#### A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT

4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 33, Human Resources Code,
6	is amended by adding Section 33.0025 to read as follows:
7	Sec. 33.0025. DISASTER SNAP. (a) In this section,
8	"program" means the program to provide supplemental nutrition

20	(A) accepting program benefits applications
21	online and by telephone; and
22	(B) staffing a high-volume call center to process
23	those applications.
24	SECTION 2. As soon as practicable after the effective date

- 2 (1) the Health and Human Services Commission shall
- 3 consult with federal officials, including the members of the Texas
- 4 delegation to the United States Senate and House of Representatives
- 5 and the United States Department of Agriculture regarding repealing
- 6 the in-person application requirement for supplemental nutrition
- 7 assistance benefits for victims of a disaster; and
- 8 (2) the executive commissioner of the Health and Human
- 9 Services Commission shall, if necessary, develop and seek a waiver
- 10 or other appropriate authorization from the United States secretary
- 11 of agriculture to allow submission of applications online and by
- 12 telephone for supplemental nutrition assistance benefits for
- 13 victims of a disaster.
- 14 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 15 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 16 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 17 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 18 Act takes effect September 1, 2019.

AN ACT 7 2 relating to the disaster supplemental nutrition assistance 3 program. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 5 SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 33, Human Resources Code, is amended by adding Section 33.0024 to read as follows: Sec. 33.0024. DISASTER SNAP. (a) In this section, 7 "program" means the program to provide supplemental nutrition 8 assistance benefits to victims of a disaster as authorized by 7 9 U.S.C. - 3 strategies for effective collaboration between local governments
- 4 and the commission to local government officials in coastal
- 5 counties by hosting webinars, conducting conference calls, or
- 6 holding in-person meetings.
