SB 11 affects all of the 5.5 million students in the state, and has the potential to dramatically improve:

Psychological Safety for All Texas Students

Physical Safety for All Texas Students



Senate Bill 11: Highlights

Strengthens Safety and Emergency Protocols

- Establishes process for and requirement to conduct behavioral threat assessment
- Establishes Safe and Supportive Schools
 Program
- Provides stronger guidance on mandatory drills and facility standards
- Increases monitoring and strengthens compliance requirements for safety planning and protocols



Expands Mental Health Initiatives

- Requires establishment of and training on trauma-informed care policies
- Requires state to conduct inventory of mental health resources
- Creates a statewide plan for student mental health



Provides Funding for Schools to Increase Safety and Security on Campus

Establishes School Safety Allotment (SB 11) and provides school hardening grants (SB 500)

Mental Health-Related Bills With School Safety Implications

HB 906

TEA to implement a School Mental Health Task Force:

- Study, evaluate and make recommendations in a report to the Legislature
- Assess the effectiveness of state funded school mental health services and training through 2025 (Nov 1, 2020, 2022, 2024)

HB 18

Strengthens district requirements to implement trauma-informed approaches and address student mental health:

- Requires rule making (SBEC, SBOE)
- Provide guidance to districts
- District Improvement Plans to include trauma
- Continuing education

HB 19

Requires a mental health professional from the LMHA to be placed in each ESC:

 Supports region and provides consultation, training, and coordination on available mental health resources



Status:

- Districts and charter schools will be submitting baseline data to TEA in Fall 2020 including:
 - Whether an SSSP Team has been established;
 - Number of threats reported/assessed;
- Remaining data as required by SB 11, will be reported Fall 2021



School Safety Allotment



School Safety Allotment (TEC Chapter 42)

- Approximately \$100,000,000 appropriated for the biennium (\$9.72 per student)
- Provides annual allotment to improve school safety and security, including securing school facilities, providing security, providing training and planning, and providing programs related to suicide prevention



Status: Incorporated into 2019-2020 FSP amounts



Senate Bill 500 - Funding





School Safety Grants

• \$100M provided in SB 500 for facilities hardening (awards ranging from \$25K-\$3M available for districts)

Status:

- Grant application opened on 10/24/19 and closed on 1/31/20.
 TEA communicated through "To The Administrator Addressed" correspondence and the Regional Education Service Centers
- 97% of districts applied, and all received funding



Mandatory Drills

Mandatory Drills



• TEA, in consultation with the Texas School Safety Center and the State Fire Marshal, shall designate the number of mandatory drills including designating the number of fire, lockdown, lockout, shelter-in-place, and evacuation drills

Required Drills:





Drill	Frequency	
Secure (Lockout)	1 per year	
Lockdown	1 per semester	
Evacuate	1 per year	
Shelter-in-Place	1 per year	
Shelter for Severe Weather	1 per year	
Fire Evacuation	2 per semester	



Facility Standards



Facility Standards

 TEA to establish rules to ensure building standards for instructional facilities to provide secure/safe environment for students and school personnel



Status: Effective Early 2021



Identification of Mental Health Resources



Mental Health Resource Lists

- Work with ESCs to collect regional resources
- Develop list of available state-level resources

Status: Posted March 2020

Statewide Mental and Behavioral Health Best Practice List

Develop list of mental and behavioral health best practices to share

Status: Complete; posted August 2020

Statewide Plan for Student Mental Health



Status: In progress; will be completed Fall 2020



Recommendations



TEA Statutory Changes for Consideration

- Make behavioral threat assessment data collection confidential.
- Name TEA as a standing member of the Mental Health Children's Consortium and add a TEA representative to the executive committee of the Consortium.
- Clean up technical align between SB 11 with HB 3 statutory references. The School Safety Allotment is currently the only item remaining in Chapter 42. School finance formulas have moved to Chapter 48.

Additional Federal Funding Secured by TEA for School Safety



Mental Health Focus

- \$1,265,600 (Title IV funds) in total grants distributed to ESCs to support mental health and wrap around services.
 - Focus of the grant is for TEA to equip ESCs with school mental health training and for ESCs to support small and rural districts to implement
- \$8,996,096 for Project AWARE (Advancing Wellness and Resiliency in Education)- 5 years (competitive federal grant TEA applied for)
 - > 5 high-need districts recovering from Hurricane Harvey
 - Piloting evidence-based practices and planning to scale them
 - > Partnering with HHSC, ESCs and UT for program evaluation



Trauma-Informed Training Policy





Trauma-Informed practices – Commissioner of Education Rule

 Each school district must implement a policy integrating trauma-informed practices in each school environment, and participate in training, using resources developed by TEA.

Project Restore Training Series

• TEA created a trauma-informed training video series, which connects educators to relevant science and strategies that can help them address the emotional needs of their students, themselves, their colleagues, and students' families. The series help educators create an environment that jump starts teaching and learning and drives student achievement. All videos are created with a COVID-19 lens and include support for both in-person and remote instruction. Educators receive CPE units for viewing each of the six videos in the series.

Status: Commissioner Rule effective Fall 2020, integrated into Safe and Supportive School Program rules



TEM Continuing Education for Classroom Teachers



Educator Training

Continuing Education for Classroom Teachers - Adds required instruction to continuing education for teachers to include how grief and trauma affect student learning and behavior

Status: Item discussed as proposed revision to 19 TAC Chapter 232, General Certification provisions during the December 6, 2019 State Board of Education Certification (SBEC) meeting



TEA Curriculum Changes



Curriculum Changes

 Health curriculum –Adds mental health and suicide prevention to the health curriculum standards (TEKS) adopted by SBOE

Status: Revisions to the health TEKS are scheduled to be adopted in November 2020

 Digital Citizenship – SBOE, by rule, must require school districts incorporate digital citizenship instruction into curriculum standards

Status: Revisions to the technology applications TEKS are scheduled to be adopted in June 2021
