- SECTION 1. Section 433.003, Health and Safety Code, is 4
- amended by adding Subdivisions (1-a), (2-a), (10-a), (11-a), 5
- (19-a), (23-a), and (26) to read as follows:
- 7 (1-a) "Beef" means any edible portion of a formerly
- live and whole cattle carcass, not derived by synthetic or 8

- 12 "rabbit," or any common variation of those terms and the product
- 13 does not contain the product described by the term listed on the
- 14 label.
- SECTION 3. Section 433.0245, Health and Safety Code, is
- 16 amended by adding Subsections (a-1), (e), and (f) and amending
- 17 Subsections (b), (c), and (d) to read as follows:
- 18 (a-1) For purposes of this section, a low-volume livestock

- (1) includes an establishment that processes fewer

Livestock owners of domestic rabbits who give or sell carcasses, parts of carcasses, meat, or food products derived from not more than 500 domestic rabbits in any calendar year would be exempt from inspection. The Department of State Health Services expects the number of persons or facilities which would be exempt from inspections or regulations would be very small, and anticipates that any costs associated with implementing this bill could be absorbed within existing resources.

The bill would require the Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) to adopt rules to implement these changes by September 1, 2020. HHSC anticipates no fiscal impact associated with these activities.
