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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

5 SECTION 1. Section 1001.205, Health and Safety Code, is 6 amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1001.205. REPORTS. (a) Not later than September 30 of each year, a local mental health authority shall provide to the department the number of:

(1) employees and contractors of the authority who were trained as mental health first aid trainers under Section 12 1001.202 during the preceding fiscal year, the number of trainers who left the program for any reason during the preceding fiscal year, and the number of active trainers;

(2) university employees, school district employees,
and school resource officers who completed a mental health first
aid training program offered by the authority under Section
1001.203 during the preceding fiscal year <u>categorized by local</u>
<u>mental health authority region, university or school district, as</u>
<u>applicable, and category of personnel; and</u>

(3) individuals who are not university employees, school district employees, or school resource officers who completed a mental health first aid training program offered by the authority during the preceding fiscal year.

1 (b) Not later than December 1 of each year, the department 2 shall compile the information submitted by local mental health 3 authorities as required by Subsection (a) and submit a report to the 4 legislature containing [the number of]:

5 (1) <u>the number of</u> authority employees and contractors 6 trained as mental health first aid trainers during the preceding 7 fiscal year, the number of trainers who left the program for any 8 <u>reason during the preceding fiscal year, and the number of active</u> 9 <u>trainers;</u>

10 (2) <u>the number of</u> university employees, school 11 district employees, and school resource officers who completed a 12 mental health first aid training program provided by an authority 13 during the preceding fiscal year <u>categorized by local mental health</u> 14 <u>authority region, university or school district, as applicable, and</u> 15 <u>category of personnel; [and]</u>

16 (3) <u>the number of</u> individuals who are not university 17 employees, school district employees, or school resource officers 18 who completed a mental health first aid training program provided 19 by an authority during the preceding fiscal year<u>; and</u>

20 <u>(4) a detailed accounting of expenditures of money</u> 21 <u>appropriated for the purpose of implementing this subchapter</u>.

(c) The department shall develop and provide to local mental health authorities a form to be used for the reporting of information required under Subsection (a), including the reporting of each category of personnel described by that subsection.

1 that subsection after December 31, 2019. A report due under that 2 subsection before that date is governed by the law in effect 3 immediately before the effective date of this Act, and that law is 4 continued in effect for that purpose.

5 (b) Section 1001.205(b), Health and Safety Code, as amended 6 by this Act, applies only to a report due under that subsection 7 after March 1, 2020. A report due under that subsection before that 8 date is governed by the law in effect immediately before the 9 effective date of this Act, and that law is continued in effect for 10 that purpose.

11 (c) Not later than May 1, 2020, the Health and Human 12 Services Commission shall develop and make available the form 13 required under Section 1001.205(c), Health and Safety Code, as 14 added by this Act.
