8	Sec. 418.054. COORDINATING 9-1-1 TEXT MESSAGE CAPABILITY.
9	The division, in consultation with the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension
10	Service, shall coordinate state and local government efforts to
11	make 9-1-1 emergency service capable of receiving text messages
12	from a cellular telephone or other wireless communication device.
13	Sec. 418.055. SOCIAL MEDIA USE DURING AND AFTER DISASTERS.
14	The division, in consultation with any state agency or private
15	entity the division determines is appropriate, shall develop
16	standards for the use of social media as a communication tool by
17	governmental entities during and after a disaster. The standards
18	<pre>must:</pre>
19	(1) require state agencies, political subdivisions,
20	first responders, and volunteers that use social media during and
21	after a disaster to post consistent and clear information;
22	(2) optimize the effectiveness of social media use

(b) An emergency management director described by Section 13 14 418.1015 shall develop a plan to use information from the emergency assistance registry during the political subdivision's response to 15 a disaster. The emergency management director shall publish the 16 17 plan on: 18 (1) the political subdivision's Internet website; and 19 (2) the department's Internet website in accordance 20 with Subsection (c). 21 (c) The division shall develop a process by which a plan 22 developed by an emergency management director under Subsection (b)

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may be published to the department's Internet website.
