination attraction development project that includes total 27 land and development costs of at least:

3	(2) \$250 million for a project described in Subsection

5	(i) Notwithstanding Subsection (f) of this section:
6	(1) a license under Subsection (f)(1), (2), (3), or
7	(4) of this section may not be issued in a county unless:
8	(A) a majority of the voters of the county voted
9	for the proposition that added this section to this constitution;
10	or
11	(B) the voters of the county approved a
12	proposition legalizing casino gaming at a local option election
13	held under this section;
14	(2) not more than two casinos or slot establishments
15	may be located in the same county;
16	(3) a license under Subsection (f)(1) of this section
17	may not be issued to an applicant that did not conduct pari-mutuel
18	wagering at the location before January 1, 2019;
19	(4) a casino license may not be issued for a location
20	in an area in which casino gaming or slot gaming is prohibited under
21	a gaming agreement negotiated between an Indian tribe and this
22	state; and
23	(5) a casino license may not be issued for a location
24	within five miles of property the General Land Office is required by
25	statute to preserve and protect.
26	(j) The Texas casino and slot gaming fund is a special fund
27	in the state treasury. All application fees, investigation fees,

1 and license fees collected by the Texas Gaming Commission or on the 2 commission's behalf related to casino gaming or slot gaming shall 3 be deposited to the credit of the Texas casino and slot gaming fund. Except as provided by this section, the Texas casino and slot gaming 4 5 fund may only be used for the operation of the commission and the administration of this section. If money in the fund exceeds the 6 amount necessary for the operation of the commission and the 7 administration of this section, the legislature shall transfer any 8 excess amount to the foundation school fund. 9 10 (k) An applicant applying for a license under Subsection (f) of this section shall submit to the Texas Gaming Commission an 11 12 application fee in the amount of: (1) \$15 million for a license to operate a slot 13 14 establishment under Subsection (f)(1) of this section; 15 (2) \$25 million for a license to operate a casino under Subsection (f)(1) or (4) of this section; and 16 17 (3) \$50 million for a license to operate a casino under Subsection (f)(2) or (3) of this section. 18 19 (k-1) If an applicant for a license to operate a casino or slot establishment submits an application and fee to the Texas 20 Gaming Commission and is not awarded the license, the commission 21 shall refund the fee less the costs incurred by the commission in 22 reviewing the application and conducting a criminal background 23 24 investigation on the applicant. (1) A slot gaming tax in an amount equal to 35 percent of a 25 26 slot establishment owner's gross slot income for the slot establishment operated under the owner's license is imposed on the 27

1 owner. The tax shall be computed and paid on a monthly basis in accordance with the procedures established by rule of the Texas 2 3 Gaming Commission. 4 (m) Except as provided by Subsection (n) of this section, a 5 casino gaming tax in an amount equal to 20 percent of a casino owner's gross gaming revenue for the casino operated under the 6 7 owner's license is imposed on the owner. The tax shall be computed 8 and paid on a monthly basis in accordance with the procedures established by rule of the Texas Gaming Commission. 9 10

10 <u>(n) The casino gaming tax imposed under Subsection (m) of</u> 11 <u>this section is reduced to an amount equal to 15 percent of a casino</u> 12 <u>owner's gross gaming revenue for the casino operated under the</u> 13 <u>owner's license if the Texas Gaming Commission determines the owner</u> 14 <u>has invested \$1 billion or more in the owner's casino facility.</u>

15 (o) Of the revenue from the taxes imposed by Subsections (1)
16 and (m) of this section:

17 (1) one-twentieth is allocated to the municipality in 18 which the casino or slot establishment is located and one-twentieth 19 is allocated to the county in which the casino or slot establishment 20 is located; or

21 (2) if the casino or slot establishment is located in
22 an unincorporated area, one-tenth is allocated to the county in
23 which the casino or slot establishment is located.

24 (p) The comptroller of public accounts shall transfer the 25 appropriate amount allocated under Subsection (o) of this section 26 to the appropriate municipalities and counties not less than 27 monthly in the manner the comptroller considers appropriate.

(q) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the 1 2 revenue from the taxes imposed by Subsections (1) and (m) of this section is allocated as follows: 3 4 (1) one-fortieth to the general revenue fund for appropriation only to fund a compulsive gambling program 5 6 established by the Texas Gaming Commission; 7 (2) one-fortieth to the general revenue fund for 8 appropriation only to the Texas Gaming Commission to provide grants 9 to prosecuting attorneys in this state for the investigation and prosecution of offenses related to the possession of gambling 10 devices and illegal gambling operations; and 11 12 (3) the remainder to the foundation school fund. (r) The comptroller of public accounts quarterly shall 13 14 determine the net amount of receipts to be collected by a casino or 15 slot establishment from the sales and use taxes, hotel occupancy taxes, alcoholic beverage taxes, and franchise taxes imposed under 16 17 general law, or from other taxes imposed under general law as provided by the legislature in general law, and shall deposit that 18 amount in the general revenue fund. The net amount deposited may 19 only be appropriated to fund the TEXAS grant program established 20 21 under Subchapter M, Chapter 56, Education Code, or a similar program established by the legislature to provide grants to higher 22 23 education students in this state. 24 (s) A casino or slot establishment located at a greyhound

25 racetrack shall transfer 12 percent of gross gaming revenue to a 26 Texas canine development fund established and administered by the 27 racetrack.

S.J.R. No. 41 1 (t) A casino or slot establishment located at a horse 2 racetrack shall provide at least \$1 million, or the minimum coverage amount required by the Texas Racing Commission, in 3 accident insurance coverage for jockeys participating in a race 4 meeting at the racetrack. The commission: 5 6 (1) may review and approve the adequacy of the 7 coverage; (2) shall annually adjust for inflation the minimum 8 coverage amount; and 9 10 (3) shall annually publish in the Texas Register the revised minimum coverage amount. 11 12 (u) A person that operates a casino or slot establishment at a racetrack shall make at least weekly payments to the racing 13 facilities capital improvement account in an amount equal to 14 15 one-half of one percent of the gross gaming revenue unless a racing facilities agreement providing for a different amount is filed with 16 17 the Texas Racing Commission. (v) The racing facilities capital improvement account is an 18 19 escrow account held outside the state treasury and administered by the Texas Racing Commission. A transfer of money from the account 20 21 requires: 22 (1) for a horse racetrack, the signatures of: 23 (A) a designated official of the horse racetrack; 24 and 25 (B) a designated representative appointed by a 26 majority of the quarter horse state breed registry, the Thoroughbred state horse breed registry, and the horsemen's 27

1	organization; or
2	(2) for a greyhound racetrack, the signatures of:
3	(A) a designated official of the greyhound
4	racetrack; and
5	(B) a designated representative of the Texas
6	Greyhound Association or its successor.
7	(w) The Texas Racing Commission shall adopt rules to
8	administer this section. The rules must require the electronic
9	transfer of funds to the accounts described in this section.
10	(x) A person who operates a casino or slot establishment at
11	a racetrack shall promptly and fully make each payment or transfer
12	from the gross gaming revenue required under this section on behalf
13	of the casino or slot establishment at the racetrack even if live
14	racing at that racetrack is shortened, canceled, or delayed for any
15	reason.
16	(y) If a horse racetrack fails to request the minimum number
17	of required live race dates or fails to offer the minimum number of
18	required live races despite issuance of live race dates, does not
19	receive a waiver of that violation from the Texas Racing Commission
20	as provided by Subtitle A-1, Title 13, Occupations Code (Texas
21	Racing Act), and does not have an agreement with the affected state
22	horse breed registries and horsemen's organization, the applicable
23	state horse breed registries and the horsemen's organization may,
24	in their sole discretion, transfer all money to which they are
25	entitled under this section from that racetrack to the respective
26	accounts under their control at another racetrack or racetracks.
27	(z) If a greyhound racetrack fails to request the minimum

1 number of required live race dates or fails to offer the minimum 2 number of required live races despite issuance of live race dates, 3 does not receive a waiver of that violation from the Texas Racing Commission as provided by Subtitle A-1, Title 13, Occupations Code 4 5 (Texas Racing Act), and does not have an agreement with the affected officially recognized greyhound breed registry, the Texas 6 7 Greyhound Association or its successor may, in its sole discretion, 8 transfer all money to which the association is entitled under this section from that racetrack to the account under its control at 9 10 another racetrack or racetracks. (aa) The amount equal to 0.025 percent of the gross gaming 11

12 revenue generated at a horse racetrack shall be transferred from the Texas equine development fund for that racetrack to the equine 13 research account of Texas A&M AgriLife Research or its successor 14 for use in equine research, including facilities development under 15 Subchapter F, Chapter 88, Education Code. The money transferred 16 17 under this subsection shall supplement, and may not replace, funding provided under Subtitle A-1, Title 13, Occupations Code 18 19 (Texas Racing Act).

20 (bb) Each person that operates a casino or slot establishment at a racetrack shall, at least weekly, transfer to 21 the racing facilities capital improvement account from the 22 racetrack's Texas equine development fund or Texas canine 23 24 development fund, as applicable, an amount equal to one-half of one percent of the net gaming income unless a racing facilities 25 26 agreement providing for a different amount is filed with the Texas 27 Racing Commission.

No. 41 1 (cc) Unless an agreement between the state horse breed registries and the horsemen's organization provides otherwise, and 2 after any other allocations required by this section, the remainder 3 of the money deposited in the Texas equine development fund at a 4 5 horse racetrack must: 6 (1) be used for purses and the Texas-bred incentive 7 programs and may be used for other programs considered beneficial to the equine industry, including: 8 9 (A) equine retirement, adoption, and retraining 10 programs; (B) programs to test for banned 11 12 performance-enhancing equine drugs, performance-enhancing drug testing research, and equipment and facilities of laboratories 13 14 providing those services in this state; and 15 (C) other programs to improve the working 16 environment in stable areas of racetracks; and 17 (2) be allocated as follows: (A) the amount equal to 4.43 percent of the gross 18 gaming revenue to the horsemen's organization to supplement 19 Thoroughbred racing purses; 20 21 (B) the amount equal to 2.385 percent of the gross gaming revenue to the horsemen's organization to supplement 22 23 quarter horse racing purses; 24 (C) the amount equal to 2.38 percent of the gross 25 gaming revenue to the Thoroughbred state horse breed registry; and 26 (D) the amount equal to 1.28 percent of the gross 27 gaming revenue to the quarter horse state horse breed registry.

1 (dd) From the money allocated under Subsection (cc)(2)(A) of this section, pursuant to an agreement between the Texas Arabian 2 Breeders Association or its successor and the horsemen's 3 organization, the horsemen's organization shall allocate a portion 4 5 of the money for purses for the Arabian horse racing industry. The agreement must provide that not less than the amount equal to 0.199 6 7 percent of the gross gaming revenue be allocated for Arabian horse 8 racing purses. If an agreement is not made, the horsemen's organization shall transfer to the Texas Arabian horse racing 9 10 industry the amount equal to 0.199 percent of the gross gaming revenue for Arabian horse racing purses. 11

12 (ee) From the money allocated under Subsection (cc)(2)(B) of this section, pursuant to an agreement between the Texas Paint 13 Horse Breeders' Association or its successor and the horsemen's 14 organization, the horsemen's organization shall allocate a portion 15 of the money for purses for the paint horse racing industry. If the 16 17 agreement is not made, the horsemen's organization shall transfer to the paint horse racing industry an amount equal to 0.072 percent 18 19 of the gross gaming revenue for paint horse racing purses.

(ff) From the money allocated under Subsection (cc)(2)(C) 20 of this section, pursuant to an agreement between the Texas Arabian 21 22 Breeders Association or its successor and the Thoroughbred state horse breed registry, the registry shall allocate a portion of the 23 24 money for the Arabian horse racing industry state-breed programs. The agreement must provide that not less than the amount equal to 25 26 0.107 percent of the gross gaming revenue be allocated for Arabian state-breed programs. If an agreement is not made, the 27

1 Thoroughbred state horse breed registry shall transfer to the Texas Arabian horse racing industry for state-breed programs the amount 2 3 equal to 0.107 percent of the gross gaming revenue. 4 (gg) From the money allocated under Subsection (cc)(2)(D) 5 of this section, pursuant to an agreement between the Texas Paint Horse Breeders' Association or its successor and the quarter horse 6 7 state horse breed registry, the registry shall allocate a portion 8 of the money for state-breed programs for the paint horse racing industry. If an agreement is not made, the registry shall transfer 9 10 to the paint horse racing industry an amount equal to 0.038 percent of the gross gaming revenue for paint horse state-breed programs. 11 12 (hh) Following the other transfers and allocations required by this section, the remainder of the money deposited in the Texas 13 canine development fund at a greyhound racetrack is allocated as 14 15 f<u>ollows:</u> 16 (1) the amount equal to 4.75 percent of the gross 17 gaming revenue to supplement greyhound racing purses; (2) the amount equal to 4.75 percent of the gross 18 19 gaming revenue to supplement accredited Texas-bred greyhound 20 racing purses; and 21 (3) the amount equal to two percent of the gross gaming revenue to the Texas Greyhound Association or its successor as the 22 23 state greyhound breed registry. 24 (ii) The Texas Racing Commission may adopt rules to administer this section and shall require the electronic transfer 25 26 of funds to accounts described in this section. 27 (jj) For purposes of this section, a racing facilities

1 agreement for a horse racetrack is valid only on approval of the 2 applicable racetrack and a majority of the quarter horse state 3 horse breed registry, the Thoroughbred state horse breed registry, and the horsemen's organization. 4 5 (kk) For purposes of this section, a racing facilities agreement for a greyhound racetrack is valid only on approval of the 6 7 racetrack and the Texas Greyhound Association or its successor. 8 (11) A racing facilities agreement filed under this section remains in effect until it expires on its own terms or until it is 9 10 superseded by a subsequent racing facilities agreement for the same 11 racetrack. 12 (mm) Unless a racing facilities agreement provides otherwise, the money in the racing facilities capital improvement 13 account may be spent only for the maintenance and improvement of 14 pari-mutuel racing facilities. 15 (nn) Money in the performance horse development fund may be 16 17 spent only for: (1) the development of the horse agricultural industry 18 19 in this state through efforts intended to attract, retain, promote, and encourage the breeding, raising, training, and exhibition of 20 horses in this state that are bred or trained for public competition 21 22 and exhibition or recreational use in all legally permitted equine activities other than horse racing at racetracks; and 23 24 (2) events and programs conducted in this state. (oo) Money from the performance horse development fund is 25 26 allocated as follows: 27 (1) 40 percent to the American Quarter Horse

1 Association or its successor for its sanctioned events and 2 programs; 3 (2) 20 percent to the National Cutting Horse Association or its successor for its sanctioned events and 4 5 programs; 6 (3) 20 percent to the American Paint Horse Association 7 or its successor for its sanctioned events and programs; and 8 (4) 20 percent to the Department of Agriculture or its successor to promote the equine agricultural industry in this 9 10 state. (pp) Subject to Subsection (qq) of this section, money 11 12 transferred to an association or agency from the performance horse development fund may be used for: 13 (1) purse supplements or additional money for 14 15 performance and recreational horse events conducted in this state; 16 (2) the establishment of an accredited Texas Bred Program for breeding of performance and recreational horses; 17 (3) the marketing and promotion of performance and 18 19 recreational horse activities and events in this state; and (4) scholarship programs. 20 21 (qq) Money may be transferred under Subsection (oo)(4) of this section only to organizations of the equine industry in this 22 state that are not receiving money for events and programs under 23 24 Subsection (oo)(1), (2), or (3) of this section. 25 (rr) Except as otherwise provided by law, all money paid to 26 the Department of Agriculture or its successor is subject to Subchapter F, Chapter 404, Government Code. 27

1 (ss) Casinos and slot establishments are subject to all 2 applicable state laws and local ordinances related to health and building codes, including rules adopted by the Texas Gaming 3 Commission. A local ordinance or zoning law may not prohibit the 4 development of a casino or slot establishment authorized by this 5 section, except that a casino or slot establishment may not be 6 7 located in an area zoned exclusively as residential, unless 8 otherwise provided by commission rule.

9 (tt) The commissioners court of a county may at any time 10 order an election to legalize casino gaming under this section in 11 that county. The commissioners court shall order and hold an 12 election to legalize casino gaming under this section in the county 13 if the commissioners court is presented with a petition that meets 14 the requirements of this section and is certified as valid under 15 this section.

(uu) A petition for a legalization election must include a 16 17 statement substantially as follows before the space reserved for signatures on each page: "This petition is to require that an 18 19 election be held in (name of county) to legalize casino gaming in (name of county)." A petition is valid only if it is signed by a 20 number of registered voters of the county equal to at least three 21 22 percent of the total number of votes cast for governor by qualified voters of the county in the most recent gubernatorial general 23 24 election. Each voter must enter beside the voter's signature the date the voter signs the petition. A signature may not be counted 25 26 as valid if the date of signing is earlier than the 90th day before 27 the date the petition is submitted to the commissioners court. Each

1 voter must provide on the petition the voter's current voter
2 registration number, printed name, and residence address,
3 including zip code.

4 (vv) Not later than the fifth day after the date a petition 5 for an election under this section is received in the office of the commissioners court, the commissioners court shall submit the 6 7 petition for verification to the county clerk. The county clerk 8 shall determine whether the petition is signed by the number of registered voters of the county required under Subsection (uu) of 9 this section. Not later than the 30th day after the date the 10 petition is submitted to the county clerk for verification, the 11 12 clerk shall certify in writing to the commissioners court whether the petition is valid or invalid. If the county clerk determines 13 the petition is invalid, the clerk shall state the reasons for that 14 determination. 15

(ww) If the county clerk certifies that a petition for an 16 17 election under this section is valid, not later than the 30th day after the date of certification, the commissioners court shall 18 19 order that an election be held in the county on the next uniform election date provided under general law that allows sufficient 20 time to comply with applicable provisions of general law. The 21 commissioners court shall state in the order the issue to be 22 presented to the voters. The county clerk shall notify the Texas 23 24 Gaming Commission by certified mail, return receipt requested, that an election has been ordered. The ballot in a legalization election 25 26 shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "Legalizing casino gaming within (name of county)." 27

1 (xx) The commissioners court shall provide written notice of the results of the election to the Texas Gaming Commission not 2 3 later than the third day after the date the election is canvassed. If the majority of votes cast in a legalization election under this 4 5 section favor the legalization of casino gaming, casino gaming authorized under this section is permitted within the county 6 7 holding the election effective on the 10th day after the date the 8 election is canvassed. If less than a majority of the votes cast in the election favor the legalization of casino gaming, casino gaming 9 is not permitted in the county, and a subsequent election on the 10 issue may not be held in the county before the corresponding uniform 11 12 election date following the first anniversary of the election date. If in each of two consecutive elections within any county less than 13 a majority of the votes cast favor the legalization of casino 14 15 gaming, casino gaming is not permitted in the county, and a subsequent election on the issue may not be held in the county 16 17 before the corresponding uniform election date following the fifth anniversary of the date of the second election. 18
